1. Summary

Audit Committee is responsible for reviewing the effectiveness of internal control. The Financial Regulations state that it is essential that robust, integrated systems are developed and maintained for identifying and evaluating all significant operational risks to the authority.

2. Risk Management

2.1 Responses Received From Services

A list of the high risks that featured on the corporate risk register was presented to Audit Committee on 12th October. It was requested that information be sought from a number of services relating to the risks they had on the register.

Below are the responses received from these services in relation to the issues raised.

2.1.1 Free Transport to Schools Policy

An update was requested in relation to the above policy.

Response from Schools Service:

Following the consultation undertaken in the summer term on the proposed changes to the Home to School Transport policy the following action is being undertaken on a high school by high school catchment basis.

- Identification of the number and home location of pupils currently being transported to a school other than their

closest.

- The number of learners, if any, being transported from these areas to the closest schools, resulting in two routes.

- Any geographical factors that need to be taken into consideration.

- The nature and class of road being used to calculate the closest

school

- Any other relevant factors that need to be considered from the consultation meetings.

This information will be drawn together into a report for the portfolio holders consideration, before submitting a report to cabinet. Local consultation will be undertaken on a rolling programme on any impacts of these reviews.

2.1.2 Adults Social Care Overspend (Risk 12.86)

Commentary in relation to this can be found with the Financial Overview and Forecast Report for Quarter 2.

2.1.3 High Schools Deficits (Risk 12.88)

Response from Finance:

Audit Committee requested sight of the documents being proposed for schools (Schools Strategic and Financial Management and Scheme for the Financing of Schools). These documents were distributed on 25th October. Details of the deficits will be provided by the Financial Overview and Forecast Report for Quarter 2.

2.1.4 Liabilities Arising From Closed Landfill Sites (Risk 12.85)

Response from Local & Environmental Services:

The Council has direct or indirect liability for environmental pollution as well as health & safety hazards on 80 sites across Powys. Of these 30 have been graded at the higher end of the risk scale. At five of the sites the council has discharge consents issued by the Environment Agency with leachate treatment plants installed to manage discharge within the prescribed limits. A further plant has been installed at one site which is not currently covered by an Environment Agency discharge consent but is likely to be shortly. Significant incidents since 2009 are shown below.

Jan-09	The culvert at Rhosforlo partially collapsed and was relined Aug 2009
Mar-09	Culvert replaced at Tregynon due to major failure of previous pipe
Apr-09	Partial collapse of the surface at Carreghofa - excavated and backfilled
May-	Tower partially collapsed at Tir Canol rendering the plant useless

May-	Power cut at Rhosforlo resulted in raw leachate escaping for a maximum of

Jun-10	Discovered that Carreghofa did not have a discharge consent
Jun-10	The leachate drain at Carreghofa dried up
Dec-10	Adverse weather prevented access to the leachate treatment plants for three weeks, Pentrefelin, Carreghofa, Tir Canol & Rhosforlo suffered pump failures/power cuts resulting in raw and part treated leachate being discharged
Feb-11	The bund around the treatment towers at Cwrt y Plyffin failed and was replaced April 2011
Dec-11	Due to flash flooding the main lagoon at Nantmel was partially washed out. Road tankers removed the excess from the lagoon

Jan-12	Unusually high flows of raw leachate overwhelmed the treatment plant at Rhosforlo and the excess leachate was removed by road tanker
Mar-12	Rhosforlo and the excess leachate was removed by road tanker Leachate located in drainage ditches at Carreghofa - dairy herd drinking leachate

The revenue and capital costs associated with the management of the sites in recent years is shown below:

A range of environmental risk factors are considered in assessing each site including groundwater, surface water, and methane gas. The scores against each category are recorded on the information sheet for each site. Higher scoring sites will typically have high scores for each category. It is these 30 higher scoring sites that have been excluded by the insurance company presumably on the basis that the commercial risks are too high. Closed landfill sites represent a continued risk to the Council. They are complex in nature and require specialist consideration. The last manager with sufficient understanding and background has left the Council and is currently working for the Welsh Government. The service is therefore considering utilising the expertise of the contaminated land officer to manage the sites. He is currently reviewing sites with discharge consents and the strategy for future management.

Response from Finance:

The Risk & Resilience Section provided assistance to Local and Environmental Services in procuring a policy of insurance in respect of certain liabilities arising from the Council's closed landfill sites. The five year policy incepted in October 2007 expired on 30^{th} September 2012. The total premium over 5 years was £185k. It was anticipated that a five year policy from 1st October 2012 to 30^{th} September 2017 would be in excess of the threshold of £174k that requires publication in the Official Journal of the European Union (OJEU).

Environmental Liability is a specialised insurance market. As such the Environmental Practice of the Council's insurance brokers was utilised to ensure maximum interest from the insurance market. The tender closed on 17^{th} August 2012. No tenders were received, this was reportedly due to concerns over some aspects of the portfolio and a reluctance to offer terms in line with the specification requested, however two insurers indicated that they would be interested in working towards finding a solution. In accordance with the Council's Standing Orders, an exemption to a further full tender exercise was granted. These two insurers provided indicative quotations with one insurer being significantly more competitive. Cover was bound with this insurer in the sum of £199,280 (£188k + Insurance Premium Tax).

Thirty sites were excluded from the emergency expense cover provided under this policy, for reasons outlined by Local and Environmental Services above. It should also be note that this policy does not seek to provide cover for any losses other than those that the Council is legally obligated to pay and the policy has a £100k excess in respect of each pollution incident The Risk & Resilience Section is fully confident that insurers underwriting this type of environmental liability cover have had the opportunity to quote and that the policy incepted is reasonable in the circumstances.

2.1.5 <u>Risk of Failing to Respond to Internal Audit and Regulators</u> <u>Recommendations (Risk 12.89)</u>

Committee requested to know who is responsible for monitoring the implementation of actions identified by regulators. This could be considered as part of the role for the Cabinet Member for Corporate Governance with appropriate officer support. A simple tracker was maintained until a few years ago and this can easily be reinstated.

2.1.6 Liabilities Arising from Planning Applications (Risk 12.93)

Response from Regeneration & Development:

Because the planning system is open to considerable public scrutiny, there is always the risk that an aggrieved applicant or third party will seek to challenge the legal basis on which any decision has been made. The planning system is governed by numerous statutory procedures and on this basis there is often scope to at least consider such a challenge. The courts do not generally entertain what could be regarded as frivolous challenges but, clearly, the risk is always there. The courts also would have regard for alternative remedies that might be available and an applicant that has been refused planning permission would generally have the right of appeal, in which case, the courts would generally say to go down that route. There is, however, no third party right of appeal for third parties, including objectors.

We approve somewhere in the region of 93% of all applications so the scope for legal challenge via judicial review from an aggrieved applicant is minimal,. The same can be said for appeals via a public inquiry. This is probably an acceptable risk.

Given that percentage, however, there is increased risk in terms of third parties. We always seek to limit that risk by strictly following procedures, etc.

If things do go wrong, one risk is in terms of reputation. The other main risk is in terms of budget as there is never a budget set to deal with this type of eventuality. The simple reason being that you could go all year without a challenge, surrender the budget and then find, the next year, that you have to spend \$5K, \$10K, \$15, maybe \$20K to defend such a challenge. In the past, costs have been found through budget reserves. However, there are no longer any budget reserves, which places us in a potentially very challenging position.

With particular regard to wind farm applications, detailed information was provided to cabinet on 25th October and the costs associated with a planning enquiry are considerable.

2.2 Escalation of Concerns to the Executive

At the 12th October meeting Audit Committee recommended the escalation of any concerns to the Executive.

2.2.1 - Responding to Regulators Recommendations (Risk 12.89

The Director of Finance and Infrastructure will ensure that this concern is raised with the Executive.

2.2.2 Overspends and Use of Reserves

The Portfolio Holder for Finance confirms the concerns relating to overspends and the use of reserves was reported to the Cabinet on 13th November 2012.

2.3 Risk Identification & Analysis

A total of 40 risks are currently contained on the Corporate Risk Register. These are currently broken down into the following categories:
