REPORT FOR: Decision

1. Purpose

1.1 Further to the decision made by Cabinet on 24th of October 2023, the Council has carried out consultation on the following proposal:

Phase 1: Close Treowen C.P. School from 31 August 2025 and extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the former Treowen C.P. School site from 1st September 2025

- **Phase 2:** Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to move to a new building located on the existing Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site during 2026/27, and the Treowen site closes.
- 1.2 The purpose of this report is to inform Cabinet members of the responses received to the consultation and to determine whether or not to proceed with the statutory processes to continue with the proposal.
- 1.3 The report is supported by the following appendices:

2. Background

2.1 Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School are two Englishmedium primary schools located in the town of Newtown, in North Powys.

2.2 Current pupil numbers at the two schools are as follows¹:

- 2.3 Ysgol Calon y Dderwen was established in September 2021 following the amalgamation of Ladywell Green Infants School and Hafren Junior School, and currently operates from the buildings of the two previous schools. The intention was that eventually a replacement building would be provided on the site, to be co-located with the new Health and Well-being Campus being developed as part of the North Powys Well-being Programme.
- 2.4 Since the establishment of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen, the Council has been developing plans for the new school building. A Strategic Outline Case (SOC) has been developed and approved by the Council's Cabinet and Welsh Government and plans for the new building had been developed to the end of RIBA Stage 2.
- 2.5 Following consideration of these plans by the Council's Cabinet, officers were asked to consider whether it would be possible to increase the size of the planned new building, to accommodate more pupils, potentially the pupils currently attending Maesyrhandir C.P. School and Treowen C.P. School as well as Ysgol Calon y Dderwen pupils.
- 2.6 In the summer of 2023, an engagement exercise took place with the three school communities, to understand the views of stakeholders at the three schools on the plan to potentially increase the scope of the new building to include additional schools. This included meetings with staff and governors at the three schools, as well as an online questionnaire.
- 2.7 An options appraisal was also carried out which considered options for the three schools. This identified the following preferred option:
 - New build for Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to accommodate pupils currently attending Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School
 - The expansion of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to incorporate the Treowen C.P. School site from September 2025
 - All pupils to transfer to the new building at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen when this is ready.
- 2.8 On the 24th of October 2023, Cabinet considered the findings of the engagement exercise and the options appraisal, and agreed to commence the statutory process on the following proposals:
 - **Phase 1:** Close Treowen C.P. School from 31 August 2025 and extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the former Treowen C.P. School site

Phase 2: Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to move to a new building located on the existing Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site during 2026/27, and the Treowen site closes.

The Consultation Period

- 2.9 Consultation on the proposal commenced on the 15th of January 2024 and ended on the 26th of February 2024.
- 2.10 The consultation document was available on the Council's website throughout the consultation period. The document was also distributed to stakeholders as required by the School Organisation Code (2018). The consultation document that was issued is attached as Appendix A.
- 2.11 Consultees were asked to respond to the consultation by either completing the online consultation form, filling in a paper copy of the form and returning it to the Transforming Education Team, or writing to the Transforming Education Team.
- 2.12 During the consultation period, meetings were held with pupils, staff and governors of both Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School. The minutes of all these meetings are attached as Appendix C, and the issues raised in the meetings are included in the Consultation Report (Appendix B).

Consultation Responses

- 2.13 104 respondents completed the online response form which was available on the Council's website. In addition, 15 respondents completed and sent the response form by email. 5 other written responses were received, including a response from Estyn.
- 2.14 Estyn's response to the consultation is provided on page 15 of the Consultation Report (Appendix B).
- 2.15 42 letters were also received from members of the Treowen community before the start of the consultation. The comments raised in these letters are summarised in the consultation report.

Consultation Findings

- 2.16 The findings of the consultation are provided in full in the Consultation Report (Appendix B) and are summarised below.
- 2.17 Of the 119 respondents who completed the online survey or the response form, 23.53% indicated they were associated with Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and 64.71% indicated that they were associated with Treowen C.P. School.

- 2.18 The issues received in response to the consultation are listed in the Consultation Report (Appendix B), from page 20 onwards, along with the Council's responses to those issues.

3. Advice

- 3.1 Based on the findings of the consultation, the advice of officers is that the Council should proceed with the proposals in respect of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School by publishing a Statutory Notice.
- 3.2 The reasons for this proposal are:
 - Provides the opportunity for all learners from Ysgol Calon y
 Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School to benefit from an improved
 learning environment
 - A larger school provides a more efficient model of education
 - Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School have a similar pupil profile in terms of additional learning needs and pupils eligible for free school meals – this would enable a positive transition process
 - Removal of backlog maintenance at two schools estimated backlog maintenance at Treowen C.P. School is currently £455,286, and estimated backlog maintenance at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen is currently £620,510.
 - The new school building at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen would be fully accessible and would meet the requirements of the Equality Act
 - The new building is planned to be energy efficient, and the school would meet the Welsh Government's net zero targets
 - Reduces surplus places in Newtown, but places remain available at other schools to accommodate for future fluctuations in pupil numbers
 - Minimal impact on staff and pupils at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen who have only recently gone through a staffing restructure process during the establishment of the new school
 - Would provide education in Treowen until the new building is constructed.
 - Pupils would continue to attend school at the same location until the new building is constructed.
 - Would enable staff expertise and good practice to be shared across both sites during the transition period.
 - Would enable the school to run more efficiently during the transition period through shared staffing and resources
 - Improved transition arrangements to support pupils' move from Treowen to the new building as they would already be part of the school.
- 3.3 It is anticipated that the Statutory Notice would be published in May 2024, and that a further report, summarising any objections received, will be considered by the Council's Cabinet in July 2024.
- 3.4 It must noted that implementation of this proposal would not preclude the schools from being a part of future reorganisation proposals.

4. Resource Implications

- 4.1 The intention initially is to extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the Treowen site. No savings to the Council would be identified at this stage in terms of delegated funding, however the school would be able to combine resources and potentially reduce management costs for the school, as there would be one senior leadership team.
- 4.2 There would be no additional transport costs associated with this proposal, however there may be some additional costs associated with extending Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the Treowen site, such as new signage. This is estimated to be in the region of £15k and would be funded by the Council's Corporate Transformation budget.
- 4.3 It may also be possible that some repairs and maintenance costs could be incurred on the current buildings before the new build is ready, particularly given the scale of the estimated backlog maintenance cost. Any works identified would need to be assessed against the Major Improvements Programme's criteria and prioritised accordingly.
- 4.4 Eventually, the intention is that the new school would move to a new building located on the site of the current Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. It is estimated that the capital cost of this (excluding optimism bias, risk, client costs and fees) would be £16m at today's prices, however this would be reviewed and updated as the design process moves forward.
- 4.5 The move to one new building would result in estimated revenue savings in delegated funding amounting to £107.3k per annum (after taking account of the estimated increase in business rates of £14.0k). In addition, there may be some minimal savings for catering functions. It is currently projected that there would be no additional transport costs as the new building is located less than 1 mile from the existing Treowen school building. The school itself is also anticipated to realise savings to its budget as they will be able to pool resources as well as put more cost-effective class structures and a single leadership team in place, however it is expected utility costs would increase by approximately £20.0k for the new school.
- 4.6 The Scheme for Financing Schools also states the following in section 3.7.2:

'In order to ensure effective stewardship of the resources available to schools, the Authority may impose additional restrictions on a school scheduled to close, including but not limited to:

- Restriction of expenditure to agreed plans
- Removal of powers of virement'

The Council will consider the use of these powers of intervention where appropriate.

- 4.7 Implementation of the proposal would require involvement from various service areas, including staff from the Schools Service, Finance, HR and ICT. These service areas will be kept informed of the development of the proposal throughout the statutory process.
- 4.8 The Director of Corporate Services (Section 151 Officer) notes the contents of this report and supports the recommendation.

5. Legal implications

- 5.1 Legal: The recommendations can be supported from a legal point of view.
- 5.2 The Head of Legal Services and the Monitoring Officer has commented as follows: I note the legal view and support the recommendations.

6. Climate Change & Nature Implications

- 6.1 Powys County Council has declared a nature emergency which commits the authority to protecting our biodiversity and landscape. The new building has been located on the existing school playing field to minimise disturbance to valuable habitat located at the fringes of the site, and the school's landscaping will be designed to develop a forest school ethos. We recognise the importance of the mature trees to learners who have grown up and appreciated the very special landscape on this site and request care is taken by construction workers.
- 6.2 Implementation of the proposal would lead to the creation of a new-build primary school in Newtown. The new school building would be built to achieve net-zero carbon emissions in operation, with extensive use made of renewable technologies such as photovoltaics and battery storage coupled with low tariff supply, to support a fabric-first Passivhaus approach. The construction's embodied energy will also be designed to fall below 600kg CO₂e/m² to meet Welsh Government standards for net zero.
- 6.2 The building will be designed to optimise natural daylighting and will be fitted with energy saving LED lighting, as well as mechanical ventilation and heat recovery to provide excellent internal conditions, while reducing energy demand.
- 6.3 The new school will be designed to achieve BREEAM 'Excellent', which is a holistic sustainability standard required as a condition of funding. Within this methodology additional credits will be sought for the extension of habitat and species.
- 6.4 The location of the new building has been located on the existing school playing field to minimise disturbance to valuable habitat located

- at the fringes of the site, and the school's landscaping will be designed to develop a forest school ethos.
- 6.5 Implementation of the proposal would require additional travel for pupils currently attending Treowen C.P. School, however the distance from Treowen C.P. School to the Calon y Dderwen site is minimal, however the Treowen estate is located up a hill.
- 6.6 Whilst it is unlikely that pupils currently attending Treowen C.P. School would be eligible for home to school transport, it is possible that the change in location would result in pupils being transported in cars from the Treowen estate to the new site. However, some pupils currently attend Treowen C.P. School from other areas of Newtown, and are already transported to school by car.
- 6.7 Active travel would be considered when developing the new school building, and the aim would be to ensure the provision of active travel routes to minimise the use of cars for pupils living in Treowen accessing the new school building.

8. Comment from local member(s)

Cllr. Peter Lewington:

- 1.As a councillor for a neighbouring ward in Newtown I really do believe that we should have an overall plan for education in Newtown rather than what appears to be a piecemeal approach. It must be joined up and address all the issues we face at a town level such as equality of provision, available places, quality of buildings, transportation links etc
- 2.it can't be right for a strength of the proposed merger to be that learners would benefit from an improved learning environment and a more efficient model of education— that implies hat other pupils in Newtown will be disadvantaged and if so, what will be done to address that we can't have a two tier education provision.
- 3.It states that a weakness is that pupils from Maesyrhandir will not receive the benefits of a new modern learning environment surely that will apply to all the other Newtown schools and pupils. What is the plan to achieve equality of provision?
- 4.Is there a plan B to address the uncertainty of what would happen if the wellbeing campus does not go-ahead e.g.Welsh Governmanet funding not secured

5.I firmly believe that the best way out of depravation is a good education and that this is best delivered in the area of deprivation rather than ripping the heart out of the community against their wishes. Treowen school will lose its unique identity and its education provision would no longer be linked to the community.

In light of the above comments, I would ask cabinet to look again at this proposal and to be absolutely certain that this is the best outcome for the pupils, staff, schools, and Newtown as a whole in terms of improving educational standards across the community.

Cllr Joy Jones:

It is very disappointing that the consultation has resulted in bringing this result forward.

There are a lot of families very upset by the thought of the closure of the school. Many families have made their voices known of their disappointment and upset regarding losing the school which is central to the community and the estate.

With all the development and future of the town this appears very short sighted as there will be need for more school spaces not less. By restricting the amount of places available in Newtown there will be an effect of future plans for development and growth of the town and the estate

Please consider that there are many families that don't like large schools and want to bring their child up in a smaller environment. Not only do some children have issues being in a large, highly populated school but there are many parents who can't face being around a lot of people and the amount of noise that comes with a lot of children and adults in one place.

Please consider not only the importance of the school but the estate having an empty building left in the centre of this estate. The school is the hub for Treowen estate and is used by many in the Community and is an important meeting point.

Many families take their children there as they know that the quality of education is excellent.

The school is short of a headteacher, sadly this came about due to the former head leaving due to ill health and the PCC telling the governors not to employ another as they obviously had this closure in the pipeline.

The estate is up on a hill and for children to walk to the new school they will have to cross main, very dangerously busy, roads. All children will have to be accompanied to the new school unlike on the estate, where children are able to access school safely without crossing any

main road. The estate road has a zebra crossing and there is a lollypop person who helps them across if their parent is unable to be there. There will be children who will miss school if they cannot be accompanied due to parents being ill, siblings being ill, or if the road is not gritted in bad weather as the road is up on the hill and is steep and slippery. It is extremely slippery to walk due to how steep it is and parents are telling me they won't be taking their children.

Please do not devastate this estate and close community. Please listen to the parents and the voice of the people. Keep Treowen school open.

9. Impact Assessment

- 9.1 An initial impact assessment was considered by Cabinet on the 24th of October 2023.
- 9.2 In addition, a range of draft impact assessments were produced as part of the consultation documentation. These included an Integrated Impact Assessment, an Equalities Impact Assessment, and a Community Impact Assessment.
- 9.3 These draft impact assessments have been updated to reflect issues raised during the consultation period, and are attached in Appendix D.
- 9.4 The Overall Summary from the Impact Assessment is as follows:

'This impact assessment suggests that the impact is generally positive with some negative aspects, such as the requirement for some pupils to travel further than they currently do to school, and loss of provision in Treowen. Whilst the intention is to close Treowen C.P. School and initially extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the current Treowen site, the intention is that the school would move to a new building. This would provide much improved buildings and facilities for pupils compared with the current poor condition buildings, ensuring that future pupils would be taught in facilities that are fit-for-purpose, improving their learner entitlement and experience. The new facilities would be fully DDA compliant, supporting learners with disabilities.'

10. Recommendation

- i) To receive the Consultation Report in respect of the proposal for Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School.
- ii) To approve the publication of a statutory notice proposing the following:

Phase 1:

 To close Treowen C.P. School from 31 August 2025 and extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the former Treowen C.P. School site from 1st September 2025.

Phase 2:

 Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to move to a new building located on the existing Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site during 2026/27, and the Treowen site closes.

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

Phase 2: Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to move to a new building located on the existing Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site during 2026/27, and the Treowen site closes.

4. What will happen next

Once the consultation period has ended, a consultation report will be produced which will outline the feedback received. The Council's Cabinet will consider the consultation report and will consider whether or not they wish to proceed with the proposals outlined in the consultation document. This is expected to happen in the spring 2024.

If the Cabinet decide to proceed with the proposals, a statutory notice would be published, and there would be a period of 28 days for people to submit objections. The Cabinet would then need to consider another report summarising any objections received and decide whether or not to proceed with implementation.

PART A - THE CASE FOR CHANGE

Powys County Council is consulting on proposals for Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School. The proposals are as follows:

Phase 1: Close Treowen C.P. School from 31 August 2025 and extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the former Treowen C.P. School site from 1 September 2025

Phase 2: Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to move to a new building located on the existing Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site during 2026/27, and the Treowen site closes.

1. BACKGROUND

Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School are English-medium primary schools located in the town of Newtown, in North Powys. Ysgol Calon y Dderwen was established in September 2021 following the amalgamation of Ladywell Green Infants School and Hafren Junior School, and currently operates from the buildings of the two previous schools.

The following map shows the location of the two schools and other primary schools in Newtown:



Key: Blue – Ysgol Calon y Dderwen, Red – Treowen C.P. School, Yellow – Ysgol Dafydd Llwyd, Brown – Maesyrhandir C.P. School, Purple – St Mary's RC School, Green – Penygloddfa C.P. School, Black – Newtown High School.

Whilst Ysgol Calon y Dderwen was established in the existing Ladywell Green and Hafren buildings, the intention was that eventually a replacement building would be provided on the site, to be co-located with the new Health and Well-being Campus being developed as part of the North Powys Well-being Programme.

Since the establishment of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen, the Council has been developing plans for the new school building. A Strategic Outline Case (SOC) has been developed and approved by the Council's Cabinet and Welsh Government and plans for the new building had been developed to the end of RIBA Stage 2.

Following consideration of these plans by the Council's Cabinet, officers were asked to consider whether it would be possible to increase the size of the planned

new building, to accommodate more pupils, potentially the pupils currently attending Maesyrhandir C.P. School and Treowen C.P. School as well as Ysgol Calon y Dderwen pupils.

An initial review of the plans by Property Design Services suggested that this might be possible, and officers were subsequently asked to carry out a period of engagement with the three school communities to further investigate this.

In early June 2023, the Cabinet Member for a Learning Powys, Cllr Pete Roberts wrote to parents, staff and governors at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen, Maesyrhandir C.P. School and Treowen C.P. School to let them know of the Council's possible plan to expand the new build to accommodate pupils at other schools in Newtown. As part of this, meetings were held with staff and governors at the three schools, and an engagement questionnaire was launched for parents and the wider community. A summary of the findings of the engagement exercise are provided in a separate Engagement Report.

The engagement exercise identified a number of concerns about the possible plan to bring these together. These included:

- Concern about the impact of pupils attending a larger school
- Concern about traffic and parking
- Concern about the impact on staff
- Concern about loss of community identity and facilities
- Concern about land and facilities for the replacement building
- Concern about location and access to the new building
- Suggestions that smaller schools are preferred
- Concern around wellbeing, bullying and behavioural issues
- Concern around loss of parental choice
- Concern around the impact on pupils with ALN

Respondents were asked to outline any specific local issues which the Council would need to consider when exploring the idea further. The following is a summary of the comments received:

- Traffic and parking in the Park Street area of Newtown
- Impact on pupils and learning around class sizes
- Impact on communities and families
- Concerns around the North Powys Wellbeing Programme
- Size of the new school
- Accessibility and transport from Treowen and Maesyrhandir

Since the engagement exercise was carried out, the Council has carried out an options appraisal exercise to identify a preferred option for the three schools. The feedback received during the engagement was taken into consideration when undertaking the options appraisal exercise.

The following steps have been undertaken:

- Options appraisal exercise
- Recommendation considered and agreed by the Transforming Education Programme Board
- Recommendation considered and agreed by Cabinet

On the 24th October 2023, the Cabinet considered the options appraisal and engagement report, and agreed to commence consultation on the following proposals for Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School:

'Phase 1: Close Treowen C.P. School from 31 August 2025 and extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the former Treowen C.P. School site from 1 September 2025

Phase 2: Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to move to a new building located on the existing Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site during 2026/27, and the Treowen site closes.'

2. WHY CHANGE IS NEEDED IN POWYS

Powys is a large, rural authority. Covering a quarter of the landmass of Wales, it contains only 4.2% of the population, making it the most sparsely populated county in Wales. Delivering services across such a large, sparsely populated area is challenging and expensive.

The Council's new Strategy for Transforming Education in Powys outlines a number of challenges facing education in Powys, which were identified following engagement with key stakeholders during the autumn term 2019 and spring term 2020.

The following is a summary of the main challenges facing the Council:

i) High proportion of small schools

Based on PLASC 2021 figures, there were 33 small primary schools in Powys – this is approximately 43% of the primary provision in the county. 21 schools had fewer than 50 pupils, and for those schools the budget share per pupil is generally higher than the Powys average for primary schools.

ii) Decreasing pupil numbers

Pupil numbers have decreased over the past decade, and are expected to decrease further over the next five years. Pupil numbers in the primary sector in Powys are expected to decrease by approximately 5% by 2026.

iii) High number of surplus places

Based on PLASC 2021 figures, there was 14% surplus capacity in Powys primary schools. With pupil numbers across Powys projected to decrease overall over the coming years, the proportion of surplus places across the county will continue to increase.

iv) Building condition

Whilst the Council has invested in its school's estate through the 21st Century Schools Programme and the Asset Management Plan, building condition remains an issue across Powys, with associated maintenance costs.

v) Financial pressures

The Council is currently facing significant financial pressures in general. This is affecting all service areas, including the schools' sector. There are significant variations in the budget share per pupil across Powys schools, ranging from £3,512 to £11,689 in the primary sector in 2022-23.

vi) Inequality in access to Welsh-medium education

In contrast to other areas of Wales, there has been no growth in Welshmedium pupil numbers in Powys over recent years. Significant changes are needed to the Welsh-medium offer in Powys to reverse the trend of the last few years and ensure that all Powys learners can access comprehensive Welsh-medium provision throughout their educational careers.

vii) Limited post-14 and post-16 offer

In September 2019, the Council's Cabinet considered a report on post-16 provision, which outlined a number of challenges facing the sector, including decreasing learner numbers, financial challenges and sustainability of the curriculum offer, including Welsh-medium provision.

viii) Inequality in access to SEN provision

Within Powys, pupils with special education needs (SEN) attend a range of settings, including special schools, specialist centres, the pupil referral unit (PRU) as well as mainstream schools.

Currently, not all pupils are educated in the setting that meets their needs best, and depending on where pupils live, they have access to a different quality and type of provision.

ix) Historical lack of political decision making

The Council's failure to implement a number of high-profile proposals in the last few years left a legacy in Powys.

3. THE STRATEGIC CONTEXT

In the summer of 2019, Powys Education Services were inspected by Estyn. The report published by Estyn following the inspection outlined significant concerns regarding the Council's progress on school reorganisation, and includes a recommendation to 'Ensure that the organisation of provision for non-maintained, post-16, Welsh-medium education and secondary education meets the needs of children and young people of Powys.'

Following the publication of the inspection report, the Council carried out a strategic review of schools during 2019-20, which led to the development of a new Strategy for Transforming Education in Powys. The strategy, which was developed following engagement with a wide range of stakeholders, was approved in April 2020, and was updated and relaunched in July 2022.

The strategy sets out a Vision Statement and Guiding Principles which will underpin the Council's work to transform the Powys education system over the coming years.

The Vision Statement is as follows:

All children and young people in Powys will experience a high-quality, inspiring education to help develop the knowledge, skills and attributes that will enable them to become healthy, personally fulfilled, economically productive, socially responsible and globally engaged citizens of 21st century Wales.

In order to achieve the vision and guiding principles, the strategy outlines a number of aims and objectives to transform the Powys education system over the next few years, in order to provide the best possible opportunities to Powys learners now and in the future. One of these aims is to 'improve learner entitlement and experience' and this aim includes an objective to 'rationalise primary provision'.

The strategy also includes an Enabling Action which includes a commitment to capital investment in Powys schools, as outlined below:

'E.A.1 – The implementation of a major capital investment programme that will ensure that schools in Powys have inspiring, environmentally sustainable buildings that can provide opportunities for wider community activity, including where possible childcare services, early years, ALN, multi-agency support and community and leisure facilities. This will also include developing a reliable, high quality digital infrastructure.'

The current proposals for Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School are in line with these priorities.

4. WHY CHANGE IS NEEDED IN NEWTOWN

As work on the designs for the planned replacement building for Ysgol Calon y Dderwen moved forward, officers were asked to consider whether it would be possible to increase the size of the planned new building, to accommodate more pupils, potentially the pupils currently attending Maesyrhandir C.P. School and Treowen C.P. School as well as Ysgol Calon y Dderwen pupils.

The reasons for this were as follows:

i) Decrease in pupil numbers

As shown in the table below, total pupil numbers at the three schools have decreased from 626 in 2017 to 462 in 2023. This is a decrease of 164 pupils.

The projections, which are shown below, suggest that pupil numbers, whilst remaining steady at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen, are projected to continue to decrease significantly at Treowen C.P. School and Maesyrhandir C.P. School⁴.

The projections also indicate that both Treowen C.P. School and Maesyrhandir C.P. School will fall below the Welsh Government definition of a small school of less than 91 pupils in the future.

ii) Increase in surplus places

Currently the three schools combined have a surplus capacity of 273 pupils, or 37.5%. This is much higher than the current 21% of surplus places in primary schools across Powys.

As pupil numbers in the three schools are set to fall, significantly in Treowen C.P. School and Maesyrhandir C.P. School, these surplus places will increase. By 2028, according to the projections, surplus places could be 350 places or 48.1% based on the current configuration of schools.

iii) Building condition

There are issues with building condition in the three schools, in particular the former Ladywell Green Infants building of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen which has been assessed as Condition C/D.

5. OPTIONS CONSIDERED

The following options were identified for Ysgol Calon y Dderwen, Treowen C.P. School and Maesyrhandir C.P. School to address the challenges identified above:

Option	Description
1	New build for Ysgol Calon y Dderwen, other schools to remain as they are
2	New build for Ysgol Calon y Dderwen with increased capacity, the closure of Maesyrhandir C.P. School and Treowen C.P. School with pupils attending the new build at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen
3	New build for Ysgol Calon y Dderwen with increased capacity, the closure of Maesyrhandir C.P. School with pupils attending the new build at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen
4	New build for Ysgol Calon y Dderwen with increased capacity, the closure of Treowen C.P. School with pupils attending the new build at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen

SWOT analyses have been carried out for each of these options. In addition, the options have been assessed against a number of Critical Success Factors. These can be found in Appendix B of this document.

Based on the SWOT analyses and the assessment against the Critical Success Factors, the preferred option for the schools is as follows:

Option 4: New build for Ysgol Calon y Dderwen with increased capacity, the closure of Treowen C.P. School with pupils attending the new build at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen

The reasons for this are:

- Provides the opportunity for all learners at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen to benefit from the capital investment in a new building
- Improved building condition for the two schools
- Would eventually enable all pupils to be taught in one building
- Removal of backlog maintenance at the existing school sites
- The new building would fully meet the requirements of the Equality Act 2010
- New building would be meet Welsh Government net zero requirements
- Potential financial saving
- Would enable the schools to be run more efficiently through shared staffing, shared resources etc
- Additional services could be provided in a larger school
- Reduction in surplus places in Newtown

 This Would retain enough capacity to accommodate any growth in pupil numbers in Newtown in the future

6. IMPLEMENTATION OPTIONS

Having identified a preferred option, a number of possible implementation options were identified to take this option forward.

These are as follows:

Option 4A	 Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School continue to operate as separate schools until the new building is constructed. When the new building opens, Treowen C.P. School closes, and pupils transfer to the new building at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen along with Calon y Dderwen pupils.
Option 4B	 Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School continue to operate as separate schools until the new building is constructed. When the new building opens on the Calon y Dderwen site, a new primary school is established in the new building by merging Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School.
Option 4C	 From September 2025, Ysgol Calon y Dderwen is extended to include the current Treowen C.P. School building. Treowen pupils would continue to attend the Treowen site, however the school would be part of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. Treowen C.P. School would close. When the new building opens, all pupils move to the new building on the Calon y Dderwen site. The Treowen site would close.
Option 4D	 From September 2025, a new primary school is established by merging Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School. The school initially operates from the current Calon y Dderwen and Treowen buildings. When the new building opens, all pupils move to the new building on the Calon y Dderwen site. The Treowen site would close.
Option 4E	 From September 2025, Treowen C.P. School closes and pupils transfer to Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. Pupils continue to occupy current Ysgol Calon y Dderwen buildings until the new building is ready.

SWOT analyses have also been carried out for each of these options. In addition, the options have been assessed against a number of Critical Success Factors. These can be found in Appendix C of this document.

Based on the SWOT analyses and the assessment against the Critical Success Factors, the preferred implementation option is as follows:

Option 4C:

- From September 2025, Ysgol Calon y Dderwen is extended to include the current Treowen C.P. School building. Treowen pupils would continue to attend the Treowen site, however the school would be part of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. Treowen C.P. School would close.
- When the new building opens, all pupils move to the new building on the Calon y Dderwen site. The Treowen site would close.

The reasons for this are as follows:

- Minimal impact on staff and pupils at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen who have only recently gone through a staffing restructure process during the establishment of the new school
- Would provide education in Treowen until the new building is constructed.
- Pupils would continue to attend school at the same location until the new building is constructed.
- Would enable staff expertise and good practice to be shared across both sites during the transition period.
- Would enable the school to run more efficiently during the transition period through shared staffing and resources
- Improved transition arrangements to support pupils' move from Treowen to the new building as they would already be part of the school.
- Avoids expenditure associated with establishing a new school

7. IDENTIFICATION OF PREFERRED OPTION

Based on the preferred option identified in section 5 above and the preferred implementation option identified in section 6 above, the preferred option is as follows:

New build for Ysgol Calon y Dderwen with increased capacity, the closure of Treowen C.P. School with pupils attending the new build at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen

- Treowen C.P. School closes from 31 August 2025. Ysgol Calon y Dderwen is extended to include the current Treowen C.P. School building and pupils continue to attend school in the existing Treowen building from September 2025.
- When the new building opens, the Treowen site closes and pupils then move to the new building at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen.

In order to take forward this preferred option, the Council is consulting on the following proposals for Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School:

Phase 1: Close Treowen C.P. School from 31 August 2025 and extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the former Treowen C.P. School site from 1 September 2025

Phase 2: Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to move to a new building located on the existing Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site during 2026/27, and the Treowen site closes.

The proposals are further explored in the following section. The reasons why the other options considered have not been taken forward are summarised in Appendix D of this document.

PART B - THE PROPOSALS

8. OVERVIEW

Powys County Council is consulting on proposals to close Treowen C.P. School, extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and move to a new building. The proposals are as follows:

Phase 1: Close Treowen C.P. School from 31 August 2025 and extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the former Treowen C.P. School site from 1 September 2025

Phase 2: Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to move to a new building located on the existing Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site during 2026/27, and the Treowen site closes.

9. REASONS FOR THE PROPOSALS

The Council is proposing to close Treowen C.P. School, extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and move to a new building for the following reasons:

- Provides the opportunity for all learners at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen to benefit from the capital investment in a new building
- Improved building condition for the two schools
- Would eventually enable all pupils to be taught in one building
- Removal of backlog maintenance at the existing school sites
- The new building would fully meet the requirements of the Equality Act 2010
- New building would meet Welsh Government net zero requirements
- Potential financial saving
- Would enable the schools to be run more efficiently through shared staffing, shared resources etc
- Additional services could be provided in a larger school
- Reduction in surplus places in Newtown
- Would retain enough capacity to accommodate any growth in pupil numbers in Newtown in the future
- Minimal impact on staff and pupils at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen who have only recently gone through a staffing restructure process during the establishment of the new school
- Would provide education in Treowen until the new building is constructed.
- Pupils would continue to attend school at the same location until the new building is constructed.
- Would enable staff expertise and good practice to be shared across both sites during the transition period.
- Would enable the school to run more efficiently during the transition period through shared staffing and resources
- Improved transition arrangements to support pupils' move from Treowen to the new building as they would already be part of the school.
- Avoids expenditure associated with establishing a new school

10. ADVANTAGES AND DISADVANTAGES

The advantages and disadvantages of the current proposals to close Treowen C.P. School, extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and move to a new building are summarised below:

11. RISKS

As with all school reorganisation proposals, there are some risks associated with the proposals to close Treowen C.P. School, extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and move to a new building.

PART C - LIKELY IMPACT OF THE PROPOSALS

12. IMPACT ON PUPILS

i) Pupils currently attending Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School

Implementation of Phase 1 of the proposals would see the continuation of English-medium primary provision on the current sites of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School. It is anticipated that the impact on pupils attending the two schools would be minimal during this phase, however it is possible that there could be a greater impact on pupils currently attending Treowen C.P. School as they would be part of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. This may mean some staffing changes, however it is not anticipated that this would have a negative impact on pupils. Pupils would continue to attend school at their current location, so there would be no additional travel to school.

During this phase, there would be improved opportunities for pupils in all key stages to benefit from staff specialisms. There would also be improved opportunities for more able and talented pupils.

Eventually, the intention is that the new school moves to a new building located on the site of current Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. This would mean that all pupils would transfer to the new site. The new building would provide significantly improved accommodation compared with the current accommodation of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School, which would have a positive impact on pupils. However, for pupils currently attending Treowen C.P. School, the move to a new building would require additional travel. Whilst the distance to the site of the new building would be less than a mile, it is acknowledged that Treowen is located up a steep hill, which could make it more difficult for pupils and their families to walk to and from the new site.

There would also be opportunities to provide more activities for pupils during this phase, as all pupils would be attending the same building.

ii) Pupils attending other schools in Newtown catchment

It is not anticipated that implementation of the proposals would impact on any pupils attending any other schools in the Newtown catchment. Whilst it is possible that some pupils may choose to attend alternative schools instead of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen or Treowen C.P. School, which could result in an increase in pupil numbers at these schools, it is not anticipated that the numbers would be large enough to have an impact on these schools.

iii) Pupils attending other schools not in the Newtown catchment

It is not anticipated that implementation of the proposals would impact on any pupils attending any other schools in the Newtown catchment. Whilst it is possible that some pupils may choose to attend alternative schools instead of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen or Treowen C.P. School, which could result in an increase in pupil numbers at these schools, it is not anticipated that the numbers would be large enough to have an impact on these schools.

13. IMPACT ON STAFF

Should the proposals be implemented, Treowen C.P. School would close, and a Ysgol Calon y Dderwen would be extended to include the former Treowen site.

The Council would work with the headteacher and governing body of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen on an expanded staffing structure, which would enable the school to operate from the Treowen site in addition to its current site during Phase 1. This would be in accordance with the relevant HR policies for teaching and support staff. As part of this process, there would be an opportunity for the governing body to 'ringfence' all teaching and associated staff posts to staff currently employed within Treowen C.P. School in the first instance.

It is possible that further changes to the staffing arrangements would be needed when the school moves to a new building during Phase 2. Any such changes would be carried out by the headteacher and governing body of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen in accordance with the relevant HR policies for teaching and support staff.

Should the proposals be implemented, all cleaning and catering staff that are currently employed centrally by the Council would be supported by the relevant HR policies for Council employees.

14. IMPACT ON NURSERY / EARLY YEARS PROVISION

In September 2017, the Council changed the age of admission to primary schools in Powys from "at the start of the term in which they attain their fourth birthday" to "at the start of the school year following his/her fourth birthday". Following this change, there are no nursery aged pupils attending Ysgol Calon y Dderwen or Treowen C.P. School.

However, ten hours of funded early years education provision is available on the sites of both Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School. Information about this provision is provided below:

Derw Bach

Derw Bach is a non-maintained community run setting which operates from the site of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. They also provide the Childcare Offer for Wales. There are 32 places available at this provider which are currently sufficient to meet the need for early years education in the area.

Treowen 3+

Treowen 3+ is a non-maintained school run setting which operates from the site of Treowen C.P. School. There are 20 places available at this provider which is currently sufficient to meet the needs for early years education in the area.

During Phase 1 of the proposals, Treowen C.P. School would close and Ysgol Calon y Dderwen would be extended to include the current site of Treowen C.P. School. During Phase 1, the expectation is that funded early years education would continue to be available on both sites, however consideration would need to be given to the management arrangements of the provision at Treowen, as the setting is currently run by Treowen C.P. School, which would no longer exist.

Eventually, the intention is that the school moves to a new building located on the site of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. Accommodation to provide funded early years education would be provided in the new building. The demand for places in the area will be reviewed as the proposal moves forward, to ensure that sufficient places are provided to accommodate demand.

Should all provision move to the new building, this would mean that funded early years education would no longer be available at Treowen, and families currently living in Treowen who access this provision at Treowen C.P. School would need to travel further to access this provision.

Parents would also be able to access other providers in Newtown, however due to recent changes in provision in the town, there is currently some pressure on places. Demand for places in the area will be reviewed as the proposal moves forward, to ensure that sufficient places are provided to accommodate demand.

15. NEED FOR PLACES AND IMPACT ON AVAILABILITY OF PLACES AND ACCESSIBILITY OF SCHOOLS

i) Will the alternative provision have sufficient capacity and provide accommodation of at least equivalent quality for existing and projected pupil numbers?

The intention is to initially extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the site currently occupied by Treowen C.P. School.

The following table provides information on the number of spaces available and building condition of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School:

This information shows that there is enough capacity within the existing Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School to accommodate existing and projected pupil numbers at the two schools. The accommodation would be at least equivalent quality for current pupils until the new building is constructed.

The new building is expected to be built for 360 pupils, which would be sufficient to hold all the current and projected pupils and would provide access to accommodation which is of improved quality compared with the current accommodation.

Alternative English-medium provision is also available at a number of other schools in Newtown. The following table provides information on the number of spaces available and the building condition of these schools:

ii) Is the alternative provision sufficient to meet existing and projected demand for schools of the same language category and designated religious character?

Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School are both community primary schools. The proposal is to extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen, which would provide continued access to community primary provision for pupils currently attending these schools. As indicated above, there are sufficient places at the current Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen buildings to accommodate current and projected pupil numbers at these two schools.

The new building is expected to be built for 360 pupils, which would be sufficient to hold all the current and projected pupils at these two schools, ensuring continued access to community primary provision for these pupils.

Additional English-medium C.P. provision is also available at other providers in Newtown, such as Maesyrhandir C.P. School and Penygloddfa C.P. School.

iii) What will be the nature of journeys to alternative provision and resulting journey times for pupils including SEN pupils?

Initially, the intention is to extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the current site of Treowen C.P. School. During this phase, pupils currently attending school on the Treowen site would continue to attend the same location, so there would be no change in terms of the nature of journeys and journey times for pupils during this phase.

Eventually, the intention is that the school moves to a new building located on the site of the current Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. This would result in additional travel for pupils for whom Treowen C.P. School is currently the closest school. The Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site is approximately 0.8 miles from Treowen C.P. School, therefore whilst there would be additional travel time for all pupils for whom Treowen C.P. School is currently the closest school, including SEN pupils, this would be minimal.

In respect of primary provision, the nearest alternative English-medium provision to Treowen C.P. School would be as follows:

The travel times above are the approximate travel times from Treowen C.P. School to the alternative schools, however the distance from individual pupils' homes to alternative schools would be different. Analysis has shown that the distances and travel times to alternative English-medium provision would not be in excess of 45 minutes for primary pupils.

The travel times above are the approximate travel times from Treowen C.P. School to the alternative schools, however the distance from individual pupils' homes to alternative schools would be different. The distances and travel times to alternative English-medium provision would not be in excess of 45 minutes for pupils.

It is also acknowledged that Treowen C.P. School is located up a hill, which could mean that it would be less convenient for families from the Treowen estate to get to school following the move to the new building, however the additional distance is not considered to be excessive and should not have a significant impact on the accessibility of the provision. The Council's view is that this should not have an effect on pupils' engagement with and attendance at school.

Should the proposals be implemented, the existing Treowen site would become part of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen, therefore during Phase 1, walking / cycling routes to school would be the same as the current walking / cycling routes to Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School.

Eventually, the intention is that the school would move to a new building located on the site of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen, Park Street, Newtown, SY16 1EG. Active travel is a key consideration when developing new school buildings, therefore every effort would be made to encourage walking / cycling to school when developing the new building.

As the proposed site for the new building is currently a school site, there are already good active travel links between the site and the town centre. There has also been some development of active travel routes on the Treowen estate recently, with the construction of a path which runs from Kerry Road to the school and continues to Bethshan Nursing Home. However it is acknowledged that further development is needed of routes from the Treowen estate to the town centre. Several potential future routes have been identified to better connect this area to the town centre, which would be considered as part of the process of developing the new building, to ensure that there would be safe routes in place to enable pupils from the Treowen estate to access the new site.

iv) Is there evidence of current or future need/demand in the area for additional places?

The latest pupil projection figures⁷ for Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School suggest that pupil numbers at both schools are not expected to increase over the coming years. This is in-line with the general trend in terms of pupil numbers in Newtown.

iv) Will the proposals improve access for disabled pupils in accordance with requirements under the Equality Act 2010?

The intention is to extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the Treowen site in their existing accommodation initially. Pupils currently attending the Treowen site would continue to attend the same location during this period, so there would be no change in terms of access for disabled pupils during this phase.

Eventually, the intention is that the new school moves to a new building located on the site of the current Ysgol Calon y Dderwen, which would be built to meet the requirements of the Equality Act. This would provide improved access for disabled pupils compared with the provision currently at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School.

16. IMPACT ON GOVERNANCE ARRANGEMENTS

Implementation of the proposals would result in the closure of Treowen C.P. School and the extension of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to current Treowen site. This would mean that Ysgol Calon y Dderwen's current governing body would become responsible for the Treowen site in addition to the Calon y Dderwen site.

The governing body of Treowen C.P. School would be dissolved. There would be opportunities for representatives of the Treowen site to be appointed to the governing body if there were any vacancies.

The governing body of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen may also decide to add additional governors in line with the Government of Maintained Schools (Wales) Regulations 2005.

17. IMPACT ON QUALITY AND STANDARDS IN EDUCATION

i) Likely impact on standards and progress overall, of specific groups and in skills

Standards of education and progress at both schools are currently good. The Council would expect the preferred option to further strengthen the current standards.

This would also apply in respect of pupils belonging to specific groups, such as pupils eligible for Free School Meals, pupils for whom English is an Additional Language, Looked after Children and pupils with Additional Learning Needs.

It is anticipated that extending Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the current Treowen site would have a positive impact on the skills of all pupils, including literacy, numeracy and ICT, through improved opportunities to share staff expertise and resources across the school, and through improved ability to monitor pupil progress in these aspects.

Whilst some benefits would be realised immediately following establishment of the new school, these would be further enhanced following a move to one new building in the future.

ii) Wellbeing and attitudes to learning

Wellbeing and attitudes to learning are currently good in both schools. Extending Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the current Treowen site would provide an opportunity to strengthen these further. It is anticipated that this would have a positive impact, particularly with regard to pupils' emotional health.

In the short term, it is possible that there would be an impact on pupil wellbeing during transition to the new operating model, however the expectation is that Ysgol Calon y Dderwen would work with Treowen C.P. School to support transition to the new operating model from September 2025, to minimise any negative impact. Pupils currently attending Treowen C.P. School would continue to attend the same location during the transition period, and it is likely that they would continue to be taught by the same staff.

In the longer term, the intention is that the new school would move to a new building located on the current Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site. It is possible that there would also be an impact on pupil wellbeing during the transition to the new building, including pupils who were previously attending the Treowen site, as they would need to travel further to school. However, all pupils would be attending a brand new building, which would provide significantly improved accommodation compared with the current accommodation of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School, which should have a positive impact on pupil wellbeing and attitudes to learning.

iii) Teaching and learning experiences

Quality of teaching

Quality of teaching is currently good in both schools. It is anticipated that extending Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the Treowen site would provide an opportunity to enhance this, by providing flexibility to share good practice and teaching experiences, resulting in positive benefits for staff and pupils.

Being part of a larger primary school with a larger pool of teaching staff would also lead to enhanced opportunities for pupils currently attending Treowen C.P. School.

Whilst some benefits would be realised immediately following the extension of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the Treowen site, these would be further enhanced following a move to one new building in the future.

The breadth, balance and appropriateness of the curriculum

Extending Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the Treowen site would provide the opportunity to further strengthen the curriculum offered to pupils. The school would be better placed to develop provision which meets the requirements of the new curriculum for all pupils.

Whilst some benefits would be realised immediately, these would be further enhanced following a move to one new building in the future.

The provision of skills

The provision of skills is good in both schools now, however, extending Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the Treowen site would provide an opportunity to strengthen this.

Whilst some benefits would be realised immediately following the extension of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the Treowen site, these would be further enhanced following a move to one new building in the future.

iv) Care, support and guidance

Tracking, monitoring and the provision of learning support, personal development and safeguarding

There are no concerns currently about these aspects at either school. Extending Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the Treowen site would provide an opportunity to further develop these aspects across the two sites. For those children that need additional support, this continuity of approach would be beneficial. This is also the case in respect of personal development and safeguarding.

In the longer term, the Council intends to invest in a new building to replace the current buildings. Whilst some benefits would be realised immediately following the extension of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the Treowen site, these would be further enhanced following a move to one new building in the future. Safeguarding arrangements would be a key consideration when planning the site, and when designing the new building, particularly given that the intention is for the new building to be part of a new well-being campus to be developed by the North Powys Well-being Programme.

v) Leadership and Management

Quality and effectiveness of leaders and managers, self evaluation processes and improvement planning

There is currently a permanent leadership team in Ysgol Calon y Dderwen, but not at Treowen C.P. School. Extending Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the Treowen site would provide an opportunity to secure permanent leadership arrangements across both sites.

The expanded Ysgol Calon y Dderwen would be a larger school and would enable increased focus on leadership. Extending Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the Treowen site would also provide enhanced opportunities to develop leadership across the school, on both sites and would provide enhanced leadership opportunities for staff, and enhanced opportunities for improvement planning across the school.

The intention is to initially extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the Treowen site. Whilst some benefits would be realised immediately following this change, it is acknowledged that operating across two sites could cause some challenges for the school's leaders during this phase.

In the longer term, the intention is for the school to move to a new building. This would enable the new school to maximise the benefits in terms of leadership and management.

Professional learning

Extending Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the Treowen site would result in a larger staff team at the school and would provide improved professional learning opportunities for staff through greater opportunities for cross phase working, opportunities to develop leaders more effectively and more opportunities to develop middle leaders across both sites. In addition, there would be improved opportunities to see the progression of learning across both sites and improve opportunities to apply the principles of the new curriculum.

Whilst it is expected that some improvements in professional learning opportunities would be realised immediately following the extension of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen, this would be further enhanced following a move to one new building in the future.

Use of Resources

Should Ysgol Calon y Dderwen be extended to include the Treowen site, the existing Treowen C.P. School would close. The school would be funded as one school, with one budget, and would be run by one headteacher, one leadership team, and one governing body. This should result in some efficiencies within the school's delegated budget through shared staffing and the ability to share of other resources.

Initially, Ysgol Calon y Dderwen would be extended to include the current Treowen site. This would mean that there would be a need to maintain all current buildings in the short term, which would not be the most efficient operating model. The school would be funded as two separate schools whilst on split sites so there would be no saving to the Council from Phase 1, however there could be some efficiencies within the school's delegated budget.

In the longer term, the intention is for the school to move to a new building which would reduce the surplus capacity that currently exists in the two schools. This would enable the new school to maximise the benefits in terms of the use of resources and deliver savings to both the school's delegated budget and the Council's budget.

vi) Impact on vulnerable groups, including children with Special Educational Needs (SEN)

Implementation of the emerging preferred option would impact on any vulnerable pupils currently attending Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School, including any pupils with ALN/SEN.

Based on January 2023 PLASC, 23.8% of pupils at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and 19.2% of pupils at Treowen C.P. School had additional learning needs.

Whilst the emerging preferred option would impact on these pupils, there is no reason to believe that their needs would not be met by the new arrangements.

Should the option be implemented, the Council would work with the schools to ensure an effective transition for any vulnerable children, including children with ALN/SEN, and their families. Pupils currently attending Treowen C.P. School would continue to attend the same location initially, and it is likely that they would continue to be taught by the same staff, which would help support their transition to the new delivery model.

The arrangements for supporting vulnerable pupils at the school would be further enhanced following the planned move to a brand new building, however it is acknowledged that there would be a change in location for pupils attending the Treowen site, which could mean that it is make it more difficult for them to access school.

vii) Ability of the school/schools which are the subject of the proposals to deliver the full curriculum at the foundation phase and each key stage of education, including the quality of curriculum delivery and the extent to which the structure or size of the school is impacting on this

Extending Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the Treowen site would enable the provision of a full curriculum to pupils across the primary age range.

Initially, the Ysgol Calon y Dderwen would be extended to include the existing Treowen C.P. School site. Whilst one headteacher and governing body would be responsible for all through sites during this period, the full curriculum would continue to be provided to pupils in the foundation phase and key stage 2 on both sites. The provision available for pupils would be at least equivalent to the current provision, and there would be additional opportunities to provide enhanced opportunities to pupils across all three sites through shared staffing and the opportunity to hold all-school activities.

Eventually, the intention is that the new school moves to a new building located on the site of the current Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. This would provide enhanced opportunities to offer a full curriculum to all pupils across the primary age range in brand new facilities.

18. RESOURCING OF EDUCATION AND OTHER FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

i) What effect will the proposals have on surplus places in the area?

The proposal is to initially extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the Treowen site, therefore there would be no impact on surplus places in the area during this phase.

Eventually, the intention is that the new school moves to a new building located on the site of the current Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. The current intention is that the new building would be built for 360 pupils. This is a reduction of 154 compared with the current combined capacities of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School, which is 514, therefore this would lead to a reduction in surplus places in Newtown.

ii) Do the proposals form part of the local authority's 21st Century Schools Investment Programme and contribute to the delivery of sustainable schools for the 21st Century and to the better strategic management of the school estate?

Phase 1 of the proposals, to extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the Treowen site, is not dependent on Sustainable Communities for Learning funding.

Phase 2 of the proposals, to provide a replacement building, is dependent on capital funding, and is part of the local authority's Sustainable Communities for Learning (formerly 21st Century Schools) Investment Programme.

Plans to provide a new primary school in Newtown are included in the Council's Strategic Outline Programme (SOP) for Band B of the Sustainable Communities for Learning Programme. This is linked to wider plans to develop a multi-agency Health and Well-being campus in Newtown. A SOC for a new build 270 place school for Ysgol Calon y Dderwen has previously been approved by Welsh Government. However it is recognised that the current estimated costs for a 360 place school would be higher than the funding envelope approved within the SOC.

The Council will be submitting a new Strategic Outline Programme for the new Sustainable Communities for Learning rolling programme before the end of March 2024, which will include an updated cost for this project.

iii) What are the recurrent costs of proposals over a period of at least 3 years and is the necessary recurrent funding available?

The recurrent costs of this proposal would be the increased rates charges for a new build which are currently estimated to be an additional £14,000 and it is expected that utility costs would rise in the new build by an estimated £20,000. This has been included in the delegated revenue costing and is funded through savings in other areas of the formula in relation to this proposal. These costs will need to be updated as the build is developed and more information is known.

iv) Will additional transport costs be incurred as a result of the proposal?

It is not anticipated that any additional transport costs would be incurred as a result of the proposals.

During Phase 1, Ysgol Calon y Dderwen would be extended to include the Treowen site. During this phase, pupils currently attending Treowen C.P. School would continue to attend school in the same location.

During Phase 2, all pupils would move to a new building located on the site of the current Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. This means that there would be some additional travel for pupils attending the Treowen site, as they would need to travel to the new school site. However the new building would be located less than 1 mile from the existing Treowen building, so it is not anticipated that there would be any additional transport costs associated with this move.

v) What are the capital costs of the proposal and is the necessary capital funding is available?

There are no capital costs associated with the initial phase, which would see the extension of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the Treowen site.

Eventually, the intention is that the new school moves to a new building located on the site of the current Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. It is estimated that the capital cost of this (excluding optimism bias, risk, client costs and fees) would be £16m, based on current costs.

The intention is that this would be funded by the Welsh Government's Sustainable Communities for Learning Programme. Plans to provide a new primary school in Newtown are included in the Council's SOP for Band B of the Sustainable Communities for Learning Programme. As part of the business case process, a Strategic Outline Case (SOC) has been developed and approved by the Council's Cabinet and Welsh Government and plans for the new building had been developed to the end of RIBA Stage 2.

However, the original SOC was based on a 270-place school, with an estimated cost of just under £13m, based on 2020 costs. It is noted that the Council would need to submit a revised SOC if the scope of the project was to change.

The Council will be submitting a new Strategic Outline Programme for the new Sustainable Communities for Learning rolling programme before the end of March 2024, which will include an updated cost for this project.

vi) What is the scale of any projected net savings (taking into account school revenue, transport and capital costs)

The intention initially is to extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the Treowen site. No savings to the Council would be identified at this stage in terms of delegated funding, however the school would be able to combine resources and potentially reduce management costs for the school, as there would be one senior leadership team.

There would be no additional transport costs associated with this phase, however there may be some additional costs associated with extending Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the Treowen site, such as new signage. This is estimated to be in the region of £15k and would be funded from the Council's transformation budget.

Eventually, the intention is that the new school would move to a new building located on the site of the current Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. It is estimated that the capital cost of this (including optimism bias) would be £16m, however this would be reviewed and updated as the design process moves forward.

It is anticipated that the lifetime costs of the status quo option, which would include backlog maintenance would be £78.00m over a 60-year investment period. This is compared with the lifetime costs of the move to a new school building which would be £72.61m over a 60-year investment period, generating a saving of £5.39m.

The move to one new building would result in estimated revenue savings in delegated funding amounting to £108.6k per annum (after taking account of the estimated increase in business rates of £14.0k). In addition, there may be some minimal savings for catering functions. It is currently projected that there would be no additional transport costs as the new building is located less than 1 mile from the existing Treowen school building. The school itself is also anticipated to realise savings to its budget as they will be able to pool resources as well as put more cost-effective class structures and a single leadership team in place, however it is expected utility costs would increase by approximately £20.0k for the new school.

vii) Without the proposals, would the schools affected face budget deficits?

Based on the latest information held by the Council's Finance Team, Ysgol Calon y Dderwen is projecting a cumulative surplus of £61,543 in March 2024 and Treowen C.P School is projecting a cumulative surplus of £36,161 in March 2024.

Neither school is projecting a deficit position over the next 3 years but both are spending more than the funding delegated to them in-year in 2025/26. They are able to do this as they have cumulative surpluses available to them, but if this in-year position continued, then they would be likely to fall into a cumulative carry forward deficit in 2026/27.

viii) Will any savings in recurrent costs be retained in the local authority's local schools budget?

Any savings would be available for reinvestment as part of the Council's corporate budget process and any reinvestment in the schools system would

be agreed as part of the annual budget planning cycle.

ix) Will the proceeds of sales (capital receipts) of redundant sites be made available to meet the costs of the proposal or contribute to the costs of future proposals which will promote effective management of school places?

Initially there would be no redundant sites as Ysgol Calon y Dderwen would initially be extended to include the Treowen site.

Eventually, the intention is that the new school moves to a new building located on the site of the old Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. This would result in the Treowen site becoming surplus. The Council would need to consider what to do with this site in the future. This would initially be considered through the Council's Strategic Asset Board.

Should the site be declared surplus, the Council would hope to realise a capital receipt for the site. Any capital receipts received would be reinvested into the Transforming Education programme in order to improve the educational provision across Powys.

19. OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

i) Impact on educational attainment among children from economically deprived backgrounds

Implementation of the preferred option would impact on any pupils from economically deprived backgrounds currently attending Treowen C.P. School and Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. Based on PLASC figures from January 2023, 42% of pupils attending Treowen C.P. School and 36% of pupils attending Ysgol Calon y Dderwen were eligible for Free School Meals therefore it is acknowledged that the proposal would impact on some pupils from economically deprived backgrounds.

However, it is not anticipated that the extension of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the Treowen site would have a negative impact on educational attainment among children from economically deprived backgrounds. Initially, pupils currently attending Treowen C.P. School would continue to attend school in the same location, which would minimise any impact on the educational attainment among children from economically deprived backgrounds and would support their transition to the new model. They would be part of a larger school, which would have a larger pupil deprivation grant, which could be used to support pupils consistently throughout their time in primary school.

Eventually, the intention is that the new school moves to a new building located on the site of the current Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. This would mean that pupils attending the school would need to transfer to the new site. For

pupils currently attending Treowen C.P. School, this would require additional travel. However, the Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site is located less than 1 mile from the existing Treowen school building, so it is not expected that the additional travel required would impact on pupils' educational attainment.

During the engagement exercise carried out when developing this proposal, some concern was raised that moving to the Calon y Dderwen site would make it more difficult from pupils from economically deprived backgrounds to attend school as it would be located further away, and that this would impact on attendance, which could impact on their educational attainment. The Council would work with the school to prepare for the transition to the new building, to minimise any impact on attendance.

ii) Land and Buildings

Comparison of the quality of accommodation at the school from which pupils would be transferred

As the proposal is to initially close Treowen C.P. School and extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include this site, there would be no impact on the quality of accommodation for pupils.

Eventually, the intention is that the school would move to a new building located on the site of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen, which would result in new facilities, leading to a significant improvement in the quality of accommodation for pupils in the longer term.

Information on any building works necessary to ensure that transferred children can be accommodated

All current pupils can be accommodated within the current accommodation and no building work would be necessary to proceed with Phase 1 of the proposals.

Eventually, the intention is that the school would move to a new building located on the site of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. A new building would be required in order to enable this move to take place, which will provide sufficient capacity to accommodate all pupils.

Details of any potential transfer or disposal of land or buildings that may need to occur as a result of the proposals

The Treowen site would be surplus following a move to a new building and this would be disposed of in accordance with the Council's asset management policy.

Is the school / schools involved subject to any trust or charitable interests which might be affected by the proposals, for example in relation to the use or disposal of land?

Ysgol Calon y Dderwen or Treowen C.P. School are not subject to any trust or charitable interests which might be affected by the proposed option.

iii) Walking routes to school

Should the proposals be implemented, the existing Treowen site would become part of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen, therefore during Phase 1, walking / cycling routes to school would be the same as the current walking / cycling routes to Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School.

Eventually, the intention is that the school would move to a new building located on the site of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen, Park Street, Newtown, SY16 1EG. Active travel is a key consideration when developing new school buildings, therefore every effort would be made to encourage walking / cycling to school when developing the new building.

As the proposed site for the new building is currently a school site, there are already good active travel links between the site and the town centre. There has also been some development of active travel routes on the Treowen estate recently, with the construction of a path which runs from Kerry Road to the school and continues to Bethshan Nursing Home. However it is acknowledged that further development is needed of routes from the Treowen estate to the town centre. Several potential future routes have been identified to better connect this area to the town centre, which would be considered as part of the process of developing the new building, to ensure that there would be safe routes in place to enable pupils from the Treowen estate to access the new site.

iv) School Admissions

Admissions for the two schools are administered by the Council. Should the current proposals be implemented, admissions for Ysgol Calon y Dderwen would continue to be administered by the Council in accordance with the Council's Admissions Policy, which is available on-line at: https://en.powys.gov.uk/article/1158/Applying-for-a-School-Place

Should the proposals be implemented, pupils currently attending Treowen C.P. School would be allocated a place in Ysgol Calon y Dderwen.

New pupils wishing to attend the school would need to apply for a place in accordance with the Council's admissions arrangements.

v) Welsh in Education Strategic Plan (WESP)

The proposal is not directly linked to the targets in the Council's Welsh in Education Strategic Plan, and would not expand or reduce the availability of Welsh language provision.

Welsh-medium education is available in Newtown at Ysgol Dafydd Llwyd. Whilst it is possible that some pupils may choose to attend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen's new building when it opens instead of choosing Welsh-medium education, Ysgol Dafydd Llwyd is itself located in a new building provided by the 21st Century Schools Programme. As Ysgol Dafydd Llwyd is closer to Treowen than Ysgol Calon y Dderwen, it is also possible that some pupils would choose to attend Ysgol Dafydd Llwyd in the future, instead of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen.

20. SPECIFIC FACTORS IN THE CONSIDERATION OF SCHOOL CLOSURES

i) Whether the establishment of multi-site schools might be considered as a means of retaining buildings, or the reasons for not pursuing this option

A range of options have been considered in respect of Treowen C.P. School, these are outlined in section 5 of this document, as well as an assessment of each option which includes a summary of the weaknesses / threats associated with each.

The preferred option is to initially extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the Treowen C.P. School site, which would result in establishing a multi-sited school, until the new building is constructed for learners on the existing Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site.

ii) Whether alternatives to closure, such as clustering, collaboration or federation with other schools, might be considered or the reasons for not pursuing these as an alternative

Whilst the preferred option involves closing Treowen C.P. School, it does retain educational provision on the Treowen site, until such time that the new building at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen is constructed.

A range of options have been considered and these are outlined earlier in the document, as well as an assessment of each option.

Clustering, collaboration or federation have not been considered as they would not solve the key issues of surplus places and decreasing pupil numbers, nor would they provide opportunities for larger numbers of pupils to benefit from the planned capital investment in Newtown. However the status quo option indicated opportunities for the schools to work collaboratively.

iii) Whether the possibility of making fuller use of the existing buildings as a community or educational resource could be explored

The preferred option involves utilising the existing Treowen C.P. School as a site of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen until the new building is constructed. Therefore, education will be retained in Treowen until a new building is available for pupils to transfer to.

Upon transfer to the new building, the future use of the Treowen site would be considered in accordance with the Council's asset management policy. This would include exploring the possibility that the building could be used as a community resource.

iv) The overall effect of closure on the local community (including the loss of school based facilities which are used by the local community)

Implementation of the preferred option would mean that educational provision would continue to be available in Newtown for pupils that currently attend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School. Ultimately, there would be a positive impact on the community in Newtown, through the provision of a new primary school with enhanced facilities, including community facilities.

During the first phase, provision would continue on the current Treowen site, so the impact on the Treowen community would be minimal. However eventually, there would no longer be provision in Treowen. This would have a negative impact on the Treowen community and would result in the loss of primary provision on the Treowen estate, and a possible loss of any community facilities associated with the school. However, pupils would continue to be able to access education in the new building on the Calon y Dderwen site.

A community impact assessment has been carried out, which includes input from the affected schools to identify the potential impact on the community. This will be updated throughout the process to reflect any feedback received and will be considered by the Council's Cabinet as part of the decision making process.

v) How parents' and pupils' engagement with the alternative school and any facilities it may offer could be supported

Should the Council proceed with implementation of the preferred option, support would be provided to pupils and their parents as part of the transition process, thereby ensuring full engagement with Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. The nature of this support will depend on the needs of the parents/pupils, however it is likely to include whole school activities for staff, pupils and parents, school council and governing body to include representation from both sites.

21. EQUALITY AND COMMUNITY IMPACT ASSESSMENTS

Draft impact assessments have been carried out in respect of the proposals. These will be updated following the consultation period to reflect any additional issues raised. The assessments are available on the Council's website: https://en.powys.gov.uk/article/14956/Ysgol-Calon-y-Dderwen-and-Treowen-C.P.-School

A summary of the assessments are provided below:

i) Equalities impact assessment

Should the proposals be implemented, Treowen C.P. School would close and Ysgol Calon y Dderwen be extended to include the Treowen site. The school would then eventually move to a new building on the existing Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site and the Treowen site would close. All pupils currently attending Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School would be able to attend the new school. The aim of the proposals is to improve the educational opportunities available to pupils in Newtown, including any pupils belonging to the protected characteristic groups.

During the first phase of implementing the proposals, pupils would continue to attend school in their current buildings, therefore the impact on pupils belonging to protected characteristic groups would be minimal.

Eventually the intention is that the new school moves to a new building in Newtown. Whilst this would provide significant improvements to all pupils in terms of the quality of accommodation and the facilities available, this phase would have a more significant impact on pupils currently attending Treowen C.P. School, including any pupils belonging to the protected characteristic groups that attend that school, including any pupils with ALN, as some additional travel would be required in order to attend the new building. However, the additional distance from Treowen C.P. School to the proposed site of the new school is minimal.

Whilst it is acknowledged that the proposals would impact on pupils belonging to the protected characteristic groups that attend the two current schools, there is no reason to believe that the extended Ysgol Calon y Dderwen would be unable to meet the needs of pupils belonging to the protected characteristic groups that would be affected, including pupils with Additional Learning Needs, pupils belonging to Ethnic Groups other than White British, EAL pupils, pupils eligible for Free School Meals and Looked After Children.

ii) Impact on the community

Should the proposals be implemented, Ysgol Calon y Dderwen would initially be extended to include the Treowen site. During this phase, it is expected that a similar range of activities to the activities currently provided would be available to pupils. It is also possible that an increased range of activities and opportunities could be offered to pupils, through the ability to share staff expertise and the ability to offer joint activities to a larger group of pupils. Both schools also benefit from links with the community. It is expected that these would continue during Phase 1. During Phase 1, pupils would continue to attend school at the two existing sites, so no additional travel would be required. It is anticipated that the proposal's impact on the community would be minimal during Phase 1.

Eventually, the intention is that all pupils would move to one new building located on the current site of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. It is anticipated that the new building would have a range of community facilities, which would ensure that many of the activities which currently take place in the schools could continue, and could also provide the opportunity to offer new activites.

It is acknowledged, however that the move to one new building in the town centre would mean that there would be no school provision in the Treowen. This would mean that school activities would no longer take place on the Treowen estate, and could impact on links with the Treowen community. Activities that currently take place in the Treowen C.P. School building would need to find an alternative location. There is a community centre and a M.U.G.A. directly opposite the school which would continue to be available to community should there be no school in Treowen. Some of the activities that currently take place at the school could be held in the community centre.

It is also acknowledged that Phase 2 of the proposals would result in an increase in the distance to school for pupils for whom Treowen is currently their closest school. Whilst the additional distance would be minimal as the site would still be located within Newtown, it is acknowledged that Treowen is located up a hill, so it might be more difficult for parents without access to a car to access the site. Concern has also been raised about the walking route to the new school, and that pupils would have to cross a busy road.

PART D - CONSULTATION DETAILS

Who will we consult with?

The Council will consult with a range of stakeholders as required by the School Organisation Code, which include the following:

- Parents, carers and guardians at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School, and other schools which may be affected by the proposal
- Governors at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School, and other schools which may be affected by the proposal
- Staff at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School, and other schools which may be affected by the proposal
- Pupils at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School, and other schools which may be affected by the proposal
- The Church in Wales and Roman Catholic Diocesan Authorities
- The Welsh Minister for Education
- Local Powys Councillors
- Town and Community Councils in the local area
- The Member of the Senedd for Montgomeryshire and regional Members of the Senedd for the area
- The MP for Montgomeryshire
- Estyn
- Teaching and staff trade unions
- Mid Wales Partnership
- The Police & Crime Commissioner for Dyfed Powys
- Nursery providers in the local area
- Mudiad Meithrin
- The Powys Children and Young People's Partnership

Consultation with pupils will take place in accordance with the Welsh children and young people's national participation standards⁸.

The consultation period

The consultation period will commence on the 15 January and end on 26 February 2024

The statutory process

Consultation on these proposals will follow the guidelines set out by the Welsh Government in the revised School Organisation Code which became operational on the 1st November 2018. The process is summarised below:

i) Consultation

Consultation will start on the 15 January and end on 26 February 2024. Feedback from the consultation will be collated and summarised, and a consultation report will be produced and shared with stakeholders.

It is important to note that responses made to the consultation will not be counted as objections to the proposals, and that only objections can be registered following publication of a statutory notice.

The Council's Cabinet will consider the consultation report and the feedback received during the consultation period, and will decide whether to proceed with the proposals, to make changes to the proposals, or to not proceed with the proposals. If the Cabinet decides not to proceed, that will be the end of these proposals.

It is anticipated that the Consultation Report will be considered by the Cabinet in the Spring of 2024.

ii) Statutory notice

If the Cabinet decides to proceed with the proposals, a statutory notice would be published after the Cabinet meeting. There would then be a period of 28 days for people to submit written objections.

If there were objections, the Council would publish an objection report providing a summary of the objections and the Council's response to them before the end of 7 days beginning with the day of the local authority's determination. Only written objections submitted during the statutory notice period will be considered as objections and included in this report. Comments submitted as part of the consultation period would not be counted as objections. Should stakeholders wish their consultation responses to be considered as objections, they would need to be re-submitted in writing during the statutory notice period.

A further report would be presented to the Council's Cabinet, which they would consider alongside the objection report, in order to decide whether or not to approve the proposals.

It is anticipated that a final decision would be made by the end of July 2024 at the latest.

iii) Implementation

If the Council's Cabinet were to approve the proposals, it would be implemented in accordance with the date given in the statutory notice or any subsequently modified date.

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

Consultation on the proposals for Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School

1. OVERVIEW OF THE CONSULTATION

Powys County Council consulted on proposals to close Treowen C.P. School, extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and move to a new building.

The proposals are as follows:

Phase 1: Close Treowen C.P. School from 31 August 2025 and extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the former Treowen C.P. School site from 1st September 2025

Phase 2: Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to move to a new building located on the existing Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site during 2026/27, and the Treowen site closes.

The consultation took place from the 15th of January 2024 to the 26th of February 2024.

i) Consultation methods

The consultation documentation was available on the Council's website throughout the consultation period, and was distributed to stakeholders, as required by the School Organisation Code (2018). A separate version for pupils was also available on the Council's website throughout the consultation period.

Consultees were invited to respond to the consultation by either completing an online consultation form, filling in a paper copy of the form and returning it to the Transforming Education Team at County Hall, or by e-mailing / writing to the Transforming Education Team.

iv) Correspondence received prior to the consultation period

A total of 42 letters were received before the consultation period began on the 15th of January 2024. They were received after the Council had announced the findings of the engagement period carried out in the summer of 2023 and the outcome of the options appraisal exercise carried out to identify a preferred way forward for Newtown schools, but before the start of the consultation period in January 2024.

The issues raised in these letters have not been included in the 'Issues raised during the consultation period' in Section 6 as they were not submitted as part of the formal consultation process. However, the Council acknowledges their contents.

A summary of the key themes raised in the letters is included as follows:

- Concerns over the loss of Treowen C.P. School as the central part of the Treowen community.
- Comments about the quality of provision pupils receive at Treowen C.P. School.
- Expressions of frustration around the existence of the proposals; questions relating to the logic and reasoning behind the proposals.
- Concerns about the logistics of children getting to the Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site, particularly during the winter months, and about the additional journey time.
- Comments about funding for the maintenance of the existing school buildings in Newtown.
- Concern about a potential decrease in school budget following the proposed expansion of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen.
- Comments about possible increase in class sizes.
- Concerns about how the proposals will affect school staff.
- Comments about safety of pupils at the proposed new site.
- Concerns about the impact on ALN pupils.
- Comments about environmental impact of Phase 2 of the proposals.
- Comments about lack of engagement with the communities involved.
- Concerns about the impact on disabled pupils and disabled parents.
- Comments about the impact on Treowen as an area of deprivation.
- General comments not in favour of the proposals.

3. CONSULTATION WITH PUPILS

Notes from meetings held with pupils at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School are found below.

3.1 Consultation meeting with Ysgol Calon y Dderwen pupils

As part of the consultation process, council officers met with the Ysgol Calon y Dderwen Learning Council on the 5th of February 2024. The Learning Counsil is made up of 12 pupils from Years 3, 4, 5 and 6.

- We sing a lot.
- Lots of sports house athletics, cross-country, football, rugby, netball.
- Like all the space inside and outside.
- Like all the Eisteddfod events (singing, dance, arts)
- Like the Welsh learning.
- Like the teachers.
- Delicious food.

Is there anything different since the two schools became Ysgol Calon y Dderwen in 2021?

- · More children.
- Different uniform.
- New name

Is there anything you think could be better about Ysgol Calon y Dderwen?

- Would like a drama club.
- Longer break times.
- Have lunch breaks at same time [they're currently staggered].
- More arts and crafts.
- More sports days.
- More things to do with history.
- Think the buildings need to be a bit bigger.

If Ysgol Calon y Dderwen was extended to include Treowen school what would be different?

- There would be more friends to make once two schools come together on one site.
- There would have to be more classes.
- There could be different teachers.
- Treowen uniforms could change.

- Children from Trewoen might be scared about getting to know a new school.
- New site could be too far for some people to get to.
- Might be difficult to get used to new rules and subjects.
- We might have to go to the Treowen site sometimes.

Does anything worry you about this proposed change?

- Maybe Treowen children would be scared.
- Might be worried about not knowing teachers.
- Treowen children could worry that we're taking over their school.

- Why do you want us to be part of CYD?
- What would happen to the building when we move?
- Would we have a new name if we become one school?
- If we did join and went to the super school would this become a nursery?
- If more children came here we'd need more teachers to help

Is there anything you think would be good about being part of Calon Y Dderwen?

Make new friends.

What wouldn't be good?

- Impact on younger children's learning, moving to new teachers and people you don't know, they may be uncomfortable.
- Tough for the younger children, worried that it's going to be too big.
- Worried they're not going to know everyone's names.

What do you think about the idea of moving into a new building? What will be good about this?

- More chance of getting into school teams and competing.
- More fun for sports day as you'd have more to do.

- Finding your way around and finding the classrooms may be difficult.

- Late to classes in case we don't know our way around.

What do you think about walking down the hill to school?

- Road is really tight, people from Trehafren walking to Hafren the road is too small for everyone.
- Not everyone could make it to school on time as it takes longer to get to school.
- If you still want to walk, it will take longer, really tired from walking.
- Traffic if you do drive.
- More of an impact on the younger children.
- It will affect the people who can't drive or don't have cars.
- Some people don't live in Newtown, difficult for them to get there.

- A few live in Treowen, Vaynor, Barnfields and Garth Owen

What do you think we could do to help you to get to know the other pupils?

4. CONSULTATION MEETINGS WITH STAFF AND GOVERNORS

Consultation meetings were held with the staff and governors of both schools. The issues raised at these meetings are summarised below:

i) Consultation meeting with Staff of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen

- Concern about the impact of the proposals on Calon y Dderwen staff jobs, particularly following the move to a new building.
- It's unfair for staff to have to go through another period of uncertainty following the merging of Ladywell Green and Hafren schools.
- It would be better for Calon y Dderwen staff if Treowen pupils moved to Calon y Dderwen straight away.
- What would the leadership arrangements be during Phase 1?
- Currently there are more than 360 pupils in the two schools, so if the school is built for 360, it will already be over capacity.
- Is it right that we have funding for a build for a 270 place school but not for 360 pupils?
- What happens if there are more children in the future and the school isn't big enough?
- Pupil numbers at Treowen may drop because of these changes parents may choose for their children to attend other schools instead.
- How realistic is it that we will move to the new building in 2026/27?
- When will the current process end?
- What will happen with the upkeep of existing buildings until there is a new building?
- Concern about the design of the new building, the grounds / outdoor space and size of the hall
- Queries about whether the new build will be any further forward compared to the current buildings or will it be a step back?
- Do you evaluate the success of previous new buildings?
- A number of outside agencies come into the school to work with pupils and we are already struggling for space to put people.
- Are we really thinking about the children in all of this? And the impact on the children we have now, not just those for the future?
- Some pupils are likely to struggle with transition, especially ALN pupils.
 Additional support required for these pupils.

ii) Consultation meeting with Governors of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen

- Questions around the reasoning and strategy behind the proposals why have we got to this proposal? Why a Treowen and Calon y Dderwen merger, and not a Maesyrhandir and Treowen merger?
- Feeling that here is a lack of strategy behind the current proposal. It would make more sense to merge Maesyrhandir and Treowen.
- Concerns around constraints relating to the site and the new building compromises are already being made in terms of the new building.

- Concern about use of Building Bulletin 99 this is now at least 25 years old, so is it fit for purpose to meet the new education requirements that the government has set out? Further discussion around the new design standard that are due to be released by the Welsh Government in coming months.
- Concern that it would not be possible to accommodate all parents in the hall.
- Concern about job security for staff, particularly during phase 2.
- Queries about the logistics of amending the make-up of the Governing Body during Phase 1.
- Concern that a Calon y Dderwen based governing body would need to be making decisions on staffing on another site, which would be challenging.
- Pupil numbers at Treowen may decrease anyway as parents may choose for their children to go elsewhere.
- What would a typical management team look like for a school of 360?
- Need to look at the staffing structure that we have at this school today because we're not business as usual as we're operating across two sites already.
- Concern about the impact on Treowen pupils in terms of getting to school.
- Would there be a town bus route as part of this process? It could include a loop around Treowen and the town centre?
- Queries about the condition of the Maesyrhandir building and whether there would be a new building for them.
- The projected numbers for Calon y Dderwen are stable, we built that as a school. Now the proposal is to add variability to our structure, more risk of having to manage fluctuations in numbers.
- · Concern that we are losing half the site.
- If Calon y Dderwen expands to include Treowen, would we lose our surplus budget?
- Queries about the accuracy of Treowen's ALN figures they seem a little low.
- Concern about the impact on Treowen families, particularly those without cars.
- Better alignment is needed between the various things going on in Newtown.
- Queries about the cost of having an energy efficient building e.g. recladding, replacing solar panels.
- · Queries about maintenance of e.g. lifts?

iii) Consultation meeting with Staff of Treowen C.P. School

- Queries about why Maesyrhandir is not included, particularly as Treowen numbers are higher than Maesyrhandir and building condition is better.
- The report refers to the SLT situation at Treowen, but we haven't got a permanent SLT at the moment because we're in this situation.
- · Worries raised relating to staff jobs.
- Is it the same situation for us and Calon y Dderwen staff? When this was proposed, we were told that if we close, they would also close.
- Concerns that the school's identity would be unfairly lost.

- We've recently been through a redundancy process at Treowen too, this isn't reflected in the Consultation Document.
- In Phase 2, is everyone affected?
- Questions about the neutrality of decision makers.
- Queries about the design of proposed new build how will a 2-storey building work without access to outside areas?
- Do teachers input into the designs, or is it just an architect that doesn't have a clue about the new curriculum and what's needed?
- Concern about access, congestion.
- · Concern about the wording of the risk identified around impact on staff
- Queries about the impact on 3+ and early years provision
- Feeling that the school community have already filled in forms and given their views but haven't been listened to.
- The school is the community, it is the anchor for many in the community.
- Concern about the impact on pupils who struggle
- Some pupils that come here don't live on the estate they choose to come here even though it isn't their closest school.
- Suggestion that the Cabinet members should visit the school.

iv) Consultation meeting with Governors of Treowen C.P. School

- Why was Maesyrhandir taken out of the proposal?
- We wanted to advertise for a full time head, but were advised not to because of the current situation, and now you're using this against us.
- There was an issue with our ALN PLASC figures we have got more statemented pupils than was first stated.
- We have fewer surplus places than Maesyrhandir and better buildings, and aren't that different in terms of ALN and FSM.
- Concern that there will be a reduction in pupils coming here because of the situation.
- Discussion around pupil numbers at the school and in Newtown in general.
- How are there benefits from being a larger school?
- There is an error on page 51 of the consultation document re finance the figures should be the other way around.
- There is no information on current travel patterns in the document.
- Concern about the distance from Treowen to Calon y Dderwen.
- Some pupils come to this school even though they don't live in Treowen.
- Parents are choosing for their children to come here instead of a larger school.
- In this school, every member of staff knows every child, and can spot immediately if there are any issues.
- Concern that Treowen are the ones that will be missing out here they'll be losing their identity and becoming part of another school.
- If this were to go forward, would we have an opportunity to input into the plans for the new building?
- Have you considered that the Calon y Dderwen site just becomes a Health Hub, and that a new school is built on this site?

- Concern that Treowen staff would have to apply for their jobs but Calon y
 Dderwen staff wouldn't.
- Concern about pupils falling through the net in a larger school.
- There are a lot of housing developments in Newtown, which will result in additional children.
- Is there a figure for the number of pupils that start in a larger school then move because maybe it's not for them?
- Concern that this proposal won't address the Maesyrhandir position.
 Preferred option would be one school between Treowen and Maesyrhandir.
- What are the predicted class sizes if this goes ahead? I've read that there could be class sizes of up to 60?
- If it goes ahead, when would we expect to learn more about our positions?
- There would need to be some representation from Treowen School on the Calon y Dderwen governing body, if this went ahead.
- What would be the outside space with the new building as some would be lost because of the campus being shared?
- Concern about congestion around the site.

5. ESTYN

Estyn's response to the consultation is provided below:

This report has been prepared by his Majesty's Inspectors of Education and Training in Wales.

Under the terms of the School Standards and Organisation (Wales) Act 2013 and its associated Code, proposers are required to send consultation documents to Estyn. However, Estyn is not a body which is required to act in accordance with the code and the Act places no statutory requirements on Estyn in respect of school organization matters. Therefore, as a body being consulted, Estyn will provide their opinion only on the overall merits of school organisation proposals.

Estyn has considered the educational aspects of the proposal and has produced the following response to the information provided by the propose and other additional information, such as Welsh Government data and the opinion of the Regional Consortium that delivers school improvement services to the schools in the proposal.

Introduction

This proposal is submitted by Powys County Council. The proposal is considered under the School Organisation Code (2018) and the proposal is as follows:

Phase 1: Close Treowen C.P. School from 31st August 2025 and extend Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen to include the former Treowen C.P. School site from 1st September 2025

Phase 2: Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen to move to a new building located on the existing Calon Y Dderwen site during 2026/27 and close the Treowen site.

The proposal aligns with the county's Strategy for Transforming Education that was re-launched in July 2022. The council's Cabinet agreed on 24th October 2023 to begin consulting on the proposal following consideration of the alternatives.

Summary/Conclusion

The proposer has provided useful information that explains the rationale behind this proposal.

The following options were considered:

- **Option 1:** New building for Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen, other schools to remain as they are.
- **Option 2:** New building for Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen with increased capacity, the closure of Maesyrhandir C.P School and Treowen C.P. School with pupils attending the new building at Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen.
- **Option 3:** New building for Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen with increased capacity, the closure of Maesyrhandir C.P. School with pupils attending the new building at Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen

 Option 4: New building for Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen with increased capacity, the closure of Treowen C.P. School with pupils attending the new building at Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen.

Based on SWOT analyses and an assessment against the Critical Success Factors, the preferred option for the schools is Option 4.

Having identified the preferred option, a number of possible implementation options were identified to take this option forward.

Option 4A – Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School continue to operate as separate schools until the new building is constructed. When the new building opens, Treowen C.P. school closes and pupils transfer to the new building at Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen along with Calon Y Dderwen pupils.

Option 4B – Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School continue to operate as separate schools until the new building is constructed. When the new building opens on the Calon Y Dderwen site, a new primary school is established in the new building by merging Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School.

Option 4C – From September 2025, Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen is extended to include the current Treowen C.P. School building. Treowen pupils would continue to attend the Treowen site; however, the school would be part of Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen. Treowen C.P. School would close. When the new building opens, all pupils move to the new building on the Calon Y Dderwen site. The Treowen site would close.

Option 4D – From September 2025, a new primary school is established by merging Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School. The school initially operates from the current Calon Y Dderwen and Treowen buildings. When the new building opens, all pupils move to the new building on the Calon Y Dderwen site. The Treowen site would close.

Option 4E – From September 2025, Treowen C.P. School closes and pupils transfer to Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen. Pupils continue to occupy the current Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen buildings until the new building is ready.

Following SWOT analyses and an assessment against the Critical Success Factors, the Cabinet's preferred implementation option is Option 4C.

Estyn believes that the proposal is likely to maintain, or improve upon, the current standards in terms of education, provision and leadership and management.

Description and benefits

The rationale for this proposal is sound and due attention has been given to the considerations. Evidence is based valid facts and considerations and the proposer has provided a clear timetable for the statutory procedures and implementing the proposal.

On the whole, the proposal identifies the proposal's expected advantages and disadvantages clearly and fairly in comparison with the status quo. The proposer has given detailed consideration to the advantages and disadvantages of the alternatives and clear and valid reasons have been provided for disregarding these alternatives.

Detailed consideration has been given to completing the proposal in two phases. This would allow pupils to attend the school at the existing location until the new building is built and would eliminate the need for Treowen pupils to move twice. Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School have a similar pupil profile in terms of additional learning needs and pupils who are eligible for free school meals. This would enable a positive transition process, for example by sharing staff expertise, good practice and resources across both sites. The proposer has not detailed how they would reduce the effect on pupils' learning and well-being during the construction period of the new building, for example reducing the noise impact and disruption of the construction work. The proposer has acknowledged that the proposed arrangements may contribute to traffic density in the Calon Y Dderwen area and that this may have a negative effect on the attendance of pupils who have to walk further to school.

The proposal is expected to provide an opportunity for pupils at Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School to benefit from a better learning environment which is fully accessible, energy-efficient and meets the Welsh Government's net zero targets. The new building would eliminate the maintenance backlog at both sites, along with concerns about the condition and suitability of the existing buildings.

The proposal has given clear consideration to the effect of the changes on learners' travel arrangements. The proposer states that every effort would be made to encourage walking/cycling to school when developing the new building. As the proposed site for the new building is currently a school site, there are already good active travel links between the site and town centre. There has also recently been some development of active travel routes on the Treowen estate to reach the school after moving to the new building. However, the additional distance is not considered to be excessive and should not have a significant effect on the accessibility of provision. Several potential future routes have been identified to better connect this area to the town centre, which would be considered as part of the process of developing the new building.

The proposer has given some consideration to the effect of the proposal on school capacity and the effect of surplus places in the area. The surplus places that would have been at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. school are expected to decrease from approximately 40% to 15%. However, surplus places are expected to increase gradually across other English-medium schools in the town until January 2028.

The proposer has considered the financial costs of the new school to be suitable. Revenue savings of £108.6k per annum are estimated as a result of implementing the plan, excluding additional savings that can be made, for example by pooling resources. The proposer estimates that the re-branding costs and the Treowen site for the implementation of Phase 1 would be approximately £15k. It is acknowledged that there is a risk in terms of attracting capital funding for the implementation of the proposal. The original Strategic Outline Programme was based on a school with 270 places (as opposed to the 360 for the revised proposal). The council will submit a new Strategic Outline Programme for the Sustainable Communities for Learning programme before the end of March 2024, which will include an updated cost for this project.

The proposer gives suitable consideration to the effect of the proposals on the local pre-school provision. It is acknowledged that management arrangements for the provision in Treowen would need to be considered, as the setting is currently run by Treowen C.P School, which would no longer exist. Should all provision move to the new building after Phase 2, this would mean that funded early years education would no longer be available in Treowen and families living in Treowen would need to travel further to access provision at Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen. The proposer states that parents would also be able to access other providers in Newtown and that the demand for places in the area will be reviewed as the proposal progress to ensure that sufficient places are provided to meet the demand.

The local authority has provided a Welsh Language Impact Assessment as part of this proposal. As the re-organisation of English-medium provision is the basis of this proposal, no significant impact is expected on Welsh-medium provision.

The local authority has provided a Community Impact Assessment as part of this proposal.

Educational aspects of the proposal

The proposer has given due consideration to the effect of the proposal on the quality of outcomes, provision and leadership and management.

The proposer believes that pupils at both school are making good progress in their skills. It is anticipated that extending Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen to include the current Treowen site would have a positive effect on the skills of all pupils, including literacy, numeracy and digital competence. This is intended to be realized by improving opportunities for staff to share expertise and resources across the school and by improving the school's capacity to monitor pupils' progress in these aspects. The proposer believes that the quality of teaching is good at both schools. It is anticipated that extending Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen to include the Treowen site would be an opportunity to improve this further by providing positive professional learning opportunities for staff, such as sharing effecting teaching practices and experiences.

The proposer has not given detailed consideration to how the plans would develop the breadth, appropriateness and balance of the curriculum at the school beyond identifying that it would be an opportunity to strengthen the curriculum provided for pupils further.

Appropriate consideration is given to the effect on vulnerable pupils, including those with additional learning needs. Pupils will be taught at the same location initially. They are likely to be taught by the same staff, which would help to support their transition to the new delivery model. Although the proposal would ultimately affect these pupils, there is no reason to believe that the new arrangements would not meet their needs. The proposer acknowledges that there would be a change in location for pupils who attend the Treowen site, which may mean that the school at the new site would be less accessible to them.

The proposal is not likely to expand or have a negative effect on Welsh-medium provision as the schools affected are English medium. Appropriate consideration has

been given to the effect on groups of pupils who are vulnerable and ensuring quality. There are not concerns that the plan will have any effect in terms of these aspects. No adverse effect is anticipated on pupils' well-being or attitudes to learning. Over the short term, all pupils are likely to be taught by the same staff as at present. It is acknowledged that moving to the new building may have a short-term negative effect on pupils' well-being, for example Treowen pupils who have to travel further to school. The proposer does not detail how they intend to mitigate any negative effects on pupils at the Calon Y Dderwen site during the construction period, for example if temporary classes are needed. The proposer expects that the school's arrangements for safeguarding pupils would improve further following the move to a new building in the future. Safeguarding arrangements would be a key consideration in planning the site and designing the new building, particularly considering that the proposal is for the new building to be part of the new well-being campus to be developed by the North Powys well-being Programme.

Extending Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen to include the Treowen site would be an opportunity to ensure permanent leadership arrangements across both sites. There is currently a permanent leadership team at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen but not at Treowen C.P. School. The proposer indicates that the extended Ysgol Calon Y Dderwen would be a larger school which would enable more leadership capacity. It is acknowledged that operating across two sites may cause some challenges for the schools' leaders during this transitional period.

The Estyn report in May 2018 shows that Treowen C.P. School received two 'Good; grades against the 'Well-being and attitudes to learning' and 'Care, support and guidance' inspection areas and three 'Adequate and needs improvement' grades against the 'Standards', 'Teaching and learning experiences' and 'Leadership and management' areas. The school was placed in the 'Esytn monitoring' category and in December 2019, the school was judged to have made good progress in relation to the recommendations and, therefore, removed from the list of schools in need of Estyn monitoring. Ysgol Calon y Dderwen is a new school and has not yet been inspected by Estyn.

2. COMMENTS ABOUT PHASE 1 OF THE PROPOSALS

2.1 CONCERN ABOUT THE IMPACT ON PUPILS

2.1.1	If Phase 1 was to go ahead it would be detrimental to the children.	The Council recognises that any school reorganisation process creates a period of uncertainty for all involved, including children. The Council is committed to supporting schools and learners, including through periods of change. An experienced member of staff from the Council will be available to support school leaders to help them manage possible changes for their learners. It is also expected that school governors, staff and parents support the children to ensure that there isn't a detrimental impact on their wellbeing.
		Disruption for pupils would be minimal during the first phase of the proposals, as pupils would continue to attend school on their existing sites and it is expected that most staff would also remain on their current sites. However, it is recognised that senior leadership may change, and there would also be changes to the school name and identity for pupils currently attending Treowen C.P. School.
		The proposal is to implement Phase 1 in September 2025, which would give a lead in time of approximately 12 months, which would provide an opportunity for joint

2.2 CONCERN ABOUT THE IMPACT ON STAFF

2.2.1	School staff jobs are at risk.	As stated in the Consultation Document:
		'Should the proposals be implemented, Treowen C.P. School would close, and Ysgol Calon y Dderwen would be extended to include the former Treowen site.
		The Council would work with the headteacher and governing body of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen on an expanded staffing structure, which would enable the school to operate from the Treowen site in addition to its current site during Phase 1. This would be in accordance with the relevant HR policies for teaching and support staff. As part of this process, there would be an opportunity for the governing body to 'ringfence' all teaching and associated staff posts to staff currently employed within Treowen C.P. School in the first instance.'
		Whilst it is acknowledged that any school reorganisation process causes a period of uncertainty for those affected, including staff, it is anticipated that the impact on staff during phase 1 of the proposals would be minimal, as the expectation is that the majority of staff would continue in their current roles on their current sites.

		As stated in the Consultation Document, it is possible that further changes to staffing arrangements would be needed when the school moves to a new building during Phase 2. However, there would be opportunities during Phase 1 to put arrangements in place to safeguard current staff, such as recruiting to vacancies on a fixed term basis to provide greater security to current staff.

2.3.2	The community and family feel of Treowen School will slowly start to disappear in a larger a school – having family who work and also attend Welshpool Church in Wales School they say how you don't get the family feel with so many children and families.	The Council notes this concern about the loss of Treowen C.P. School's identity, and that the school's 'family feel' would be lost if it became part of a larger school. During phase 1 of the proposals, pupils would continue to attend school on the Treowen site, so would continue to attend a smaller site. It is likely that the staff on the Treowen site would be the current Treowen staff, so the expectation is that the 'community and family feel' would continue.

2.4 COMMENTS ABOUT THE IMPACT ON FAMILIES

2.4.1 Loss of choice for families

2.4.1.1	The proposal is taking away choice.	Parents can choose to apply for a place for their child(ren) in any school they wish, however there is no requirement for the Council to provide a choice of schools of certain types or of certain sizes.
		There are currently 8 schools which provide primary education in the Newtown catchment. The current proposal, if implemented, would merge 2 of these schools, however there would still be 7 schools in the catchment which would continue to provide choice. These include community primary schools, Roman Catholic provision, a Welsh-medium primary school, Church in Wales provision and schools located in rural areas, as well as schools of a variety of different sizes.
2.4.1.2	There are parents who want their children to stay at Treowen until it closes, but do not want their children to move to Calon y Dderwen after that period. By making Treowen part of Calon y Dderwen in the first phase you are taking away this choice.	Parents can choose to apply for a place for their child(ren) in any school they with. Pupils wishing to transfer to alternative schools instead of transferring to the new building on the Calon y Dderwen site would be able to apply for a place at an alternative school, should that be their preference.

2.6 QUERIES ABOUT PHASE 1

2.6.1	If the new school is not going to be ready until year 26/27, why is it essential to close Treowen C.P School in 2025?	A number of implementation options were considered when developing the current proposals, this included the option to retain Treowen C.P. School as a standalone school until the new building was complete. However, this was not the preferred option.
		The strengths associated with the option to expand Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the Treowen site from the 1 st of September 2025 include the following:

		 Would provide education in Treowen until the new building is constructed. Pupils would continue to attend school at the same location until the new building is constructed. Would enable staff expertise and good practice to be shared across both sites during the transition period. Would enable the school to run more efficiently during the transition period through shared staffing and resources Improved transition arrangements to support pupils' move from Treowen to the new building as they would already be part of the school.
2.6.2	Has this been done successfully elsewhere? Newtown High / John Beddoes would perhaps suggest otherwise from inspection reports.	There are other examples where schools have initially operated across more than one site whilst awaiting a move to a new building. This has included Welshpool C. in W. School, which initially opened on three sites before moving to its new building, and Ysgol y Mynydd Du, which operated on two sites before moving to its new building. The Council is currently in the process of establishing a new primary school in the Brecon catchment, which will operate from 3 sites from September 2024 before moving to a new building in the future.
2.6.3	What are the plans for the pre-school setting that is currently situated in Treowen School?	As stated in the Consultation Document: 'During Phase 1 of the proposals, Treowen C.P. School would close and Ysgol Calon y Dderwen would be extended to include the current site of Treowen C.P. School. During Phase 1, the expectation is that funded early years education would continue to be available on both sites, however consideration would need to be given to the management arrangements of the provision at

		Treowen, as the setting is currently run by Treowen C.P. School, which would no longer exist.
		Eventually, the intention is that the school moves to a new building located on the site of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. Accommodation to provide funded early years education would be provided in the new building. The demand for places in the area will be reviewed as the proposal moves forward, to ensure that sufficient places are provided to accommodate demand.

The plans for the new school building are being developed in accordance with the appropriate Building Bulletin and Welsh Government guidance. The key purpose of the Building Bulleting document is to set out simple, realistic, non-statutory area guidelines for primary school buildings. Essentially the document gives minimum areas for all types of space in primary schools. It also offers area ranges over and above this minimum to allow schools flexibility in the design of their buildings and the way in which they use them.

Welsh Government expect local authorities to design new schools in accordance with the Building Bulletin guidance. The current design for Ysgol Calon y Dderwen is for 270 places plus early years and community space, and is aligned with the areas recommended within the Building Bulletin.

However, it is acknowledged that concerns about the space available for the new building have been expressed by Ysgol Calon y Dderwen in discussions to date when developing the designs for the new building, particularly as the current school has a significant amount of outside space which the school has stated is an important part of its ethos.

The current design is two-storey in order to maximise the use of outside space available. Should the Council proceed with the current proposals, discussions with the school would continue, with the aim of achieving a design

		solution which meets the school's needs in accordance with the expectations of Welsh Government, the budget and area available.
3.4.2.2	Is there going to be enough space for all the pupils in the new building to be able to get the correct education they need without falling under the radar?	As above.

4.3 COMMENTS ABOUT THE IMPACT ON PROTECTED CHARACTERISTIC GROUPS

4.3.1 Comments about ALN/SEN learners

4.3.1.1 Treowen has a high number of ALN children who are comfortable in a stable environment which is not currently too overwhelming for them. Putting them into bigger classes with a higher teacher to child ratio is not providing them with the best education.

The impact on pupils with ALN has been considered in the equality impact assessment published as part of the consultation documentation. This will be updated to reflect feedback received during the consultation period, and will be considered by Cabinet when determining whether or not to proceed with the proposal.

The Council's opinion is that pupils with ALN and those with disabilities would be equally well supported by larger schools. Where schools have larger classes with a high number of pupils with additional needs, there are processes and mechanisms within the Council to provide additional support and guidance as appropriate.

The proposal is to introduce the changes on a phased basis, which provides an opportunity to support pupils with

		additional learning needs with transition to the new operating model.

Sarah Astley welcomed all to the meeting. Everyone in attendance introduced themselves.

SA explained that there would be a brief presentation with an opportunity for discussion, comments, and questions to the officers afterwards. It was explained that the meeting would be recorded for minuting purposes, but the recording would be deleted once the minutes had been completed.

SA gave a short PowerPoint presentation which outlined the background to the current proposal, and explained that in October 2023, Powys County Council's

Cabinet gave approval to proceed with consultation on proposals affecting Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen School.

The proposals are as follows:

Phase 1: Close Treowen C.P. School from 31 August 2025 and extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the former Treowen C.P. School site from 1 September 2025

Phase 2: Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to move to a new building located on the existing Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site during 2026/27, and the Treowen site closes.

The consultation period started on the 15th January 2024 and runs for 6 weeks, ending on the 26th February 2024.

After the consultation period ends, a consultation report will be prepared which will be considered by the Council's Cabinet. If they decide to proceed, a Statutory Notice would be published, and there would be 28 days for people to submit any objections they have. An Objection Report would then be prepared, and Cabinet would consider this report and make a final decision on whether or not to implement the proposal.

The indicative timeline included in the document was shared, however it was explained that this can change due to circumstances or the number of responses. The intention was that the Consultation Report would be considered in April, however there is a complication with this due to the Police and Crime Commissioner elections taking place in May, which means there will be no Cabinet meeting in April, so the Consultation Report will either be considered in March or May.

Member of staff: How does it stand with jobs for us?

Marianne Evans: In the first phase there would be no impact on you, the impact would be on Treowen staff. We wouldn't expect to see any massive changes to the Treowen staff either as the school would operate over two sites during that period.

When we get to the position where there's a new build, we would then have to look at the staffing structure. But we can't say now what that structure will be or what it would mean for you. That will be taken through the HR Management of Change process. But that would be at the time when the new build is ready.

Sarah Astley: In terms of the impact on you, we are very aware that we've recently had a process to merge Ladywell Green and Hafren to establish Ysgol Calon y Dderwen, which has meant that you have already been through a merger process recently. We heard very strongly from you in the engagement held before the summer that you were concerned about being part of another merger process, and we have taken that into account in terms of the current proposal. The option could

have been to close both schools and open a new school, which would have had more of an impact on you during the first phase.

Marianne Evans: We don't want to put you through that again having only recently come out the other end of a previous merger. I'm sure there will be different views from Treowen about that though – the impact on them and whether they are being treated fairly. However, in the situation we are in, with you only recently having opened, I don't think it would be right to do that again.

Member of staff: I think what you're saying though is that when the new build is created and we're ready to move in, there will be redundancies then. Then we'll all be on the same level playing field, so we will go through it again, I think.

Marianne Evans: When the new build is there and you know the number of classrooms and the pupil numbers and what the configuration is, yes, the school would have to look at staffing again.

Helen Hinton: The governing body would have to look at the staffing structure and they would have to look at how many classes they need. Then if changes in staffing were needed, they would have to consult with you again, like it was for you before, with all the staff of Calon y Dderwen.

Member of staff: So really, we're not secure at all then, are we really? We're secure for a limited amount of time during Phase 1.

Marianne Evans: With every school proposal we've done, where there are schools on separate sites until there is a new build, this has always been the case. It was a similar situation in Welshpool. When the new building was due to open and they knew how pupil numbers looked, the governors and the Head had to look again at what was required.

Member of staff: What about the wellbeing of the staff during those two redundancy periods? How did that look?

Marianne Evans: In the first phase when the schools merged, we were really involved and worked closely with the schools. HR were in full support throughout the whole process. But it was challenging, taking four schools into two was pretty challenging at that time. However, what's important is that there is support for staff as you go through the process.

Helen Hinton: It's also worth noting that what the schools will need to do is look at potentially planning for that time and looking not to go through any permanent recruitment going forward. So as people move on, you could look at offering fixed term contracts, so that the people who are employed now have a better chance of securing jobs as we go through the process.

Marianne Evans: It's an ongoing, evolving thing. You do that every year; you look at your pupil numbers and you do that planning. It's a natural part of planning for the future. What's different here is that it's linked to moving to a new build.

Member of staff: I don't believe that being made redundant should be a natural path for any teacher, or anyone working in a school, as part of their career.

Marianne Evans: I don't think we're proposing a natural path to redundancy here. What we are looking at is to ensure that as many Newtown children as possible have the opportunity to be in a brand-new facility under the banner of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen

[Nancy Owen joined the meeting.]

Marianne Evans: That's the number one rationale or reason for taking this proposal forward. And what we are saying is, during this first phase, there won't be any impact on current staff at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. But even if we weren't proposing that Treowen were going to come in, even if it was just Calon y Dderwen moving into a new building, you would still have to look at pupil numbers and plan for the staffing requirements at that point.

Member of staff: What's the reason for Treowen school staying there during Phase 1? Surely for our staff, if you moved those pupils here to start with, that would mean we wouldn't have to go through that process because they would already be here not on two sites, so there would be no doubling up on staff.

Marianne Evans: I think the reason is, do we have enough space in Calon y Dderwen to take pupils from day one from Treowen and I don't think we have. That's the reason for that. But also having the Treowen site open as part of Calon y Dderwen does provide that transition into a new model, particularly as we already know that there are concerns from the Treowen community, we've heard them already. So this would help with the transition process. But ultimately, have we got enough space on this site to bring Treowen children in from day one, and I think the answer is no.

Member of staff: How many children are there in Treowen?

Marianne Evans: 110.

Sarah Astley: It was also around the use of the site. At some point the site will be a construction site, so there was concern about maximising the number of pupils on the site whilst that construction is period is happening, which can be difficult to manage.

Member of staff: For the Heads, Deputies, SLT, are you saying that they would carry on as they are? Are you saying that there would be a Head on both sites? A Deputy on both sites? Is that what you're proposing if there's no change?

Marianne Evans: That would be up to the governing body of Calon y Dderwen in terms of how it manages leadership across both sites. That would be done in discussion with the governors and the Heads.

Member of staff: So potentially people's jobs could change there?

Marianne Evans: Potentially, that's something that would need to be worked through.

Member of staff: Can I just ask, you just said 110 pupils. I don't know if I've got it wrong but I thought I heard 360 places when looking at numbers for the new school?

Member of staff: At the moment we're 251, so if they're 110, and the number is going to be 360, we're already over capacity.

Marianne Evans: But if you look at the projections for both schools, numbers are dropping. They're dropping very rapidly in Treowen and in are projected to go from 100 to 60 in 2 years. If you look at the whole of Newtown, with the number of schools in the town and what's happened over the last 5 years in terms of pupil numbers, particularly at Maesyrhandir and Treowen where they've basically halved and are projected to drop even lower, in a few years' time Maesyrhandir and Treowen could be 3 teacher schools because they are dropping below the 90 pupil mark. Taking that into account and looking at the projections, with yourselves and Treowen, you are still below the 350 mark.

Member of staff: How much below? Do you know?

Marianne Evans: Roughly about 30?

Sarah Astley: Looking at the projections that are in the consultation documents. These are based on PLASC and live birth information, and they are projections so there is always a bit of a caveat around them. Based on this data, in January 2028 we are looking at 229 at Calon y Dderwen, and 78 at Treowen, which takes us to around 310 pupils altogether.

Member of staff: It's hard because we know the people at Treowen, they're not just faceless people, and the children, they are friends. On one level, if this wasn't happening, pupil numbers there were going anyway, so they'd have redundancies there, but we wouldn't. So, it does seem a little unfair on us to be lumped in with those redundancies. But on the other hand, because they're our friends there's a human side to it. Not just thinking about your own self but thinking of them. It's fairer

for them. But having just been through it, being put in a situation that nobody's asked to be in, it's quite hard. That's what I'm picking up from the staff anyway.

The money for the new build, am I correct that we have funding for a build for a 270 place school from the Welsh Government? However we don't have funding for a build for 360 pupils? If that isn't approved, where are we then?

Marianne Evans: You're right. We submitted our first business case for this project to Welsh Government in 2020, so quite a long time ago now. However, it is on the Council's programme, and is on the Welsh Government's capital programme. We've already had discussions with Welsh Government to explain what's going on here, and the reasons why we are consulting on this possible change. What we'll need to do, because the cost will be higher than the previous costs put in, we would need to submit another business case with the new costs in. It's in the Council's programme and on the Welsh Government's programme, but with all new builds, there's never any guarantee of the funding until you're ready to put the spades in the ground, that's when you get the final approval from Welsh Government. Anything up to that is an approval in principle, however we are confident that funding will be available, particularly because the development is part of the development of a health hub as part of the North Powys Wellbeing Programme, and Welsh Government is supportive of that.

Sarah Astley: Also we would have needed to submit further business cases anyway. The Business Case that was prepared in 2020 is the first of a series of three. There have been situations before where things have changed as the business case process has moved forward. But there would have needed to be further business cases anyway before that money was absolutely certain. Do you want to mention the rolling programme as well?

Marianne Evans: Yes. The Welsh Government are expecting all County Councils to put in new capital programmes for school builds. They've changed how they are doing it now, so instead of going with what was previously five-year bands, they're going on what they call a nine-year rolling programme. It's far more flexible and you can plan for a longer term, which is always helpful anyway. Councils are expected to submit their new programmes by the end of March. Ysgol Calon y Dderwen is in that programme, so we'll be taking that through our Cabinet and submitting to Welsh Government over the next few weeks. You do have a lovely space here, but there is no denying that the buildings need some investment, and there are issues with older buildings, as we know, across the county.

Member of staff: What happens if there are more children in the future? I know nobody can look into the future, but it's not beyond the realms of possibility that another 30 children could arrive in a couple of years. What happens then? We can't make it any bigger then, can we?

Marianne Evans: That's a question for the architect, I think. For every school build, we do request that they future proof it in some way so that something could be done if pupil numbers grow. They're always designed with that in mind. The other thing we have to look at in Newtown is the number of surplus places already in the town. And again, if the pupil numbers dropped then if things stay the same, surplus places are going to increase. But the last thing we want is to not have any available places in Newtown, so we would need a buffer. So, by keeping Maesyrhandir, there's surplus places, and there are also surplus places in St Mary's and some in Penygloddfa and Dafydd Llwyd.

When you're looking at a town with so many schools, it's a different consideration to some of the more rural areas we look at as there are already a number of schools within a small area.

Member of staff: It's a possibility that parents at Treowen could decide to move their children to other schools now, and instead of coming all the way over here, they might go to Maesyrhandir, so we just don't know what could end up happening.

Member of staff: What would happen, for instance, in September 2025, if Treowen numbers were really low and our numbers really high, would staff move between?

Marianne Evans: Potentially.

Member of staff: Because we'd all be Calon y Dderwen staff by then.

Marianne Evans: You'd remain Calon y Dderwen staff. The Treowen staff would have new contracts and become Calon y Dderwen staff.

Member of staff: Would they be permanent contracts then?

Helen Hinton: If they're permanent now then yes, they'll be ringfenced to permanent jobs.

Marianne Evans: You'll be one staffing body by then. You have to think, it's a 360 pupil school, it's larger than you are now, which is currently 251, so obviously the staffing structure is dictated by the pupil numbers and how the classes are configured. It's something to be aware of, but it may have happened naturally anyway.

Member of staff: It will happen naturally to Treowen if their numbers drop but if the pupils choose not to come here, then we're going to be made redundant as one whole staff. So, if pupils from Treowen go to Maesyrhandir, we'll have less pupils so the staff structure will need to change, but it will because we've got two sets of staff team but not enough pupils.

Marianne Evans: You'd be one body of staff if this proposal went ahead.

Member of staff: But if it doesn't go ahead then all our jobs are safe.

Eurig Towns: Not necessarily because pupil numbers generally are dropping, as we've seen with the numbers that came through here now, your numbers as a school are dropping. So that doesn't mean you're safe.

Member of staff: But that is a natural thing, merging isn't natural. You can't guarantee that those 360 children will actually come to this school.

Eurig Towns: We can't guarantee. Numbers go down or they go up. All we can use are the figures that we have.

Sarah Astley: The flip side of course is that more pupils might want to come here so yes, some may choose to go somewhere else, but others that are somewhere else, may choose to come to Calon y Dderwen as well. We don't know, do we?

Member of staff: But one thing that is guaranteed is that if this goes through, we've got to merge two staff groups and one group, as we all know, are not over the moon at the prospect. So, will we get support? I'm on the senior management team, I'm not doubting our own abilities, but I think that's going to be potentially quite difficult. Are we going to be supported in any way to do that? It needs to be successful from the beginning and I think, we've never done that before. Is there any support from the county or from other schools who have done that before that could help us out?

Marianne Evans: The School Improvement Team will always be supportive, as will HR, as will Finance. There's learning to be gathered from some of the other mergers that have happened, so there are teachers who have gone through this.

Member of staff: Have they merged or have they expanded?

Marianne Evans: We had an expansion in Newtown / Presteigne. That's going back a few years now. But I think what we're hearing from you is that there is going to be quite a difficult transition period.

Member of staff: We don't want that to be a personal thing.

Marianne Evans: If this goes ahead then you're going to potentially have one body of staff thinking they're the underdog. And you're in an uncomfortable position, because you don't want to be seen to be taking over. So that's something we're going to work to.

Sarah Astley: Similar themes came up this afternoon when we were talking with the pupils, they were concerned about one school being seen as taking over the other, and they had some suggestions about how we could work through that, what could be done to ease that and support that transition.

Marianne Evans: If this goes forward then the leadership of this school, working closely with the local authority, working closely with the governors, this is something that needs to be carefully planned out and managed because it is difficult. We're not trying to say this is easy. It's going to be challenging for sure.

Member of staff: On the figures, the projections, it's difficult when you're talking 3 or 4 years in the future. Children haven't been born yet, but the figures in there from January 24 are 236. We've just had it confirmed that our intake in September '24 is 37. We've got 36 children Year 6 now. So, we are actually going to be 252 in September rather than 236.

Marianne Evans: You're right, we've published the current projections, but when you're in a town like this where pupils move around, that forecasting is slightly more challenging. And that's why it's good to work with you to understand what's happening next year so we can map out from there.

Member of staff: That will have consequences for future years.

Sarah Astley: And the question then is what's happening elsewhere, in the other schools. Because often if there's an increase in one school, in a situation like Newtown where we've got a lot of schools in quite a small area, if there's an increase in one school the likelihood is there's a decrease somewhere else. So, what does that look like across the whole town?

Member of staff: How realistic is it that we will move to a new build in 2026/27? That does seem quite quick considering how long it's taken so far.

Marianne Evans: I'm going to be honest. I think there is a risk that it will be pushed further.

Member of staff: Would it be longer than a year or two?

Marianne Evans: Potentially. When all this raised its head last summer we were frustrated because we were going really well along the build. And what's challenging is how much work can we do on the design whilst we're in this period? There is work currently happening, reviewing the designs based on an increased number of pupils, but no decisions have yet been made to move forward with this change, so we can't pre-empt any decisions. But it is a risk.

Member of staff: When will this process end?

Sarah Astley: If Cabinet decide to move forward with the process, we're hoping to finish the process before the end of the school year. However, it obviously depends on the level of responses and how long it takes to work through everything. So if it's

not possible to have a final decision in July, then we would be looking at the first Cabinet meeting back in September.

Member of staff: What happens with the upkeep of the buildings we're currently in? When we merged as Ysgol Calon y Dderwen we thought we'd be in pretty quickly, however the field's exactly the same as it was then. So, we're having to maintain the upkeep of at least those that are deemed core. And then there's Treowen as well. So, if we were to become one school, how do you maintain the upkeep of the buildings while all these decisions are being made and possibly pushed on?

Marianne Evans: Well, the Council don't have a choice. They have to make sure that buildings are safe and well maintained, so there would be an additional cost to the authority of supporting these schools whilst we're in this interim period. But I don't think there's any getting away from that because we can't have schools falling down and not able to open because of issue related to the condition of the buildings.

Member of staff: That currently comes out of our school budget.

Marianne Evans: We'd have to provide over and above funding if that was the case.

Member of staff: Why don't we get it now then?

Marianne Evans: The Major Improvements Programme has supported you over this last year, hasn't it?

Headteacher: Once the budget is run on March 20th, I think, we'll then see what the new formula means for us. And then from that we will look to see what we can afford ourselves. Already we put £14,000 a year into the building and we'll see if that's enough or whether or not we need more. And then we'd get in touch with Marianne, David Thompson would then probably be sent in and then we'll see where we go from there. We generally have had, a significant amount of support from the transformation process when we've asked for it.

Sarah Astley: We have had some conversations recently about some of the needs around the building and how we can support you with that.

Marianne Evans: I think the Council has a duty because it's the Council putting the proposal forward. Therefore, if the proposal does go forward and we delay the new build because of this then obviously there's a duty to support the school in terms of its condition.

Member of staff: You mentioned before about future-proofing, and looking at the plans to ensure they could be extended, but what about the grounds? We're already concerned about the grounds, the hall is barely going to be big enough for the number of pupils we will have. How do you future-proof that? You can't just stretch the hall and add on more land.

Marianne Evans: That's a question for the architects. But you're right, we're constrained by the site and we're constrained by the fact that the health hub is coming in. But, as I said, it's an architectural question and I'm sure the architect would be able to give an answer. The key thing here for us is, as every local authority, we have to design our schools within certain guidance. And if we're not within that guidance we get questioned by Welsh Government. We've had one case recently with another school where we'd gone over the guidance or the benchmarks and this was questioned by Welsh Government. So, at that design sage we have to be very mindful that we're within the boundaries of the Welsh Government guidance.

Member of staff: The guidance that's been put in place, the children we get now, there's a lot of need, and outdoor learning is huge. It's a concern that the outdoor space is being taken away.

Marianne Evans: The guidance is interesting because we are challenged, and we challenge as well. The building bulletin guidance is fairly old by now. Welsh Government recognise that, and they are developing new standards for schools and new guidance, and they're looking at things like ALN, Curriculum for Wales, Community Focussed Schools, that's another big driver. So hopefully by March or April we'll see this new guidance from Welsh Government and that will help us.

Member of staff: So we could end up with more space then?

Marianne Evans: It depends what that is what the guidance is. But actually we have to be really careful because Welsh Government scrutinises these business cases. It's not an open door and you can just put it in your business case and the funding comes.

Member of staff: I am concerned that the classrooms we are going to get are going to be based on the old building bulletin, and that the changeover would happen whilst the building work was going on. I think the classrooms are too small for the foundation phase of the new curriculum and it's not fair because there may be a new building bulletin which changes things. So what I hope is that it does get delayed because then we might have more space.

Marianne Evans: Our understanding with regard to the new guidance is that we'll know something within the next couple of months.

Member of staff: I recognise the building is not in a great shape and it needs to be replaced. But what's actually being proposed is to halve our site, add a huge amount more extra children, and take away a significant amount of grass and space. So, you then start to question, yes, we need a new build but is this going to be any further forward in terms of worth to the new curriculum, or actually is it a step back? And I think that is the concern, it seems that everything is being taken away. I appreciate the building can't carry on as it is, but then you're throwing more children in. So it's a

very difficult thing to look ahead and future-proof and say, yeah, we can see how that's going to work out. If we're going from classrooms that are maybe a bit cold, a bit draughty but are massive into nice, warm but too small ones, that's not necessarily a great swap. Financially it is for the people who are paying for it, but we need space. The children need space.

Marianne Evans: We do have discussions about this, very strong discussions sometimes. However, as we manage the funding process, making sure that we get the right thing for what we want, sometimes there is a compromise needed, or maybe there are different viewpoints. We're having those discussions with the design team, but what we can't do is build something that's too big. Welsh Government will just say 'no'.

Member of staff: Just sufficient though would be a good start. A hall you could get everyone in, and parents can come in and the whole school could get in it.

Member of staff: It just seems ridiculous that you would want to build a school that's too small. It feels like Welsh Government needs to make it a priority to understand what the new curriculum proposes, because as a school we deliver an excellent provision here as it stands now. With the new building we won't be able to deliver excellent provision because every foundation phase class needs a literary area, a maths area, a health and wellbeing area.

We need all the areas in every single class and the foundation phase now. We can't do that with box-shaped classes, we can't deliver it. And then Estyn will come and say why aren't you delivering this provision? But we physically can't in the classrooms being proposed.

I think Welsh Government has to look at it really seriously because we're passionate about our school and our children, really passionate, and we really want to deliver the best, but we can't. We actually can't do it in the building currently being proposed. It can't happen.

Member of staff: Do you evaluate? You've built the buildings in Welshpool. Do they get an opportunity to actually say, after it being there for so many years, this is what works well and this is what doesn't. Does that happen?

Sarah Astley: We are actually doing a piece of work at the moment which Jim is leading on, which is doing exactly that. It's reviewing some of the more recent builds, and he has been out to speak with the heads of those schools to gather feedback on what's worked well, what hasn't worked well. Most of the time the buildings are an evolution of the previous ones and the team learn and develop and change and amend. So, the purpose of this is to look back. He's been visiting some of the heads of the Gwernyfed schools and he's been to the schools in Welshpool to speak to the heads there as well.

Marianne Evans: What we're keen on doing as well, Welsh Government have been developing their standard, and Jim has been part of the group developing that. But we're also developing a Powys standard as well so that we know the basics our schools need.

Member of staff: In all seriousness, it might be really good for him to see one in use, to see if that changes his mind on anything. There are 37 Year 6 children in this classroom.

Sarah Astley: It's not just about him. There are many different elements to pull together. Input from the School Improvement Team, ALN Team etc.

Member of staff: On the ALN point. We already have a lot of outside agencies coming in and part of my Monday involves trying to find places for everybody to go. With an increase of potentially 110 pupils coming in, there would be a need for that provision for the additional pupils too. We are really struggling for space to put people, to the point that it's embarrassing. We've had some pupils outside in huts in the summer because there is literally nowhere for them to work. I've had people saying that the areas aren't private enough and that they can't work properly with children. It's really logistically hard to manage.

So initially when we were looking at the design there were enough rooms, potentially, but even then, it wasn't probably quite enough. We talked about streets and things like that, but there has to be spaces for these people to come in and work, otherwise it's a nightmare. People are fighting for rooms, people are trying to do interventions. It just disrupts the day. ALN is huge. We should be providing for these children, and a lot of time is wasted trying to sort out places for people to go.

Now, if the hub is going to become that, then fine, but if it's not then I don't know where people will manage to work. Physiotherapists need space. Outside is sometimes wet. Where is all that going to happen with an added 100 pupils?

Marianne Evans: That is the challenge, isn't it? But, as I said earlier, the Welsh Government's drive for community focussed schools is now a key part of the programme going forward. It wasn't quite as strong previously. So, they will be looking at how will this new school provide those spaces for multi-agency, how will it provide for the community? How will it provide for ALN. That's something they'll be focussing on much more strongly, I think. So again, a challenge. I'm not saying it's not going to be a challenge, looking at the space you have, more children and your requirements and the school's requirements and the needs of the community. But again, it's something we need to continue to work through.

Sarah Astley: There was a question earlier about responding after the meeting and yes, you can certainly respond after the meeting if there's anything else you want to tell us. The consultation period ends on the 26th February. All the information is on our website and there's a response form there too. We've brought some copies of

the documents to the school as well, they include all the information. If there's anything else you want to say then please do.

Marianne Evans: I think the important thing to say is everybody's views will be reflected in the consultation report. It's really important that Powys' Cabinet, the people making the decision, hear the views of and understand the Council's responses to those views. The issues on the ground need to come through the consultation and it's important that Cabinet and the politicians hear the points you are raising. I'm grateful to you for your candid views today because I think that's what we need to relay back to the politicians.

Member of staff: Would a general election have an impact on this?

Marianne Evans: Not in terms of the Council's Cabinet.

Member of staff: It won't change their views?

Marianne Evans: The make-up of the Cabinet is the make-up of the Cabinet. The were voted in the local authority election last year.

Sarah Astley: In 2022. So, they'll be there for another few years yet.

Member of staff: All of the points that have been raised now, are they going to be automatically part of the consultation?

Sarah Astley: The notes of this meeting will be reflected in the consultation report. But if you want to submit written responses too that reflect the same points, that's fine.

Member of staff: Thinking of our children here, the building was first talked about in 2020 and very selfishly, I think of my daughter who was born in 2020. In September she starts here and realistically, is she going to benefit from anything that we're talking about? Possibly not? By the time she leaves, realistically, is she? What she's going to experience is a whole lot of turbulence from all of this going on. Teacher wellbeing being affected because they're facing redundancy because they're working across two sites, because they're having to go to extra meetings that don't then leave any time for them to plan for her, mark for her, provide for her as well as all the building and everything else that goes on. Are we really thinking about the children in all of this? And the impact on the children we have now, not just those for the future?

Marianne Evans: I think you make a strong point which will be noted in the minutes.

Headteacher: I think it's an appropriate time to end. We have an incredible and exceptional group of professionals who I've had the pleasure of working with at Calon y Dderwen and I know you maintain your high standards regardless of everything and all the other complications going on. It's that togetherness we need

through this part of the journey and then beyond and I think we will come out stronger as we have done in the past.

There is a sense of déjà vu in some ways but let's keep on working together and also share your views on that consultation online. Thanks for the opportunity to engage and also for your openness as well. Hopefully, we'll give some more feedback to the documentation.

Consultation meeting with Governors of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen

It was explained that there would be a brief presentation with an opportunity for discussion, comments and questions to Officers afterwards. It was explained that the meeting would be recorded for minuting purposes but that the recording would be deleted once the minutes had been completed and agreed.

Sarah Astley gave a PowerPoint presentation which outlined the background to the current proposal and explained that in October 2023, Powys County Council's Cabinet gave approval to proceed with consultation on proposals affecting Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen School.

The proposals are as follows:

Phase 1: Close Treowen C.P. School from 31 August 2025 and extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the former Treowen C.P. School site from 1 September 2025

Phase 2: Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to move to a new building located on the existing Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site during 2026/27, and the Treowen site closes.

The consultation period started on the 15th January 2024 and runs for 6 weeks, ending on the 26th February 2024.

After the consultation period ends, a consultation report will be prepared which will be considered by the Council's Cabinet. If they decide to proceed, a Statutory Notice would be published, and there would be 28 days for people to submit any objections they have. An Objection Report would then be prepared, and Cabinet would consider this report and make a final decision on whether or not to implement the proposal.

The indicative timeline included in the document was shared, however it was explained that this can change due to circumstances or the number of responses. The intention was that the Consultation Report would be considered in April, however there is a complication with this due to the Police and Crime Commissioner elections taking place in May, which means there will be no Cabinet meeting in April, so the Consultation Report will either be considered in March or May.

Governor: The Council had an independent review board when it was put to Cabinet, that happened before Christmas.

Sarah Astley: Do you mean the Scrutiny Committee?

Governor: Yes, Scrutiny. They came up with some questions and proposals, are they reflected in the consultation?

Marianne Evans: In terms of the Learning and Skills Scrutiny Committee, they scrutinise the proposals when they're at the start of their journey, basically to test if the case for change is strong enough or if there is anything wrong. This is slightly different to what they did in the past, where the Scrutiny Committee used to scrutinise the consultation report to ensure that we'd carried out the consultation correctly. This is a better way because they can get involved at an earlier stage and question the proposal. This proposal was considered by Scrutiny quite a long time ago, October time. We had a few queries from them which we would have responded to. I can't actually recall what the queries were at the time, but we have responded.

Governor: That Scrutiny was around how have we got to this proposal. Why have we got a Treowen and Calon y Dderwen merger? Why not Maesyrhandir and Treowen?

Marianne Evans: The starting point for all of this was the question of can you increase the build? This process has been about the new build, and whether more children could be brought in so that more children can benefit. That was what we were being asked to look at. We came out and looked at Maesyrhandir and Treowen and we did the engagement and heard what everyone had to say at that point.

When we did our optioning, it was felt that Calon y Dderwen and Treowen had more similar profiling in terms of your pupils than Maesyrhandir and there are other issues, such as there's no permanent headteacher in Treowen currently. There is in Maesyrhandir – she is on a secondment, but there is a substantive head there.

That is the reason why it was Treowen and not Maesyrhandir. **Governor:** A merger between Maesyrhandir and Treowen would sort the Headteacher situation. Although you are saying there's a difference in pupil makeup, it's not that different. The issues that have been bought up in earlier engagements and the scrutiny committee were around people's safety and travel. For me we're talking about travel across the railway line although it's not a trunk road now but the infrastructure that we have is a trunk road which has been degraded. Whereas, to go laterally, people moving to Treowen from Maesyrhandir is safer. I know we're in consultation, but I wanted to focus on the fact that the Scrutiny Committee did bring up issues and I don't know where they've been addressed.

Marianne Evans: I think we have responded to them in the Cabinet paper.

Sarah Astley: I've just bought up the papers now and the points raised by Scrutiny are listed and there's a response then to those points in the minutes.

Marianne Evans: I think going back to the starting point of this, this was about the building. We weren't asked to look at the whole of Newtown. Although the Learning and Skills Committee did suggest looking at the whole of Newtown, our response was that there was a lack of available sites and space. That's why we haven't really looked at Maesyrhandir and Treowen coming together, because the starting point was slightly different.

If we'd have been asked to look at the schools in Newtown, maybe that would have been where we would have landed. But because the starting point was different then that's why we have ended up with this proposal.

Governor: I can see the reasoning but there's a lack of strategy beyond the current new build on this site here. You've already identified in the reports and the consultation the issues with the buildings at Treowen and Maesyrhandir, so they are not such a high priority as this site in terms of their building condition. This site has got some funding allocated to progress a new school but that's not to say they're going to be left to rot. It just means there's no immediate plan to merge them. I just feel that the plan B not being discussed here is a Treowen / Maesyrhandir merger in a new build within a defined timeline. I just feel that's not been recorded, we're going down Plan A and there's no Plan B.

Lynette Lovell: You have got a point. I think the other issue which is also relevant is that in those schools, the numbers have decreased significantly. Maesyrhandir is currently down in the eighties I think, but I can remember when it was in the two hundreds. Similarly, with Treowen the numbers have dropped there and when we've got such a drop in numbers, we have to look at what's the best for the town. The new build that's coming here, I've been very clear and I've said in Scrutiny and in other public forums, my ideal is that the children of Newtown are together in one building and that all of the children have really good facilities. They have the benefit of the Community Focussed Schools and from an education point of view and as Director of Education, that was my advice to Cabinet and to Scrutiny. The ideal for me would be that we could fit all of those children on this site, because with all of them it would have been around four hundred odd pupils, it wasn't an excessively large school, and where we want to go as an authority is to have larger schools. That's where the starting point was and really the steer for it came from Cabinet, who asked us to look at the Newtown area. When we looked at it, the fact is that at this point we can't build the school large enough to include Maesyrhandir, Treowen and Calon y Dderwen children, we can't physically do it. But we will have to ensure that children at Maesyrhandir have facilities for them as well. There's a backlog maintenance there, we recognise that, that's all part of what we looked at.

Marianne Evans: I think if we had the whole site then it may be that we would be proposing that – to bring the three schools together.

Governor: I think that would be a nice prospect if we had all of that space.

Governor: It's central and it's at the heart of the town. It's how it used to be, when I was in this school there were about 500.

Governor: I think now the frustrations we have as a governing body and as a school is that we're talking about a site constraint that to this point was for a new Calon y Dderwen building to service the needs of the catchment area of Calon y Dderwen and we were also pressured into a new build where we were making concessions, we weren't happy with the spaces and the volumes and the shape and were concerned about what this would mean in terms of our ability to meet the needs of pupils, and how we want to teach the pupils. Now we're just chucking another 100 pupils into the mix, and the building is already constrained in shape and size and

volume to reflect the site that we have. Something's got to give – you can't have everything.

Sarah Astley: Just to go back to the Maesyrhandir/Treowen option. It's not an option that has been considered and as has been explained it's because of where we started, the starting point was the build. However, the consultation is an opportunity to suggest alternative options. Any alternative options that come through the consultation will need to be listed in the report and we'll need to consider them. So there is an opportunity for you to feed that in through the consultation.

Marianne Evans: The concerns around the building and the site came up in the staff meeting earlier too. We know that it is really important to Calon y Dderwen.

Governor: Also, the new curriculum in Wales.

Marianne Evans: I know you've been very involved in developing the design for the new building to date. We've had this debate before. We have to work within the building guidance and I think you're slightly over it in some areas at the moment. The architects deal with the design, however the majority of the funding comes from the Welsh Government. If we don't provide them with a business case that shows that the design is reasonable and within the guidelines, then they will refuse funding. We've already had one business case back in the last 18 months because we were over the Welsh Government's benchmarks. We have to challenge the design all the time.

Governor: We also have to challenge the benchmarks, because Building Bulletin 99 is now 25 years old or maybe even older because the data that's gone into producing Building Bulletin 99 is older still and then there is an additional requirement for it to be carbon neutral, to have it zero carbon because it's self-producing. Just like we've had to make concessions, something has to give, and for me, Building Bulletin 99 isn't always fit for purpose to meet the new education requirements that the government has set out.

Marianne Evans: The Welsh Government have been working on a new standard for new school designs. We're hoping to hear something about this in the next couple of months, taking account of the fact that the current building bulletin is based on England. Education in Wales is changing and has changed so much, so they're looking at the new guidance, new standard taking into consideration the curriculum for Wales, looking at the Carbon Zero agenda, ALN and looking at Community Focussed goals, that's a big, big push. We're hoping that something will come through that may have more flexibility in it than what we currently have.

In terms of if we were further down the design routes when the new guidance came out, it might be more difficult so we're looking into that.

The other thing as well is we are looking at developing a Powys standard for Primary Schools. Jim Swabey has been out visiting the schools we've built recently asking them how they're operating. We know how the build went, we know how the design went, but we need to know is the school now working for them. That's the piece of work that Jim is leading on and hopefully that'll help us as well. We hear your

concerns about the design and about adding another hundred children into the constrained site. We'll look at these other things that come through the Powys standard, the Welsh Government guidance and hope that will give us some flexibility. We absolutely sympathize with you and where you are and the journey you've been on. Obviously, these kind of things need to be fed back then through this consultation process.

Headteacher: What you said about the space, it's reassuring to hear that because these events that we hold in the hall, one example we presented dance in the Eisteddfod this morning and we didn't have enough room for the whole school to be there. Some were standing in the back because we had to create an area for the children to dance in. We've got our Eisteddfod at the end of the month. We can't invite parents in and that's a huge part of our school. Parents can't afford tickets for the events, so we need to have these community events in the hall with the whole school there. We are restrained currently and I feel that we do need that extended space. You look at today, the hall is being used for dance and for karate tonight, we do have that community focused element here.

Marianne Evans: For us, we have to make the case to Welsh Government for the finances. Not only Welsh Government, the Cabinet as well as the Council funds 35% of it. There's sometimes a perception amongst people who aren't close to this programme in that we build gold plated schools. We aren't allowed to build gold plated schools, and we never have built gold plated schools, but actually it's a value for money issue for us. We need to make sure we have got the best building, but actually it has to provide value for money. You can see a little bit into our world in terms of the difficulties and the challenges and the complexities around all of it as well.

Governor: A couple of years ago there was talk about a Welsh-medium all through school in Newtown. Is there still talk of that? At the time there was talk of using Dafydd Llwyd's building for other schools.

Marianne Evans: That's where things were a few years ago. There was a plan, there was a vision, then things changed politically. We've recently been consulting on changing Ysgol Bro Caereinion to a Welsh Medium school from a dual stream school. If that goes forward, we need to make sure that becomes the designated Welsh medium school for the whole area. However, that decision hasn't been made yet. If that proposal doesn't go ahead, there would still be a need to look at establishing designated Welsh medium secondary provision to serve the area, so we would still have to look at it, but at the moment that's where we are at.

Governor: As a teacher governor here, I know it's been mentioned already but there's been a lot of questions asked from our staff today regarding job security. I think that does need to come through the governors as well. I think there were a few that were surprised by Phase 2, people are nervous about job security, so I think that needs to be touched on.

Marianne Evans: Phase 1 is when Calon y Dderwen becomes a two sited school and includes the Treowen site and Phase 2 is when you all move to the new build. In terms of the impact on staff from the first phase, what we've said in the consultation

document is that there would be no impact on Calon y Dderwen staff. Calon y Dderwen staff aren't going to be made at risk of redundancy, so wouldn't be affected by any changes that affect Treowen staff. The staff have just come through it, the school has just come through that when the school was established.

However, when we get to Phase 2 with all staff then coming into a new build, that's when the staffing structure would need to be looked at again and that's when potentially some changes would need to be made. However, this is part of the normal planning process, managing your staffing, managing your budgets going forward. It's something that happened in Welshpool and is happening in Brecon at the moment where we're looking at merging three schools into one, so we're having the same conversation about what happens when we get to the build and planning for that next step.

Governor: In terms of Phase 1, if this was to go ahead, the governing body would be taking on an additional site for Calon y Dderwen, but the existing Treowen governing body would dissolve. We can ratio and increase the headcount within the ratios permitted to include some governor representatives from that site, which of course we should do, but that might be dependent on governors' terms of office. If we've got governors still sitting here and we can't quite do that within the period, that means a Calon y Dderwen based governing body would need to make decisions on staffing on another site. That isn't going to go down well. If there has to be a reduction and there's talk of ringfencing jobs to the Treowen site staff, and again we've been through the ringfencing process ourselves, but if we have to make a reduction, that's not going to build bridges.

Governor: Correct me if I'm wrong, but because we were all brought in under a new governing body when we established Calon y Dderwen, we'll all still be within our current terms of office in 2025.

Governor: Immediately, the first action of a new governing body for this Phase 1 would be to potentially make redundancies to a staffing body. Then Phase 2, we're going forward some years because we're talking about 25 to 28. In between Phase 1 and Phase 2, the expectation is that the transformation team will be supplementing the school budget, which will only be representative of the pupils on roll. So, account for the multiple sites that we're operating under and the increased head count associated with running on multiple sites and in Phase 2 that will be gone. So, between Phase 1 and Phase 2, we already know there's potential job losses because we would be moving to a one site, one school approach. The pupil numbers could be exactly the same between Phase 1 and Phase 2, but we would have one site to deal with, so that would be one administration team, maybe the logistics of having a combined 5-6 class on Treowen and the numbers there and here mean now we don't need that extra class and that's going to be hard to take. We're not constructing a new school from Phase 1, we're constructing a temporary school until we're in Phase 2.

Governor: I think it's a little bit different having been through it with Maesydre and the initial stage, as there were foundation phase sites and one junior site. This is quite different because will still be years 5-6 there initially and years 5-6 here too.

There's no proposal to make it that there's different age groups on each site, is there? We're not asking some pupils to move before others, are we?

Marianne Evans: We'd expect the schools to remain the same, we wouldn't be expecting different age groups to move.

Headteacher: I'll give you a real example that happened recently. We've got two classes in years five and six, one of 36 and one of 37. Some children moved to the area, one came into year 6 and has joined a class of 37, making it a class of 38. We suggested they went to Treowen, but they didn't want to go there. It is now going to be a class of 38. We did know the risk when we set the class up of course.

Would we be able to have the security from transformation to support with arrangements during the transition period? I've said before that the funding support we've had from transformation has been really helpful, particularly as we manage the early stages of this. Would we have some support in that?

Marianne Evans: We would need to look at that because obviously if the proposal goes forward, it is the Council's proposal and you know the ideal would be that you're on two sites for a year or two at the most, but I will say to you, it's a building project and everything you know there is risk with every building project, so we'll just have to be mindful of that as well. We wouldn't want to put any school at a disadvantage because of a proposal the Council is making, so it is something we have to look at.

Eurig Towns: I'm supporting Brecon schools now, there's three schools there coming together into one. They're still going to be on three sites initially. The question that governors there asked was 'What about if we decide to transfer children from one of the sites into one of the other sites?' But you could then put that other site at risk because you could then say, 'Oh well, when you got 28 in this school, transfer another 2 over' - what will be the impact on that? They're trying to think of them as separate sites at the time.

You're thinking at the moment could we transfer them there, but Treowen governing body and parents at the moment, they are probably thinking, well, what happens if they decide you've got spaces down here and you decide to transfer them down here without it being their choice. Where the parents are choosing for the children to go to school is very important. They've chosen to go there, your parents have chosen to come here, it would be their decision or your decision if they moved.

Governor: The proposal has taken that choice away, in respect of where we make those decisions if the proposal goes ahead.

Eurig Towns: It's the parent's choice where they can go to school, rather than the school choosing.

Governor: As a parent, if my child was starting school knowing that it's going to close in 12 months or 2 years' time, I wouldn't be sending my child there anyway. So, it may be that they lose pupils anyway.

Governor: Come September, or once this has happened, we may see this happen anyway, and we got to be ready for that.

Eurig Towns: It will be different then as it will be the parents making that decision, not the school. Yes, it puts added pressure on you, I'm not disagreeing with that.

Governor: What I meant as well, you could decide your year 5-6 children were up there, so that it may add to a year and your year reception to year four down here say and it worked in numbers, but you can't do things like that.

Marianne Evans: We're not proposing that. What we're saying is that all year groups remain on both sites. If this lasted for a longer time, it would be up to the governing body how it wanted to manage its pupil numbers. There is that option there, but we're not advocating it because we feel that the short-term measure until we get into the one site.

Governor: There'd be no option to bring it in for it to run from one site sooner? By bringing in cabins or something? Would that never happen?

Marianne Evans: I think the cost of bringing anything on here would be problematic.

Governor: Just to go back to redundancies, the decision for Phase 1 will be for the governing body to structure the school in such a way that it can operate with the numbers at the time and some roles may be redundant. The question I have is, at that point are all members of staff which are progressing through that merger, are they temporarily permanent members of staff? The governing body needs to make a decision regarding staffing levels across the two sites to make the budget balance for the three years, and that may include some redundancies, but are all the positions which are filled, are they temporary or permanent positions?

Helen Hinton: We wouldn't be able to change someone's terms and conditions of their current employment. If they're currently permanent, then they would remain permanent, and if they're fixed term, the same process potentially would apply depending on how long they've been in that post for. If someone has been in post for four plus years, they will have permanency rights.

It will absolutely depend on individuals and how long they've had those posts for and what their current contract is.

Governor: So that means in Phase 2, we would be looking at operating under a budget for a school on the same site. We won't have any concessions for being split across multiple sites.

Helen Hinton: Yes.

Governor: The arguments that we have heard today are that we've been through this process, we've had two schools merging. There have been redundancies, we have had a turnover of staff because of the knock-on health effects that the processes put them under. Will they have that again in 26/27?

Helen Hinton: There is a potential as you would be one staffing body. I think Marianne used that phrase earlier, which is really useful to understand that you would by that point be one staffing body, so the pot would incorporate the both the current sites. What we do have though is an opportunity to be forward thinking going forward if this is agreed. What we would do is we would advise you to look at not making any permanent appointments where possible, and to manage the workforce, by planning very tightly, to reduce and limit the potential for redundancies in the coming years. So whenever anyone leaves, you would look at whether that needs to be a replacement to start with, and if it does, what could that look like in terms of a fixed term contract? Looking at redeployment opportunities from now going forward through the years, and in the run up to any potential merger change.

Governor: The cost of redundancy at the point of Phase 2, if there were redundancies, would that be incurred by the school budget or from the transformation fund, because we would be one school operating at that point. Is that a cost we would have to absorb?

Nancy Owen: At the moment when we go through any transformation process, or any other situation where schools have to change their structures due to general pupil number changes where the savings attached to that mitigate the financial position, the authority currently has a corporate pot and I would foresee as long as that stays there that this would be applicable to that as it is for the rest of our schools. As long as that corporate pot stays there and it's still there at the moment, that pot would be eligible to be accessed by the school should it change its structure.

Governor: Just for clarification and if we as a governing body come up with a structure to set us off on September the 1st 2025 and I'm thinking leadership structure, would they be permanent beyond Phase 2?

Eurig Towns: You could put a temporary position in while you're on the two sites, which is what has happened in other schools that have operated over multiple sites, so that this can be reviewed when the school comes together on one site. This allows you the flexibility to ensure leadership across all sites in Phase 1, and this can then be reviewed. But any permanent positions you already have now wouldn't be affected because you are permanent whether you're on one site or two sites.

Governor: In terms of a school of 360, what would a typical management team look like then? A head, deputy and how many senior management are we looking at?

Eurig Towns: In Brecon at the moment they are looking at one head, one deputy and one assistant head, but they're also looking at putting in an additional assistant head whilst they are on three sites because they want a member of senior leadership on each site, but also the flexibility with one other person.

If you're looking at this now, you would probably think three members of the senior leadership team would probably be appropriate.

Headteacher: But we're already on two sites here, so we're officially on three sites.

Eurig Towns: You could have three then and then the possibility of four.

Governor: My other point is about staff wellbeing. If we look forward to 2027 potentially when we will be opening at the end of Phase 2, between 2019 and 2027, for 5 1/2 years out of these 8 years, staff have been part of a process, an uncertain time, and that's likely to have a low impact on their wellbeing. We felt it earlier in the meeting. I just think that needs to be in our minds as the staff of Calon Y Dderwen and now obviously Treowen will go through their process in the next four years.

We need to look at our staffing structure that we have at this school today because we're not business as usual. We're stressed at every possible point and it's a challenge to keep delivering this provision for the pupils that we have on roll, given the financial position, in the site that we're operating in. We're still not in one school site, we're still having communications issues of you're going from one side of the school to the other side of the school to access a senior leadership team member, you know trying to get there and we've still got issues with the ALN and the needs for the outside bodies to come in. We still haven't got enough provision for them to access the pupils that they're attempting to access on this site and yet in our new school build for the provision that we had originally for the new school, we've got two or three community rooms and now we want to chuck another 100 pupils.

These outside bodies, the community spaces aren't enough for the school build that we were planning, let alone to have another 100 pupils. It's always said that we have got a similar pupil mix between Treowen and here, we know the challenges that they have getting to school when they can walk along the river and for the report to say that there's low impact if they are travelling from Treowen to here. I think is a low impact if you have a car, if you're from a working family. If you're outside of that bracket, there is a high impact. This is a group of pupils that Calon y Dderwen are good at providing provision for, yet we can't because logistics means that Treowen can't move here, it's there where it is. My personal opinion is that the best thing for Treowen is to have a school that meets the needs that they have.

Governor: Just picking up on the transport around this. I don't know what the town loop does, but would that be part of this process? So the bus route could include an 8.15, 8.30, 8.45 loop around Treowen and the town centre?

Sarah Astley: It is something we could look at as we move forward and as we approach that new build. Also things like active travel and so on, those sorts of things would be part of what we would look at when developing the new building, but obviously that's a couple of years away.

Governor: Is the Maesyrhandir building in a good state?

Marianne Evans: No, is the answer.

Governor: Would there be a new building for them?

Marianne Evans: Given their pupil numbers, it would be unlikely that there would be a new build. However, we're aware of the condition of the building and we know what is needed. We would have to look at how we address those going forward.

Governor: Potentially in the future they could end up coming here as well. If their pupil numbers start getting lower again.

Marianne Evans: Theoretically, if you've moved into a new build and there are still spaces. Parents could apply from wherever in Newtown or even outside of Newtown, and if there is a place pupils can have that place. So theoretically, yes. Before this proposal came along, we always thought that the new building at Calon Y Dderwen would have some impact on numbers at other schools. What we were going to do was look at the impact that would have over the next few years on pupil demographics around town, as things could change. This would be Phase 1 to monitor pupil numbers, we'd need to see what would happen and then there may be changes so we would take it from there, but this has come in a little bit sooner.

Governor: We weren't informed of that information from the outset. It would have been really handy for us to have known that was your strategic plan all the way through. If we would have known that information then we could have fought harder about what information we were looking at when we were designing plans, looking at pupil numbers, it would have helped us.

Marianne Evans: When we're looking at towns, this town has got six primary schools in a very close proximity. In a town environment, things change in a different way to a rural environment. So quite rapidly, school numbers can change in an urban environment. When there's a new build, the pupil numbers in a town with a number of schools would automatically change. It's not as if we did not share this with you, but that was sort of where we were going.

Governor: We always wanted to look at increasing pupil numbers at Calon y Dderwen in the planning stage. If you're a parent and you see a lovely brand new all singing, all that school and your school building is looking pretty dilapidated, as a parent you'd be wanting to send them to the new building.

Marianne Evans: Interesting though that when Ysgol Dafydd Llwyd opened, pupil numbers went down, and they've only recently started increasing again. It doesn't always follow that a new build will attract because it's always the quality of provision that attracts.

Governor: Was it understood as to why the numbers went down? Was it accessing the education provision now which was on this site and as soon as it moved to the next to the high school? What was the reason for the reduction?

Marianne Evans: I don't really know why because it was the same headteacher. I think maybe what's happened now in terms of Welsh medium is that there is more visibility in this area around Welsh medium provision than there was maybe at that time and the numbers are growing in Dafydd Llwyd.

Lynette Lovell: We've seen that to be the case in Welshpool now as well, with the new build on the old site. The numbers through the Welsh medium have significantly increased.

Governor: When you look at Calon y Dderwen numbers in the consultation document, what we see is a stable projection. We built that as a governing body and as a senior management team, we've been building that well for the past 5 years. Now the proposal is to add variability to our structure, to add in more risk of having to manage the fluctuations in numbers. We were designing a school that services one need, now the needs would change which would add more continual uncertainty to the to the staffing structure.

Lynette Lovell: What we want to do as a local authority strategically is to build up our schools, so that we have schools with larger cohort sizes, so a two-form entry school for example.

Governor: I think a larger school is the way forward and I would be more excited for an even bigger school, but it's the space.

Governor: In terms of the balance of workload, in a smaller school, teachers are having to do everything aren't they? It does work, having been to Welshpool there was two 5 classes, so it works. My concern is the space.

Governor: We're losing half of our site, that is the issue. I do have a concern with larger schools in primary provision, we've seen it with post Covid. I've heard very good reports on how we prepared those children and how we engaged with Calon y Dderwen pupils during that that period because our staff have a responsibility, they look at our pupils and they say, well they're my responsibility. However, it wasn't the same for children in the high school. In secondary they have responsibility for an area of learning, not per pupil. What I saw was that from the secondary view in a larger school, they worry about their area of responsibility i.e. the subject, not the pupil as much. I'd be concerned about this if we become a big primary school where we have the capability of having experts or leaders of learning in different areas.

Lynette LovelI: I think that's more of a primary/secondary thing rather than a size thing. I inspected schools in Cardiff with 750 in primary and it came out excellent. I know the children here and I think this school does a really good job. The provision that you provide here is not about the numbers, it's about the team that you've got. I actually think a bigger school can provide that larger team with more expertise and a bit more flexibility. I mean where you see it acutely is where we have small schools where they haven't got the expertise to be dealing with those pupils and their individual needs. I think the size it is irrelevant in primary, I actually think the larger the school the better.

Eurig Towns: It's the approach isn't it – you're talking about secondary schools where you still looking at subjects or delivering through subjects and you don't get that same connection.

Governor: I think it's responsibility and accountability, it always comes down to that. People need to be held accountable for the responsibility they're given, and the responsibility needs to be reflective of what we're trying to achieve, and here at Calon y Dderwen teachers and the staff have responsibility for the welfare and learning of that pupil. My worry would be that a super primary would lose that.

Governor: I'm just worried if we don't plan for further forward, we could be chockablock. Unless we really know a picture of what is likely to happen down the line, we could be in a sticky situation. Numbers at Treowen might drop faster than we think.

Lynette Lovell: The building will reflect that won't it.

Governor: Would we be able to stop them coming in?

Governor: There are going to be changes to catchment areas too. The only catchment Calon y Dderwen have got now as it stands is Trehafren and Vaynor. We've lost Mochdre and Dolfor.

Governor: But under the proposal we will be gaining Dolfor.

Lynette Lovell: You couldn't have a situation in Newtown where one school can keep taking and taking and taking, there is a limit. It would be addressed through the admissions process, applications could go to appeals, but initially you couldn't go over the pupil admission number. We've had quite a lot of issues with some schools where parents want their children to go to a certain high school, but they are oversubscribed and they can't get in. That's how it would be, and that's how it is in a lot of schools in England – in Shrewsbury if you live in a certain place you can't get into the school.

Headteacher: In the proposal here about savings. Between Phase 1 and Phase 2 when we open on two separate sites, would we have two separate budgets which aren't too dissimilar to what they are now?

Nancy Owen: You'll be funded to acknowledge the two sites. It's funded basically as two separate schools in Phase 1.

Governor: We had a clarification regarding fuel because today at Calon y Dderwen we have two different primary fuel mixes. We have gas on one site and oil on the other one. Although we are classed as one site, we're really two sites regarding funding for the building provision. I would hope that if this goes forward, we have a budget that reflects running a separate site on another fuel mix.

Nancy Owen: We've just consulted with all schools on changes to the premises elements. When the Cabinet paper comes forward, we would update all the figures, rerun it through the updated funding formula. We've also consulted on additional learning needs changes, that can have that could have a positive or negative impact on you.

Governor: The last one for me that you can see in the figures here. The surplus for Calon y Dderwen in March 24 is projected to be at £61,000 in the document. I don't know if that's right or still accurate, and if we do expand and take on Treowen is our budget wiped clean as they were with Ladywell/Hafren?

Nancy Owen: No, because Treowen will physically close but Calon y Dderwen will still remain open in terms of carrying forward reserves and surpluses as they are, but as Treowen is physically closing that's a different matter.

Governor: Would we have their reserves added to our pot?

Lynette Lovell: No, but you wouldn't get their deficit added either.

Governor: You touched then about the new revised formula and working with SEN and ALN. We'd been working with pupils identified by another senior management team where we know there's no head in place currently. I look at the numbers for free school meals, ALN and English as an Additional Language, and I don't quite believe Treowen's numbers. They seem a little low, and that would impact our budget going forward if, once the proposal in Phase 1 goes ahead, and their identified numbers impact our numbers. Could this be re-evaluated?

Nancy Owen: In the regs, the authority has got flexibility, the scheme for financing schools. Ultimately most of it is determined by school funding regs. 2010, they give us that flexibility when we're opening a new school. I'll need to take advice on how that applies to Calon y Dderwen in this instance, so I'd need to come back to you on that.

Governor: It's the transition phase, once we've done a full 12 month period where we can make sure that we're happy with the numbers on PLASC it would be different.

Nancy Owen: I completely understand the point, but you'll have to let me take that away. I'll need to double check in terms of the legality of these funding regs.

Marianne Evans: There are lots of concerns about this proposal, but I would like to ask you as governors, can you see it working? Can you see the benefits in it? Because all we hear about are the concerns. There are benefits to it from an education perspective, it's the implementation of it that's tricky.

Governor: We can see the financial benefit for the Council, we know that there are budgetary issues and we've got to go for efficiency. For our own sake, it's our money coming out of our pocket so I can see the budgetary sense and I can see the argument for the provision. There's always a triangle of things if you're taking from one and you're giving to another and I do worry that the proposal will affect those of greatest need. I know families who are living in Treowen, in houses, flats with no cars. They are constrained in terms of where they shop even because they're on foot, let alone accessing education. None of them are working because they're full time caring for their children at the moment. These are the families of the future of Treowen and they will be accessing provision that's there today, but in the future it might be a struggle.

Governor: Also we need to think about the buildings that are all going to come up needing to be renewed at the same time. We're lucky because Calon y Dderwen has got a real opportunity and we've always been excited about the opportunities that we've got for our children. I would like to be excited about the opportunities for all the

children in Newtown. Those in Treowen would have to walk at least 10 minutes down the hill, which I would do myself, but I'm not so sure that everyone would. However, it I was in Maesyrhandir and there was a lovely new school here, I would want my kids coming here.

Governor: Everything we're saying and bringing up has obviously been listened to. There are easy fixes and there's little bit more challenging fixes like the bus loop and so on, making it affordable. But you asked the question if you can see it working, it will work if that's what the decision is. I mean, there are people here that are passionate about Calon y Dderwen and also are good at managing change.

Headteacher: It will work if the decision is to move forward. This will be not just because of a new building because but it will also be the provision inside and everything that will happen there. And this isn't just about Calon y Dderwen, I know that Treowen can bring so much to the party too. I'd be really excited about what they could bring as well because they are struggling maybe, but for them to come into here and show that they have strengthened, they have something to give. They're probably feeling a little bit like victims at the minute, but they can offer a lot of strengths as well, they need to realise what they can bring to us as well.

Marianne Evans: We met with the Learning Council this afternoon, and even the youngest ones were so aware of the potential impact of change on the children of Treowen school that they were saying they were saying things like we need to share things with them and when they come here we need to help them, maybe they'll be scared because they'll be too many children. They were really aware that they didn't want this to be seen as a takeover. That came from the youngest member of the Learning Council.

Governor: The fact that we're moving in at the same time as well, there's a fairness with the timescale.

Lynette Lovell: I just wanted to come in as well about governance, because you're strong governors here, and it would be fair to say it's really difficult to get governors across all the different schools. The level of need in Newtown requires good leadership, a good set of governors who really, really want to see the best for those children. I think in terms of what Calon Y Dderwen gives and what Treowen gives currently and what Maesyrhandir gives, it's about making sure that we get the right provision for those young people going forward, that the leadership is right and the governance is right.

Governor: It's nice to think we will be the first to do this, if this happens. However being the first does require effort. The learning continually of the failures that that we all make and collectively being the first worries me.

When we talk about the issues around transport, the health hub, it's all linked. Let's make it succeed and to make it succeed, we can't just think about this plan here and you're going to deliver that and you can deliver, it's really got to be aligned. Why can't we have a free transport system around Newtown? Remove the cars from the equation. Why are we talking about building car park provision taking space, when that could be used for learning?

Marianne Evans: I think you're onto something there. The North Powys Wellbeing Programme and the linkage there come in because that is forcing people to look at something pretty big in the middle of the town, which is complex. It could change things, couldn't it? That's potentially the lever to change a lot of things within Newtown to the infrastructure such as the transport.

Governor: When I'm looking at the town as a whole, we're situated in the centre, we've got a Health Hub planned but may not be executed. We're talking about transport problems, but equally we're talking about a Town Centre which has problems. We're talking about revenue problems for the Council, for business rates because there's no businesses no longer there to pay the business rates. The solution has got to be joined up. When we're talking about car parking with health, we're in Wales so you're not going to have someone pay for Back Lane Car Park. Make it free or whatever we need to do.

Governors: Linked to the new build of the school. Even though we have places left at Calon y Dderwen, I think are efficiency is quite high for the expenditure we have on pupils compared to other schools. When we have a new build site, if we're building for a capacity of 360 and the year on year reduction in population is 4%, I think it's predicted at the moment, if that is the case then the cost of running that school is going to increase year on year. The school's built, we have a static overhead to run the school. So, our efficiency is going to decrease year on year, but again choosing to put so many pupils in one site isn't our own doing. I don't know how that works out in the future finance model, but I think it needs to be considered that some things are just a static overhead of we've got this provision for this area and it's not based on pupil numbers. We wanted a super primary school, we've got one. This is the static cost, and then thereafter there's a there's a per pupil budget to account for staffing needs.

Nancy Owen: I think the new formula that we've got in place at the moment actually is really clear and more transparent than it's ever been before because it shows the cost of different sites. If you take for example the saving whenever it's updated for this current proposal we're discussing this evening, the main saving will come from the site element because we're providing top ups on top of the per pupil elements you get to keep the site running to a large extent, so having to fund so the formula will deliver a set number, set amount of funding per pupil for the premises element. However, if it's then costing X to run, we've got top up elements in there as well. The other element of saving then comes from any teaching and learning top up and class size protection top up we provide. So, I think it's really clear more than it ever has been before about what it costs for the current estate that we have in Powys.

Governor: Part of the new school build programme and it's not linked with Treowen specifically, but there's a cost to having a green building, for example, in that it's made of wood. In 20 years' time the roof needs recladding. Or you've got solar panels galore, but in 7 years' time, I guarantee you parts will need replacing, so you've got a bill for £10,000, but you're requiring those to meet the budgetary needs of a new school build. Where is this funding coming from? And if you don't have it, the work is not done, so we're not operating at the efficiency level anymore that we

should be operating under, and so fuel costs go up because the solar panels aren't working and producing back to the grid.

Marianne Evans: That's a national conversation with Welsh Government, they're setting the standard and they're saying they expect net zero by 2030, however at the moment there's funding per square meter that recognises the fact that we have to look at the energy elements. The question then to Welsh Government is around the cost of maintaining the stuff that makes them eco-friendly. Going forward, this is where Welsh Government need to have that longer term plan of who meets that cost. Because that could be a massive cost to authorities, or it could be a massive cost to schools if authorities pass it down to schools.

Governor: If the local authority is funding it then schools that are in older buildings will be saying hang on a second, they've just had a brand new school five years ago and now you've just given them a load more money to fix the stuff that you just put in.

Governor: Having more than one storey makes sense from an energy provision point of view, but what about lift, what happens when they go wrong? Who's servicing them? What's the maintenance contract? Who's paying for that? That's a static overhead to running a multi-level building for the teaching provision. I am worried that we're going to be pushed from a two storey to a 2 1/2 storey too, because we've only got the footprint we've got.

Marianne Evans: This is I think a conversation for future formulas, because the new builds will have different requirements.

Nancy Owen: I agree completely. We do work closely with the corporate energy management officer. But we need to probably make representations in terms of any pressures that are coming through from that. So you need to make sure any governors here are getting that into the school's forum arena as well and raised in that forum. It's something we need to look at and consider. I think it's just at the moment the financial climate is, as we all know, really challenging, but that doesn't mean to say that we can't make representations in any future finance resource models when the authority looks at the budget set in each year. But we do need that input from head teachers and governors.

Lynette Lovell: Thank you very much, lots of really interesting thoughts here. They will feed into the consultation. All of this will form part of the consultation but it's open to anybody to put any additional views in as well individually.

Lynette Lovell welcomed all to the meeting. Everyone in attendance introduced themselves.

It was explained that there would be a brief presentation, followed by an opportunity for discussion, comments, and questions to the Officers. It was explained that the meeting would be recorded for minuting purposes, but the recording would be deleted once the minutes had been completed and agreed.

Sarah Astley gave a PowerPoint presentation which outlined the background to the current proposals and the process.

The proposals are as follows:

Phase 1: Close Treowen C.P. School from 31 August 2025 and extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the former Treowen C.P. School site from 1 September 2025.

Phase 2: Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to move to a new building located on the existing Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site during 2026/27, and the Treowen site closes.

The consultation began on 15 January 2024 and will end on 26 February 2024.

After the consultation period ends, a consultation report will be prepared which will be considered by the Council's Cabinet. If they decide to proceed, a Statutory Notice would be published, and there would be 28 days for people to submit any objections they have. An Objection Report would then be prepared, and Cabinet would consider this report and make a final decision on whether or not to implement the proposal.

The indicative timeline included in the document was shared, however it was explained that this can change due to circumstances or the number of responses. The intention was that the Consultation Report would be considered in April, however there is a complication with this due to the Police and Crime Commissioner elections taking place in May, which means there will be no Cabinet meeting in April, so the Consultation Report will either be considered in March or May.

Following the presentation, staff were given the opportunity to ask any questions or to make any comments in relation to the matter.

Member of Staff: One of the things that's going to come through strongly in the governors' meeting tonight is that there's quite a lot of confusion as to why Maesyrhandir is not included. That would be worth covering in some detail, as that's not been understood very well as yet.

Marianne Evans: When we first started looking at this last year, we looked at whether we could accommodate all three schools on site or whether it would be two schools, and if so which two schools. In the end whilst the current Calon y Dderwen site is big, we only have half the site for the school development going forward, because the North Powys Wellbeing Health Hub are planning to build a health centre on the other half of the site, so that will affect how many pupils could actually be accommodated without having that pressure on space on the outside space etc. Having looked at this and carried out the engagement exercise, we concluded that only one other school could be accommodated.

We then looked at both Maesyrhandir and Treowen, and the data suggested a better match between Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Ysgol Treowen in terms of your ALN profile and your FSM profile in particular. Also, the fact that there's an acting headship here whilst there is a substantive head in Maesyrhandir – the head is on secondment, but there is a substantive permanent Head there. That makes a difference as well and that's the reason why the preferred option is to bring Treowen and Calon y Dderwen together.

Member of Staff: Our numbers are higher than Maesyrhandir, and we have more of an intake of pupils throughout the year. We were led to believe that would be taken into account here.

Marianne Evans: Your numbers are dropping and Maesyrhandir's numbers are dropping too.

Member of Staff: Ours were higher than Maesyrhandir's and we had a higher intake of children coming in, we had children constantly coming in, from different schools across the town.

Marianne Evans: We saw and met some of the pupils today, and yes, they were from different parts of the town. We understand that. However, the reasoning behind Treowen being chosen not Maesyrhandir is as I explained. We're here to hear your views though.

Teacher: The condition of our building is better than Maesyrhandir, so surely there's going to be some cost involved in maintaining the Maesyrhandir building.

Marianne Evans: Yes, there will be a cost but both schools have condition issues. Whichever one was staying open, there would be a cost associated with making sure that the buildings were maintained.

Member of Staff: One of the comments we touched on briefly is the SLT situation in both schools, and it's worded in the report that there is a permanent SLT in Calon y Dderwen but not in Treowen. I think it's fair to say that we haven't got a permanent SLT at the moment in Treowen because we're in this situation.

Marianne Evans: I acknowledge that, and thought this would be raised. However, we have to look at things as they are, and this is one of the reasons for Treowen coming in and not Maesyrhandir. Another thing I would say, if we had the whole site available to us, and the Health Hub was not being built there we could have a different proposal being put forwards which would probably include all three schools, so we are constrained by the space that we have.

How do you feel about the current proposal as a staff body?

Member of Staff: We could lose our jobs; we don't know what's what do we?

Marianne Evans: Rachel, could you talk through the impact on staff in terms of how it would happen if it happens?

Rachel Hudson: At the moment we are in a situation where we don't know if any change is going to happen. In the event we do get to the point where there is a decision that Treowen will close, we would then need to have a different kind of consultation with you as staff. This current consultation is about the proposal around

this school and Calon Y Dderwen. If a decision is eventually made to move forward with implementing that proposal, we would be talking to you about what that means for you as individuals, how we can support you as individuals, in the same way as we do with any consultation that affects members of staff when we are talking about making changes that would affect those members of staff.

This would include talking about opportunities to do something different, to undertake a different role and think about redeployment to other Powys schools or other roles within Powys, if we were in a position where there weren't enough positions.

Member of Staff: Will there be the same conversation with Calon y Dderwen staff, is it equal in this respect? When this was proposed, we were told that if we close, they would also close.

Marianne Evans: There is a difference...I don't think we said that.

Member of Staff: We're feeling a little bit as though we're not being treated fairly – they get to keep their school, their jobs, their name, we're feeling as though we are the poor relation, we've already drawn the short straw compared with Maesyrhandir, and now we're drawing the short straw in that we will lose our school, our name, our identity, in the short straw with Maesyrhandir and we lose our school, our name, our identity, it looks like we are the poor relations, like we need rescuing by Calon y Dderwen. That's just where I am.

Marianne Evans: When we were here last, we did explain that there were different ways of merging schools, and you're right, one way of doing it would be to propose to close both school and reopen a new school, so both bodies of staff would be treated in the same way. However, we did have to think really carefully about this one because Ysgol Calon y Dderwen have only recently come through that process when Ladywell Green and Hafren schools were merged.

Member of Staff: We've just gone through redundancies here, so we've had that process ourselves.

Marianne Evans: That's noted, but the issue here is that Ladywell and Hafren merged to establish Calon y Dderwen, and the whole staff went through that process as the school was only recently established, so we felt that we had to take that into consideration.

Member of Staff: You knew this though the last time you came to meet with us, because we talked about this last time, but you led us to believe that we would both close, because we talked about having a new name and uniform. So we were all led to believe that would happen. That's not exciting for us, but at least we would all be treated equally, it wouldn't be Treowen being taken over. But then we read in the consultation that none of that is happening, and we're just being pushed into them. I think it's a real upset for the kids.

Marianne Evans: I understand your views but just to explain, that's the rationale that we've put it forward like this as the model currently. I understand your concerns. Rachel, do you want to carry on explaining what would happen from a staffing point of view?

Rachel Hudson: Because there's a two phased approach, and assuming that it all does happen, come 1st September 2025 in theory there would be a school over two sites, so there would be a more limited impact on staffing, however we don't know exactly what that would look like and that would need to be worked out after the decision is made. One of the first things that would need to happen is we would need to look at the school budget and the staffing structure and all of those things, and that then would form the basis of the consultation, the employment consultation I was talking about a minute ago.

We would have to do that twice because there would be one consultation to move to one school on two sites and then once you've got the new building in place there would need to be another consultation to move the two sites to one site. I know it's hard anyway, but it is especially difficult when you are looking at that process happening twice.

Marianne Evans: It's really important that you feedback what you have fed back today, because we may not have got it right in our proposal. If you feel very, very strongly that both sets of staff need to be treated in the same way, that needs to come through in the consultation feedback. From our perspective, Calon y Dderwen staff had recently gone through the whole process, being at risk of redundancy etc, which is the reason for the current proposal.

Member of Staff: We've also been through processes though, and that was not mentioned in the report at all. It was mentioned how they've gone through processes, but we've faced redundancy in the last couple of years and people in the room that have faced redundancy.

Marianne Evans: And it's important again that comes through.

Member of Staff: What is the situation for Calon y Dderwen? In Phase 2? Isn't it the same for all staff from both sides? So everyone is impact as everyone is Calon y Dderwen staff? But in Phase 1 there's a difference there isn't there? But in that Phase 2 it's slightly different again, isn't it in terms of the staff groups from both sides? So, at the second stage everyone is impacted as everyone is Calon y Dderwen. However, in the PowerPoint it says to close Treowen and extend Calon y Dderwen.

Sarah Astley: That's the wording in the proposal. When we consult on something, we have to be quite clear about what it is we are proposing. So, in this case that's what we are consulting on. That's not to say that when we come to the end of the

process, we could consider all of the responses and views, and it might be that the decision is to look at a different option. It might be that the outcome is not to proceed with anything, it could be to proceed with the proposal as it is, or it could be to look at something different. And again, some other options came through in the meetings with Calon y Dderwen earlier in the week which will need to be considered. So it definitely isn't the case that a decision has been made to move forward, but we have to be quite specific about what it is we're proposing in the documentation.

Member of Staff: This has been years in the making, and I can't see all that money being wasted.

Eurig Towns: It has been done before when proposals have been put forward and County Councillors have decided that it's not in the best interest. That's the whole point of being transparent.

Member of Staff: Are the people who proposed this in the beginning and the Cabinet who will decide on the outcome completely neutral? I've heard that there are some people who wanted this to happen, which does not seem fair to me.

Marianne Evans: They are neutral on the Cabinet. This all started quite a number of years ago with all the changes. Calon y Dderwen was established, and that decision was taken by the last Cabinet. We were on the journey, we were designing a school for 300 pupils.

Member of Staff: When you say that this has been in the planning for years, that was a new build for Calon y Dderwen. Bringing in other schools in the area had not been in the plan, had it? That's quite a new development.

Marianne Evans: We were very surprised when we started showing the designs for a 300 place school to people within the Council including the Cabinet, as we were challenged straight away about whether we were building it big enough. Our job is to take on those instructions and look at whether we can act on them, so that's why we've ended up here.

The Cabinet are neutral, and what they have to do is consider all the consultation responses that come back, and they have to make their decision based on what they hear. So, the consultation aspect is very, very important.

Member of Staff: Thinking of the site then, the thought is that it's going to be a two-storey building. With regards to the new curriculum and classrooms needing access to outside areas, to me it doesn't sound as if it's going to work as the classrooms upstairs won't have direct access. Maybe it's going to fit, but all the wonderful lovely new things that we're supposed to be able to do with the new curriculum, if you're in a two-storey building stuck at the top, your outside space is going to be limited. Obviously, you're not going to build something that won't fit, but we have beautiful outdoor spaces at the moment. We've got access to the outdoors really easily. I'm

just trying to imagine letting the children have the freedom of going out and using an outdoor space when you can literally open the door and go outside. And if you're in a two-storey building, I don't see how that fits with all the plans you've been working on.

Eurig Towns: We have two storey school buildings, it can be done.

Member of Staff: There's also been that new school in Welshpool and teachers have been to see it. Do teachers have an input into the design? I hope they do have an input in the design and it's not just down to an architect that doesn't have a clue about the new curriculum and what is needed.

Marianne Evans: The architect works closely with the school as the design develops. When we were talking with Calon y Derwen about the designs, there were concerns about it being on two storeys. Lots of discussions happened, so that they could then see how it would work. The design always evolves and there is discussion with staff as part of this, so it can work.

Member of Staff: I know it might have been done before, but the people to outdoor space ratio would be very different down there on a school site with 300 or 400 pupils compared to what we've got here.

Access is a massive thing with that amount of pupils on the site. You've got the police station as well, and it could block the road for emergency vehicles. Getting your children in and out would be a nightmare – we try to avoid that part of Newtown already.

Marianne Evans: We picked up last time the issues around congestion, parking etc, especially with the Health Hub being developed on the site. What I can say is that work has been going on, on the master plan for the whole campus, which is looking at traffic flows, parking and safer routes to school. We're not building a school and then the Health Board are building a Health Hub, we have to look at the whole campus. However, if things go ahead the school will be built first.

Sarah Astley: The concerns we heard last time about congestion and the number of people on the site and so on, those are part of the reasons why the proposal is to move forward bringing two schools together and not three.

Member of Staff: So, are you building new roads? At the moment there's just that one narrow road, surely there has to be some sort of new traffic arrangements?

Marianne Evans: They're looking at it as a whole campus, the health element as well. It's a central part of town isn't it, and at the moment it's very congested.

Sarah Astley: As well as the roads and access there's active travel as well and walking routes and cycling routes.

Member of Staff: There's also just a little bit that needs mentioning in the risk section of the document. It mentions the risk that staff would get a bit wobbly and would leave. The risk is quite high, however the impact is noted as low. I don't think that reads particularly well for staff wellbeing – the impact of a professional leaving because of the situation was considered low impact. I think that was poorly judged in your report.

Marianne Evans: I'll take that on board. This did come up with Calon y Dderwen as well.

Member of Staff: What about the 3+ and early years?

Marianne Evans: Facilities for early years would be developed in the new building as well. However, there is already provision here. Here are facilities for early years being developed as well but we already have provision here.

Eurig Towns: At the moment the provision here will not change, we need the provision across Newtown. I also know the issues and support that you need at the moment. There is potentially when it moves to the one site, that could help the situation you've got now, such as when you need additional members of staff and things like that. If you were in a bigger provision, there would be more staff to help. But at the moment there's no change to 3 plus.

Marianne Evans: We've heard a lot on social media about the impact on the community of Treowen and Treowen being a strong community with its own identity. Is it worth elaborating a bit on that?

Member of Staff: It's difficult to elaborate when we've expressed our concerns on all these forms and things that you've asked us to do, but we haven't been heard. I know we are here to get our points across, but we've already been very detailed in the forms and questionnaires you've asked us to fill out. What we're telling you now is no different to what we filled out on the forms.

Marianne Evans: We understand where you are come from. From the Council's point of view, we have to look at Newtown as whole. If you look at Newtown and the number of primary schools it has got in a relatively small space, the Council has to look at if it can afford to keep them all running. is there a better way of providing education? Do we need to have larger schools? That's the Council's duty, but absolutely we hear about the community, about Treowen and the school being a strong part of the community. The Council also has to look at the wider perspective though, about how it manages its schools to fit within the financial challenges it has got.

Member of Staff: I think it's fair to say as a community there's a strong feeling that perhaps the voice has not been heard. People feel that they have let you know their

views and have responded, but how many more forms can they fill in. If they feel that they haven't been listened to, it's difficult to encourage them to continue to respond. Am I right in saying that there was more engagement from the Treowen community?

Member of Staff: School is not just the heart of the community; it is the community. I was on the sidelines when my boys were at football last night and one of the other mothers I didn't even know, went to Treowen, and she remembers and asked me how's it going. But it's the memories and bringing together of Treowen and that's what the school does along with the community hall. But the people that we deal with on a day-to-day basis, they'd be lost without us. We are like their anchor, and the thought of them walking down the hill to Calon y Dderwen it would have that impact on the community. It would just be awful for a lot of them we are their lifelines.

Member of Staff: They send their children to a smaller school for a reason. They don't want their children getting lost in a big school.

Member of Staff: We go to a house sometimes to get a child to school.

Marianne Evans: We heard that from the pupils themselves this afternoon. They're concerned about being part of a larger school and about little things like well, how do we find our way around. These things are important to the children.

Member of Staff: We've got the kind of children who struggle socialising, struggle around this many children. They struggle to be able to get into class or, you know, their anxieties are high, but they feel loved by the teachers. They feel comfortable, they feel a part of the school that they want to be here daily, even in their struggles. There is no way those children would be able to flourish if they were in a larger school because it's too much for them. There are too many people. We've got a high number of children like that. What are you expecting them to do? Just get on, or will they misbehave down there? Will their behaviours change because they can't cope? They'll be lost.

Eurig Towns: Our role is to collate the information to inform Cabinet. That's why we need to make sure you get those points across.

Marianne Evans: Ysgol Calon y Dderwen would also have a similar profile of children and the same behaviour issues.

Member of Staff: I know my child, for example, really struggles with too many things going on and too many noises. Put him in a school with another 200 children on top of the number of pupils in Treowen, if you have an assembly all together or lunch all together, suddenly that triples in noise, and he's not anywhere near what some of the children in this school are like. So, I just think, you know, they might have the same level of need, but then you're putting them all together and that's going to make it a lot harder for them.

Member of Staff: Some of our pupils don't live on the estate, they come to this school because it is safer and it is better. For others that do live on the estate, they don't have cars. You are stopping them from having a small school because they won't be able to walk that much further to be able get to small schools like St. Mary's, drive to Abermule or elsewhere. I'd just like to give an example of a lovely benefit of a small school, one of the boys in my class had his birthday a few weeks ago. Everybody knows each other in this school, you know every single person, and every teacher knows every pupil's name – you don't get that in a big school. And the boys started singing him to him in the corridor on his birthday. You would not get that in a super school, that would be lost.

Eurig Towns: I can't agree with you on that, when I was a head teacher at a school of 326 pupils I knew every single pupil. I'm talking from personal experience. I knew every single one of them.

Member of Staff: But everyone wouldn't know everyone else. Yes, the headteacher would know everyone's name, but here all the pupils know each other.

Member of Staff: I still struggle with the fact that Treowen is referred to as a small school. A smaller school to me is a school with 15 to 20 kids, not a school with 100 with the potential to get more in. We had an influx throughout the year until now because people know what's happening and it's putting them off. If this hadn't been announced, there's a good chance we would have had more pupils. This has impacted our numbers. I struggle with that term small school

Marianne Evans: The Welsh Government definition is that anything below 91 is classed as a small school. When you speak to colleagues from some other authorities though, they consider anything 200 to be a small school.

Sarah Astley: Just going back to the engagement and the responses from the school communities. We had 111 responses from the Calon y Dderwen community, 101 from the Treowen community, 55 from the Maesyrhandir community and 34 were unspecified.

Marianne Evans: Any other comments to raise, or queries? We fully understand your concerns. I know somebody has suggested as well that Cabinet Members come to the school for a visit and I think it wouldn't be a bad thing. The Cabinet Members couldn't visit these schools before they make a decision, but that does normally happen after the consultation ends, so that they can come and see and have a feel for the schools. It's really important that they see and hear.

Member of Staff: Yes, I would say that should have been the first action to be honest with you, it should have happened before the plans moved forward.

Sarah Astley: Councillor Pete did come and visit the school during that first engagement period.

Member of Staff: I'd say that anyone involved in that position will need to visit the schools and spend time chatting with some of the children. That would be nice. We've had a lot of visitors lately that just can't say enough positives about the school.

Marianne Evans: I know you've said you completed the questionnaires, but if you do have anything else that you want to say then please write to us, fill in the forms, or e-mail us. Everything will be taken into account.

It was explained that there would be a brief presentation with an opportunity for discussion, comments and questions to Officers afterwards. It was explained that the meeting would be recorded for minuting purposes but that the recording would be deleted once the minutes had been completed and agreed.

Sarah Astley gave a PowerPoint presentation which outlined the background to the current proposal and explained that in October 2023, Powys County Council's Cabinet gave approval to proceed with consultation on proposals affecting Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen School.

The proposals are as follows:

Phase 1: Close Treowen C.P. School from 31 August 2025 and extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the former Treowen C.P. School site from 1 September 2025

Phase 2: Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to move to a new building located on the existing Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site during 2026/27, and the

Treowen site closes.

The consultation period started on the 15th January 2024 and runs for 6 weeks, ending on the 26th February 2024.

After the consultation period ends, a consultation report will be prepared which will be considered by the Council's Cabinet. If they decide to proceed, a Statutory Notice would be published, and there would be 28 days for people to submit any objections they have. An Objection Report would then be prepared, and Cabinet would consider this report and make a final decision on whether or not to implement the proposal.

The indicative timeline included in the document was shared, however it was explained that this can change due to circumstances or the number of responses. The intention was that the Consultation Report would be considered in April, however there is a complication with this due to the Police and Crime Commissioner elections taking place in May, which means there will be no Cabinet meeting in April, so the Consultation Report will either be considered in March or May.

Governors were then invited to ask questions on the proposals.

Governor: My first question is why was Maesyrhandir taken out of the running for this proposal?

Marianne Evans: Thank you for the question. It was raised in the staff meeting as well. When we engaged with the three school communities in the summer, we looked at the responses that came back and considered everything in the round and we felt that the pupil profile between Treowen and Calon y Dderwen was closer than it was with Maesyrhandir, particularly in terms of ALN and free school meals. One of the other big factors that we had to take into account was, yes Calon y Dderwen have a big site currently, but half of that site is going to be used for the North Powys Wellbeing Health Centre. When we considered the feedback that had come up through the engagement around the impact on the space of bringing all three schools together on that site, that was a factor. One of the other factors that was looked at was staffing, the leadership here not being permanent, whilst in Maesyrhandir there is a substantive Head who is on secondment, so that was another factor. These were the main reasons, as outlined in the consultation document. Whether we're right or not, who knows, however that was where we ended up.

Governor: I'm under the impression that Maesyrhandir still actually only have an Acting Headteacher like we do?

Marianne Evans: They have a Head. The headteacher is away on secondment. So they have the Deputy acting up, I think. So, it's a similar situation but not quite.

Governor: So the one that's substantive, she's only part-time, isn't she? They don't have a full-time Headteacher.

Marianne Evans: No she's full-time.

Governor: She manages two schools.

Eurig Towns: The substantive role is actually headteacher at Maesyrhandir full-

time.

Governor: It was a cost saving measure for her to only be Headteacher part time.

Eurig Towns: Not necessarily a cost saving measure. That was an agreement between their governing body and another governing body that she would support that other school as well. However her substantive role is Headteacher of Maesyrhandir, full time.

Governor: The other thing is that we actually wanted to put out an advert for a full-time headteacher when our previous Head handed in her notice, however we were informed that this wouldn't be a good idea because of the current situation. So actually you've put us in a worse situation, a now you're using this against us.

Governor: I agree, this is a good point.

Marianne Evans: I think it would be up to the governing body to decide whether they wanted to go out and recruit. I think the timing then maybe, you know, affected whether to recruit.

Governor: I think we took advice as well.

Eurig Towns: Based on what we know from other schools which are going through a similar situation, that have gone through that, they've tried to recruit at that time. As soon as candidates have found out there is a consultation process there, they've found they've had very few, if any, candidates. So that's why the advice has been given. It's difficult to appoint a permanent Head to a school that's going through any form of consultation.

Governor: We understand that. I think the point is that it is now working negatively against us. And that's put us on the back foot.

Marianne Evans: It's coming back to the pupil profile and similarities between Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen, also that Maesyrhandir has a significant FSM and ALN percentage. It's difficult because actually if we had the whole site available to us at Calon y Dderwen, it may well have been a different proposal, and we could be thinking that we would put all three schools in. However, we don't have the whole site available, and that's why it's a difficult call. But we have to look at everything in the round.

Governor: It's quite hard for us to accept, because when you look at other facts, with the surplus spaces, the quality of the buildings that are there, there's quite a lot that goes against them as well and in favour for us. There was a little bit of an issue with our PLASC count that didn't have our ALN right, but we'd asked for help and were told don't worry, it won't be used against you, but then, of course, it happened. So, we have got more statemented pupils than actually was first stated.

Sarah Astley: The point is noted, however the PLASC figures are the PLASC figures, aren't they? And the information in the documentation is the latest PLASC figures that were available.

Governor: We're still saying we don't want that to be used against us because it is wrong. And we did ask for a bit of help but it's like, don't worry, don't worry. We don't want that to be used against. I'm going by the County Times article that put surplus spaces, they were classed over 50% surplus. We haven't. The state of building repairs. The ALN pupils. When you look at that. Free School meals, I don't think we're that far off.

Marianne Evans: When you look at everything in the round, it's a difficult decision, whether to include Treowen or Maesyrhandir because we can't include both.

Governor: But I think that's what we're feeling. It's not fair. Once you look at the facts it just seems a little bit unfair.

Marianne Evans: I know the concerns you have, I know the concerns the staff have, but in terms of looking forward, there are benefits this proposal can bring, you know. I know though that obviously in a difficult position because you're feeling it's a negative thing against Treowen.

Governor: And it has that knock-on effect. Now you've started it, we are going to see a reduced amount of people wanting to come to the school, people will be looking at other schools instead because it's the unknown. They don't want their child to start and then be two years down the line and they have to move to a different school. So it has had a detrimental effect by just having the conversation.

The question I have is what are the benefits for having a new school and what is that financial saving you're going to make by closing this one and opening a new school?

Marianne Evans: As you know, the proposal initially is for Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen to become one school. And we can discuss how that's going to be done. Then the plan is to build a new school, with all the pupils to move into the new building. So, in terms of going to a bigger school, the intention is that we build it for 360. We were planning for a 300-place school, so we've increased the capacity to 360 plus Early Years' provision plus the ALN provision within the building. And it's all part of the North Powys Wellbeing Hub, so there will be benefits from integrating the school with that health hub.

It will be a larger school, so I'm going to hand over to Lynette or Eurig to speak about the benefits of that.

Eurig Towns: Looking at the staffing there, and leadership, there would be more opportunities in terms of leadership at a bigger school.

Governor: How would that be different from this school? By being a bigger school, how will the staff have more opportunities?

Eurig Towns: Well, there are more opportunities for teachers, you could have Deputy Heads, you could have Assistant Heads as well. You'd have curriculum leads too and TLRs would come in as well. So more opportunities for people to lead. In terms of working with staff, you've got a larger staff body, but in the smaller schools perhaps you're leading across two or three areas whereas there you could have other people leading, you've got both Key Stage 2 and Foundation Phase, and opportunities to work together across the phases too. The opportunities to do that have increased at that time.

Governor: Is that an increased salary, though, for those people?

Eurig Towns: If they had taken on some TLRs or are Assistant Heads. There are opportunities for increased salaries.

Governor: So that's going to increase, that's going to add to the cost.

Eurig Towns: No because that would be part of the school's funding. If you've got a 360 school, you're then funded for a Headteacher, a Deputy Head and Assistant Head. That comes into your pot. So, it doesn't necessarily take additional money to do that. It just means you've got additional funding for those posts.

Governor: What's the minimum number of pupils you'd have to have? You say there would be space for 360 but as we know, in all these schools, there's always surplus. So what's the number when you start getting Assistants?

Eurig Towns: You're over 300 by the time you get Assistant Heads.

Governor: I think Penygloddfa got to about 300 and they didn't get funded for an Assistant Head. How many pupils are in Calon y Dderwen?

Sarah Astley: I'll open the document up to confirm the numbers.

Governor: There's about 230 in Calon y Dderwen, and there's around 100 here but I can't imagine all 100 would go.

Marianne Evans: But if you look at the projections, Calon y Dderwen stay fairly stable, although I do know they're having a larger reception group coming in next year. But then your projections were going down, even before we started this consultation.

Governor: We had a few big years at Treowen.

Marianne Evans: But to be honest that's the same across Newtown. And that's one of the issues the Council has to try and tackle with transformation. At the moment, by the time the new build opens, not earlier than 2026/2027, numbers would probably be around the 320 mark. However, with new builds there are risks. There are all kinds of things that can happen. But the issue I think we have though, and this is something we're going to have to think about if this goes forward, a new school could be attractive. Is 360 going to be large enough? So that's another dilemma.

Lynette Lovell: The issue with that is, as we said at the beginning about the engagement, when we were looking at Maesyrhandir, Treowen and Calon y Dderwen, we're looking for that site to actually be able to have 400 odd children on the site, and that's where we looked at the space and what we could do with the building. 360 is as far as we can go at the moment with that building but it will probably attract children from elsewhere in town, that's what happens initially when you have a new building. But there will obviously be a cap on the pupil admission number.

Sarah Astley: Can I just come back in on the numbers? So, the numbers in January were 251 at Calon y Dderwen and 105 in Treowen, so 356 altogether. However, if we look at the projections for January 2028, and I know they're just projections, but the projections are 229 at Calon y Dderwen and 78 in Treowen. So that's about 300 across the two. But they are just projections at the moment, and anything can happen, particularly in a town environment where there are a number of schools in a small area.

Governor: The benefits we have at the moment is that there are more opportunities for staff. But then if the numbers are not high enough then you're not going to get the funding for those opportunities for the staff.

Eurig Towns: There are benefits too in terms of the curriculum, from the staff working together.

Governor: How does this mean that the curriculum is better?

Eurig Towns: Because you're working together as staff. You don't have so many staff leading on so many areas. You're taking the skills of each staff member and using that rather than staff having to lead on two or three areas in most schools.

Lynette Lovell: What we'd be looking to develop is a community focused school, you've got a lot of it going on here, there's a lot of it going on in Maesyrhandir, a lot of it going on in Calon y Dderwen. We'd be looking at the new build to be a community focussed school. So, you've got wraparound, you've got Early Years facilities there. You've got a state-of-the-art building for the children to have that learning environment that will be a community focussed school. There'll be the facilities to enable them to have that multi-agency approach which I know you do here. You have the health board coming in too, that will be a feature of the school. It'll be a community focused school so they'll learn this multi-agency approach. Initially, until that build is ready, we're looking at retaining the school on two sites. We know the build is going ahead anyway for Calon y Dderwen, but if this proposal goes ahead, it would be at that point that the children would come together on the one site in the new building, with the facilities so that the children have those good facilities going forward. Personally, I've been very clear all along, I would like Maesyrhandir to be there as well because I think all of the children in this town deserve the best facilities going to ensure you've got that multi-agency community focussed school because research proves, that to get children out of deprivation, that community focussed, multi-agency approach is the way to do it. That's what I would prefer but we are constrained by the site currently.

Governor: I just picked up a couple of things from the consultation document. First of all, I'm sure you're aware of the error on page 51 with the finance, the figures should be the other way around.

Projected numbers worry me, in that essentially Calon y Dderwen stay the same, Treowen due to fall. They have fallen in the past but there's been no analysis to say what has caused that fall. We know that school numbers go up and down. I can think back to schools the Council was going to close 15 years ago which are now thriving. So, I wouldn't put too much emphasis on those projections. But one of the things that isn't in the document is an analysis of current travel. Where are the children who are going to Calon y Dderwen currently, travelling from? Are they coming from Treowen? So, is it already drawing from Treowen? Where is Treowen pulling pupils from? There's bound to be children travelling across the town from one side of the river to the other. And I think that's a big risk here. The projections are based on live births and I thought, well, isn't there something about why there are fewer live births on Treowen. Why are these numbers here projected? Is it just on a historic trend that might happen or is there something else? Have there been other developments?

There's no mention of all the building developments in the town. There are a lot of things going on that perhaps haven't fed into this. So that's the first thing about some of the data that is missing.

Sarah Astley: I'm just going to come in on the travel, on the home locations of the pupils. This information is included in the documentation, it is in the community impact assessment. It isn't in the full document but there is information in the community impact assessment. If I can just scroll down to the appropriate bit.

Marianne Evans: And before you go there, projections are tricky to understand as well, particularly when there are so many schools in a small area. I don't know the answer to why there's been such a dramatic drop in terms of Maesyrhandir and Treowen, so if you know why please tell us.

Governor: Sometimes when you're in an area their children have gone, their children are older, but they stayed in their house. So, you've not got a fresh, new family moving in.

Governor: The distance from here to travel to Calon y Dderwen is a major issue that needs to be looked at. What has happened in some of the surrounding schools? Are their numbers falling similarly? So, what is happening in Kerry and Abermule for example? Are they seeing them still drop or are they attracting as well?

Governor: Penygloddfa is the other side of town. Their numbers have gone down as well. When I started it was 300 and they're down to 270 now. So, it has dropped.

Marianne Evans: Interestingly, some of the schools outside town, such as Caersws and Llandinam. Llandinam basically stayed the same, so very small numbers, 20's and 30's. Caersws was around the 40 mark but now they're up to about 70 and predicted to grow. So that change has happened in very recent years.

We get these projections from the statisticians, they are based on live birth data and the pupils currently within the school. But we also look at the November counts projections which the Finance team take from Teacher Centre and get from schools as part of their 3-year budget projections.

However, we are required to put five-year projections in by Welsh Government. So, we use the one we get from the statisticians, but we also consider the Finance count information, which may be a bit more realistic.

Governor: You can't know the numbers in five years' time, they're not even people who are pregnant at the moment.

Governor: We've had 3 new starters this half-term, which sounds small but when you look at the numbers...

Marianne Evans: The live birth projections that we get from the statisticians are pretty robust when you look at a whole catchment, when you look at the county because they're at that level. When you get down into the smaller, individual schools that model may not be as accurate.

Sarah Astley: It's also why we regularly look at the live information which is on Teacher Centre. PLASC is the standard data set, but we do try to include live data as much as we can, but again that can change daily, weekly.

Marianne Evans: The other thing is that the projections don't take account of any changes in the local area such as a housing development, or even refugees, or things along the lines of the pandemic.

Sarah Astley: In the Newtown area there is a lot of choice available in a small area.

Do you want me to come back on the pupil locations? The information is in the document as a percentage rather than individual pupils because sometimes it's a low number of pupils and to avoid the risk that individual pupils can be identified. The information is based on pupils attending the school in June 2023, and at that time, Treowen was the closest school for 63.7% of pupils attending Treowen. Then Maesyrhandir was the closest school for 16.9% of Treowen pupils, Penygloddfa for 9.7%, St Mary's for 8.9% and Calon y Dderwen for 0.8%.

Governor: You're saying about the live birth rate, and I know you've just covered a bit of it, but I've never lived on Treowen, not since I was a child. I live in the Maesyrhandir catchment area, and all my children went to Treowen because that's where I chose to put them because I didn't want them to go to Maesyrhandir. I also know that there are at least 6 other children that live on Maes-y-Dail that come to Treowen school so they chose that school because of that, not because of where they live. You're basing facts on where people are and what their closest school would be for their catchment but that's not actually how people do it. They go and look at the schools.

Sarah Astley: And obviously that pupil location data is reflective of that.

Governor: But what about wider places? You've only said about people in Maesyrhandir, Treowen nearer to Penygloddfa area. One of the governors lives in Llandinam but brought her son to school in Treowen.

Governor: I know of someone who lives in Bwlch y Ffridd who was going to apply for a place for their child here, but since this consultation started they've changed their minds. Would I send my son to a school for 2 years to all of a sudden up-sticks and move into another school? No. So, it's going to have a wider knock-on effect than what's actually on paper.

Marianne Evans: Every time we start reviewing a school it does introduce a period of uncertainty and there's no getting away from that. Parents make decisions based on all kinds of things, don't they? The quality of the school, the convenience, because it's on the way to work, is it English-medium, is it Welsh-medium. There's a lot of parental choice, particularly in a town where you have got quite a number of primary schools in a very small area. So, we take all that into account, but parental preference is something you can't really measure.

Lynette Lovell: In terms of parental preference, parents do have the choice to go to whichever school they choose, although they may not get the transport. But it's interesting because you were mentioning that 60% of pupils here live closer to Treowen, but does that mean that 40% from Treowen go elsewhere?

Sarah Astley: No that's just the pupils coming here. We have the information for Calon y Dderwen but it's a bit different because of the school's location. It's not as close to housing. So 54% of pupils attending Calon y Dderwen are closest to Maesyrhandir, but that could be pupils in areas of town like Vaynor or along Llani Road. Treowen is the closest school for 11.9% of pupils at Calon y Dderwen.

Governor: From Treowen 11%. That's 20-odd pupils. So if they came here that would be another 20 pupils in this school.

Governor: Forgetting catchment areas now. Going back to the parental choice, and pupils, because pupils are the most important thing in all this. And the parents are choosing for pupils, for their children, to come here for a reason. If they want to be in a larger school, would they not be choosing that now? What is it that makes them want their children to go to Treowen? I personally know what it is, and that's the reason I send my children here.

Governor: I didn't grow up on Treowen, I grew up on Trehafren but my mum decided on Treowen. I asked why I didn't go to Ladywell and her straight honest answer was because I like the feeling of Treowen School and I like the feel of the staff and the environment.

Governor: And that's why I sent my kids there.

Governor: They do have a choice, but I think a lot of the time parents that come here walk into the school and get a feel the minute they come in here.

Governor: I presume there's space there in Calon y Dderwen, so why are the pupils coming here now and not Calon y Dderwen?

Marianne Evans: Is it because this school feels more like a village school? It's on top of the hill.

Governor: Would you lose that in a large school? I know you say you would prefer for all 3 schools to be included, and I appreciate the multi-agency thing because I would want the best for my children in that sense and for the children I work with now. But when I send my child here knowing they've got whatever issues, health issues or whatever, I'm confident that every member of staff in this school is aware of who those children are. They can spot in an instant if they are not themselves. They know when to take them off for little chats. And I mean that for any of the children here. Would you get that in a larger school? If a child walked past the Headteacher, he instantly knows their name, what class they're in, their

temperament, if they're out of sorts. How can a Headteacher or any teacher be able to do that with a school of over 300?

Eurig Towns: I can answer that. I mentioned earlier when we met the staff, my history has been as a Headteacher of a school of more than 300 pupils. I knew all the children there. I knew them instantly. I talked to them, their families at the gate in the morning, but I would also say the staff knew those children very well because they have to. It's part of your role as a teacher, as a teaching assistant. You know your children very, very well. So I would say, yes, they can. It's how you build it up. The school is only as good as the staff that are inside it. OK, I can't say every single school is like that, but you can make a school a community. It doesn't matter what size it is as long as you've got the people there who are driving that.

Governor: And have you got, I don't want to say proof of that, but from other schools, have you got proof of that?

Eurig Towns: We've got schools right across Powys that are doing that. My role is going into schools with the School Improvement Team to go and have a look at those. We work with some of the largest schools and we work with some of the smallest schools. It's not how many pupils but how are you teaching those pupils. Are they getting quality education? That's what we look at when we go into schools. That's what we said to you in Treowen, you provide a good quality education to your pupils, but we can also go into Calon y Dderwen and then go, hey, you're doing it as well. You do it in a different way, but you're still able to provide that quality education.

Governor: I think that's what worries me, that if we are doing those things, we're showing that we are providing a high level of education, we're providing the pastoral care of our children. We're bringing in multi-agencies. We've got all that going on. What are we doing wrong?

Eurig Towns: The reason for the closure is not because of the quality of education. That's not the reason why it's closing. We recognise that and that's in the report as well. We're not saying you're doing anything wrong.

Governor: But I just think it's Treowen staff and pupils that are losing out.

Eurig Towns: I think that's why it's important to state, we're not saying you're doing anything wrong educationally, that you're not supporting pupils. You're actually doing a good job. We can also say that at Calon y Dderwen.

Governor: But I still feel it's us that are missing out in this new proposal. Originally it was proposed to us that we would merge together under a new name, new uniform, new school. In this new proposal we are just joining them and everything about Treowen is gone and there's going to be an imbalance in the staff because of that.

Lynette Lovell: This is a consultation and, as we said earlier, there are times in the past where things have changed following the outcome of the consultation.

Governor: We've spoken about how we are feeling because it looks like Calon y Dderwen will carry on but it's us going to have to walk downhill, our pupils that will have to change their uniform and be the newbies. It's almost like starting a new school. And it's us that's going to have to fit in the way that they're doing things instead of it being a collective joint enterprise.

Governor: My child is in Year 6 and came home tonight and said, 'Oh my God mum, you want to hear what I've just heard today in school. We're going to have to have a new uniform but their uniform, not our uniform.' How sad is that for kids to come home and say we've got to have their uniform?

Marianne Evans: That's if it happens, and no decisions have been made at this stage. We had a really good session with the children today where we explained to them that this is just an idea at the moment and no final decisions have been made.

Going back to the point about staffing, I explained in the staff meeting, when we came to meet with you in the summer, that there are different ways of doing this. One is to close both schools and open a new school. I'm going to have to explain here because I think it is important. The reason we proposed it this way is because Ysgol Calon y Dderwen is only newly established and has recently gone through the merger of Hafren and Ladywell, so have gone through all that upheaval. The staff quite rightly pointed out that you've also gone through upheaval here in terms of redundancies in the last few years and I think we may not have made that explicit in the consultation document. But in the report that goes back to Cabinet, we will explain that you have already gone through similar issue and challenges.

I'm going to have to say here that we met with staff at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen on Monday, and they're not happy about it either, let's put it that way. And one of the issues for them is the perception that they will seem to be 'top dogs'. So, I think if this goes forward and during the transition period before it all happens, a lot of work will need to be done to make sure all staff feel involved in the development of this new proposal. A lot of work will have to be done with both groups of staff and pupils for parts of it, and the Calon y Dderwen governors were also extremely mindful of the delicate nature of this going forward. They've got change fatigue, that was what we had from them because they've already managed a number of years and they've been in the development of the design of the new building. So, Calon y Dderwen have serious concerns about this as well.

Sarah Astley: It came through in all of the meetings. It came through with the pupils who themselves were concerned about Treowen Pupils, potentially feeling like they were being taken over. It came through with staff and it came through with the governors too. So, it's something that already they're very mindful of.

Governor: You mentioned that they have had input into the building, should this all go forward, we would have as much opportunity as them?

Governor: Has it ever been considered that the Calon y Dderwen site just becomes a Health Hub, and that a new school is built here on this site? So, keep that as a Health Hub, make that a centre of town Health Hub, then the Super School built on this site. Has that been considered?

Marianne Evans: It hasn't been considered.

Sarah Astley: The current Treowen school site probably wouldn't be big enough for a school of the size needed though.

Governor: You were thinking previously about having a Welsh all through school on a field near to the school. So there is a potential of still keeping a school here.

Governor: I was just thinking really in regard to the discussion around decreasing numbers and considering the impact that that potentially could have on staff and teacher retention, and also obviously if numbers are dropping would that have an impact on funding for Treowen prior to anything happening? And just thinking about stability for the current teachers who are there if the transformation were to go ahead. What would that look like really for staff? Have there been any assurances, is that something that's been thought about? Basically, if numbers are dropping would there be pressure on the school if the budget wasn't as much because the pupil numbers are lower. Would they have pressure then to make redundancies prior to any transformation if it were to go ahead?

Lynette Lovell: Mari, do you want to come in on this? About the dual sited school and how they're funded during the transition period if this were to go ahead, and if numbers did drop here in terms of teacher retention and staff retention here during the transition period? How the budget works.

Mari Thomas: The current funding formula is largely based on pupil numbers. But there are top ups then for smaller schools. So, you would still get the same top up in terms of premises and the small class top up as well, so those pupil numbers will affect the budget. And I think maybe it's something that we would need to consider if the impact of this proposal, if it goes ahead, was to have a significant impact on learner numbers, and then therefore your budget, that is something we would have to take into consideration. We know that budgets are extremely tight at the moment across the board. There are a lot of difficult decisions being made both within the Council and across Powys as well. We'll have to take it step by step really and obviously within all those budget discussions, be mindful of the situation the school's in if it is decided to go ahead with this proposal.

Lynette Lovell: Rachel, can I bring you in on that one, in terms of if the proposal goes ahead and on one site the numbers go down? In terms of staff retention, if the

proposal goes ahead to be one school, it would be one school so everybody would be in the same pot?

Rachel Hudson: Yes, that's my understanding of how it would work. I think that part of the question was around what if numbers drop regardless of whether this proposal were to go ahead. I'll just echo what Mari said around the funding being based on pupil numbers and, if the school were to find itself in the position where I know it's been previously, of having to consult on redundancies then that could happen regardless of whether this proposal was to go ahead.

If the proposal did go ahead, and there was one school from the 1st September 2025 and the numbers were lower after that point then it would be one school, a collective. So, any risk, I can't think of a nicer way of saying it, any risk would be across the staff group of the new, enlarged Calon y Dderwen.

Governor: I think what I was referring to as well, is if there was a drop in numbers between now and January from PLASC say, for example, if that had an impact because obviously there's been talk in the community around what's going on and already governors are saying, parent governors are saying, that there are people who are not choosing to come to Treowen irrespective of whether or not it does go ahead. I think that must be a concern for the staff currently in school. So, what can happen to safeguard them really? And I understand there's budgets, and I understand there's funding formulas, but you know staff, parents potentially, are voting with their feet because they don't want to uproot children. So, I do think that's a worry for the staff. It absolutely must be and through no fault of their own. It isn't because Treowen isn't a good school. It's because of the uncertainty that they don't want to put their child through that uprooting later down the line even though nothing's been confirmed yet.

Lynette Lovell: It is the case that it's a pupil led funding formula and the number of pupils does make a difference to the budget that you get and the staffing, and Treowen has been through it...

Governor: I'm here tonight as a member of staff. Obviously, I know what's going on but we put a brave face on. We come to school and our main focus is the wellbeing of children and ensuring they still get the same learning opportunities, regardless of whether our jobs could be at stake or whether we're going to have to reapply or merge. Tonight, I'll probably leave this meeting feeling completely deflated, thinking OK it's time to really start thinking about what's going to happen as a member of staff.

Governor: If an opportunity comes up, they might think about going because will that opportunity come up for them again.

Governor: Sorry to jump in but the points that were made in the staff meeting, are we repeating ourselves?

Eurig Towns: It's fine to repeat because obviously the governors are here, and they didn't hear earlier on. So, we're happy to answer those questions again. Don't feel you can't say it again. We'd prefer you said it again, covered it twice, than to feel it's only been said once so perhaps the governors haven't heard the answer.

Governor: We'd have to apply for our jobs when we're Calon y Dderwen staff because that school, they're safe, and we're not. That was the main point, wasn't it?

Marianne Evans: I think, as well, it's worth pointing out here because it's in the documentation that there are staff implications twice with this proposal. If this proposal goes forward as it currently stands in the way we're proposing, there is an impact on Treowen staff during the initial joining with Calon y Dderwen because you have to go through the management of change process. However, there would still be a site here, there would still be education delivered here during that first phase, so that would need to be staffed.

But it's really worth pointing out that when the new school, the new building opens there would need to be a review of staffing structure again because, at that point, it's all of the staff going into the new building. The governing body would, by then, have had to look at not only the school, but how many classes, what the class structure would be, how many staff would there need to be and so on. So, there'd be a double staffing review needed.

But at Calon y Dderwen, even though they're not directly impacted in the first stage, they were very concerned about the second stage because they've just come through it as well. So, it's not to say everything's great for the staff at Calon y Dderwen, because it would be one staffing body and everybody's in the pot as you go into the new building. With all the new buildings, Welshpool Church in Wales, there were 2 restructures. Brecon Primary School – we're setting up a new primary school in Brecon, merging three schools into one, first on the three sites and then into a new build – we're going through exactly the same conversations there. So there will be two lots of staffing reviews, I just needed to put that out there.

Eurig Towns: Your point is there'll still be a school here on the 1st September 2025. You will still need staff here. Whatever number of children you have in 2025, you will need to staff that, whether you are part of Calon y Dderwen or whether you are Treowen.

Governor: At the rate children are going to look at other schools we might not need them. We might not need all the staff in 2025 because the amount of children might not be here because they're seeing their education threatened.

Governor: As a parent, I can honestly say if this does go ahead as of September, my child will move from here. And I'm not the only parent. I've been to all the schools in Newtown now. I don't want my child to go to a big school, I don't think he'll cope,

so St Mary's is a school I'm looking at and I know that school can't get affected by merging. I don't want my child's education to be affected, so I'm acting before it can get affected.

Governor: I wouldn't send mine either. I agree, if this was to go ahead, I wouldn't put my children into Calon y Derwen because I know full well that my children wouldn't cope in a bigger school. It's one of the reasons I chose Treowen. It had a nice family feel without being a big school. It had the feel of a small village school while it's not. Obviously when I put my children into school, they were closing most of the village schools, so there wasn't the risk of the school closing. But it still had the nice feel of a village school where there wasn't a lot of people. My children weren't going to fall through the net of we've got so many children. There's a lot of demand because it is a smaller school so the staff have the ability to be able to help those children in a better way that they wouldn't have in a bigger school.

Governor: I have to echo what has been said. I brought my son to Treowen school. There were nine schools closer to me but Treowen was the only school that I felt could actually provide what my son needed because of his medical conditions. As soon as he went to high school, that fell apart very quickly. He was in High School for, I think, two terms before he was declared medically unfit because neither the school nor he could deal with his medical conditions. So there are a lot of children that being in a bigger school isn't' going to be a better thing for them. Everybody likes to say, oh yes, there are going to be all of these facilities, but in actual fact, generally bigger schools don't work well for children who have a lot of needs. And they do fall through the net.

Also, we've discussed decreasing pupil numbers but in the documents you've put together, have you considered all of the new developments? There are a lot of new developments in Newtown right now. There are 38 houses being built a couple of hundred yards away from Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. Have you considered how many children are going to be going to Ysgol Calon y Dderwen from that development because that is going to be their closest school? There's another big development by the by-pass. Have you thought about how many families are going to be coming into those properties and going to this school?

Marianne Evans: In terms of housing developments, the projections don't include housing developments, but this is something we've been pushing for a while in terms of any housing developments need to be factored into pupil projections. So that's an ongoing discussion that we're having. There is a ratio for housing developments that the planning department use. One new house yields 0.45 of a child. That's the calculation used. However, that's not an exact science because it depends on the type of houses being built. If you have one-bedroom houses versus houses with 3 or 4 bedrooms for example, or if it's social housing. There are a different range of permutations within that, but we do look at what's happening in Newtown. It's difficult to factor in the impact of the estates towards the bypass because I think that would be closer to Maesyrhandir from there.

Sarah Astley: That's part of the whole Newtown picture as well. Although housing may have an impact on overall pupil numbers, there is capacity elsewhere in Newtown, in Maesyrhandir, Dafydd Llwyd, St Mary's, as you mentioned.

Governor: Is Newtown one of the towns that has the highest amount of primary schools in Powys? Because we have got quite a lot.

Marianne Evans: You are. If we look at the four main towns. Welshpool had four primary schools, three infants and one junior which we amalgamated into one English school and one Welsh school.

Governor: What's the success rate of that Welshpool?

Lynette Lovell: In terms of Welshpool Church in Wales School and the Welsh Medium School, they are very successful schools. Welshpool Church in Wales School is around 300 pupils, with very good provision for ALN, and a case study with Estyn for young carers. They've got something like 25 young carers going into that so it's really a good multi-agency school, working effectively.

Governor: Have you got statistics of the pupils that come in, start and then go because maybe it's not for them. Is there a statistical figure of that?

Lynette Lovell: We'd be able to get that. I think it's pretty much when they go there, they stay there, there's not a huge drop off.

Marianne Evans: The situation previously when we had the four Schools, and John will probably remember this, there was a draw out of Welshpool to the neighbouring village schools: Leighton, Guilsfield and so on. What we see now is that children in Welshpool tend to stay in Welshpool, so they're not choosing so much to go out to the village schools because of the success of Welshpool Church in Wales. And the Welsh school as well. That's growing too.

Jumping down into the next town, Llandrindod, two large primary schools, one English medium, one dual stream. Both large.

Then Brecon has quite a few – six - but three are being merged to create one new school. Ystradgynlais went from ten or eleven to four across quite a large area.

Governor: Based on population and number of schools, we're quite high in Newtown.

Eurig Towns: In Ystradgynlais, there is deprivation in that area, and there is strong evidence that the larger schools there are meeting the needs of pupils. Again, case studies from Estyn have come in and looked at their provision for pupils, to support

the daycare to their families as well. So, there's some evidence that that can work OK.

Governor: Just a general comment really. I'm not a stranger to school closures, but this is different because unlike other schools that actually close, it's not a small school, it's not in a deficit budget, it would have had a headteacher, and standards are good. These have been the reasons in the past mainly why schools have been closed. I think this proposal is just an opportunity. I think it's short sighted and it doesn't address the Maesyrhandir position, and you should have really considered Newtown as a whole and said what does Newtown need? You mentioned Ystradgynlais which was a big reorganisation and has been successful, you mentioned Welshpool, how that was done to the whole town. You're just looking at this one bit here because you have a chance to. There's an opportunity for one school between us and Maesyrhandir. That would be my preferred option if there was land and funding about. And that's why I'm saying I'm against this. I think you're missing an opportunity. There is a community here in Treowen, you risk losing that. I have no problem with a larger school and the advantages you talked about I fully support. But this isn't the right solution for Newtown.

Sarah Astley: It's very interesting, that option came up in the Calon y Dderwen governors as well and there were questions as to why that wasn't considered. And the reason it wasn't considered now was because, as you say, the starting point was Calon y Dderwen and the new building. However, the consultation is an opportunity to suggest alternative options.

Governor: Option 3B could have said close Maesyrhandir and increase the numbers here. Or 3C, two schools together. That's not going to happen overnight. It's still going to be upsetting in terms of things that goes on. I still think there's a better solution.

Marianne Evans: I wouldn't disagree with you, and that is probably where we were a few years ago. I'll be completely honest, as you know we reviewed Newtown years ago and the first plan, first phase of that was Hafren and Ladywell, let's sort that out, let's build the building let's see how numbers in Newtown pan out, what happens then. And then obviously there is the North Powys Wellbeing development. Would that potentially release the hospital site? You can't do Newtown all in one fell swoop because we're relying on space being available. So, we were going down this route looking at developing the plans for Calon y Dderwen and were asked to look at this increase in size, and if we had the full site, I would probably say that would be the solution for these three schools. We haven't got the whole site though so this...

Governor: It's a half solution.

Governor: Before Covid there was talk, like I said before, about an all-through school possibly being put over here, which would then free up Dafydd Llwyd with the possibility of Maesyrhandir and Treowen moving in there. That would have been a

better option I think because you've got Maesyrhandir coming so far and Treowen only going to the bottom of the hill as well. You could give them what they needed in the building.

Can I just ask on class sizes? If this goes ahead what are the predicted class sizes in the new build because, now I haven't read it in detail, but I've had a flick through, I'm sure I came across something that said there could be class sizes of up to 60 with the main teacher but more support in general. That then, for me, flags up issues. Are we cutting down on teachers, increasing TAs?

Marianne Evans: The new build is currently being designed. The building bulletin guidance, which is the basis for any school design, says classes need to have 56 square metres. That's the minimum. Calon y Dderwen is being designed with classes that are slightly bigger than that, which is an issue because we have to justify to Welsh Government why we're building them bigger. Ysgol Calon y Dderwen would like them to be even bigger. So we're looking at classes of 30, but it could be because of the numbers at the two schools combined, you could have a Year Group of 60.

Governor: So one teacher for 30 and another teacher for 30.

Sarah Astley: Just to go back to the documents, there is no reference to classes of 60, however 60 is the total number of pupils currently in year two across the two schools. That is the largest year group of pupils across the two schools. But it does not say that pupils would be in classes of 60 pupils.

Governor: Could you guarantee two classes being here? Because with the numbers we support that would be an issue. Single year group classes would be the ideal, that's what you should be planning for. That's why I'm a bit concerned over the numbers, and because the numbers are due to fall, it's difficult to plan. I would hope, if you're going to build, you would build for 12 classrooms plus office so that you could do two classes.

Governor: I'm just backtracking a bit. When you were talking about the new builds, one of the comments was that the new builds that are being built just outside of Newtown by the bypass would come under Maesyrhandir area, well there's a new build that's being built right by the train station and that would fall under Treowen catchment.

Marianne Evans: Point taken. Noted.

Governor: We've got fab relationships between the schools in Newtown, and with Calon y Dderwen and Carl as well. We said from the very beginning we certainly didn't want to put us against them, so there's no hard feelings whatsoever between the personnel at the schools, we don't want to damage that.

Marianne Evans: We know there are sensitive situations here. The minutes will be written up, and we'll make sure that you're happy with them.

Governor: If we think about the way forward, and about positions. Should the proposal go ahead, when could we expect to learn more about positions, opportunities for leadership, TLRs, AOEL Leads, TA, 1-1s?

Rachel Hudson: As with most things in HR, it depends. In the event that the decision is made on the timescales we're looking at, the next step would be to work out what the budget is for the combined, bigger Calon y Dderwen. From that, it would then be for a staffing structure to be worked out and to be proposed and consulted upon. So, we would have 12 months before the before go-live date, if the timeline works as it is anticipated. I would expect that to happen around spring 2025 in preparation for the September 2025.

Governor: In the document it says that this school would cease to exist, so the governing body would cease to exist and Calon y Dderwen governing body would continue as they are. There needs to be some representation from governors currently at Treowen school as well.

Marianne Evans: Calon y Dderwen were mindful of this as well. Interestingly Calon y Dderwen opened in 2021 so by 2025 it'll be four years, and four years is the term of the governor. So, there would be vacancies in terms of governors by then, for example parent governor positions would come up, staff governor positions would come up. But I think what's important is that we make sure that there is representation from both schools on the governing body in some way, even if the structure of the governing body means that, for example, you can't have a staff governor from the two schools.

Eurig Towns: Calon y Dderwen are keen on that because they want to work together. You're also saying that you would want to make sure that everyone works together. It's not pitting one against the other.

Governor: I do have a comment about the terminology for this process? Merger - are we all agreed on that it's not merging?

Marianne Evans: Technically it's extending the capacity of Calon y Dderwen to include another site. So, what we're trying to explain, is that it's about merging with Calon y Dderwen. What we are all keen to avoid, including Calon y Dderwen, is the word takeover. It's similar to the situation we had with Newtown High and John Beddoes back in the day. So it was extending the capacity of Newtown High to include the Presteigne site. But basically, it's joining together. Joining is the right word.

Governor: What would be the outside space? What green area would there be? Obviously, some space would be lost because of the campus being shared, so the green space will be gone.

Marianne Evans: That's a big concern for Calon y Dderwen, as you'd expect, with the amount of space that they have currently. On the plans there's outside space, there's green space, there's multi use games areas. And all of that is within the guidance for building new schools of that size. But what's difficult is Calon y Dderwen have been used to much more space, but the space is within the guidelines.

Governor: How's it going to work with Calon y Dderwen having a bigger school, having an extra 100 children, if you take into account that most of these siblings could be single children households, and then you've got the Healthcare Hub that they're wanting to put hospital facilities in as well and a police station and a nursery nearby, plus then the three plus children. That's going to cause a lot of congestion on that road, that's going to have an impact on emergency services because obviously if there's a Healthcare Hub there then ambulances might need to turn up, police might need to get out, and if there's then going to be an additional 100 possible parents down there then that's just going to cause a lot more problems.

Marianne Evans: In terms of the North Powys Wellbeing Hub, it's being looked at as a joint project, the school and the Health Hub. However, the school is the first element. There's a big piece of work going on at the moment looking at the master plan for the overall campus, looking at things like traffic flows, looking at car parking, looking at walking routes, all of this taking into account the size of the overall campus.

A lot of these issues would need to be considered as part of the planning process when it gets to it, so there's a fair way to go.

Governor: The health hub, what type of things will be there? Won't there be safeguarding issues with the kind of people that would go to the Health Hub? I'm thinking addicts...

Marianne Evans: Even though the campus development is being considered as one project, the safeguarding element is key in terms of the design of the school, this comes first.

Lynette Lovell: Thank you so much everybody for your contributions tonight there's really valid points that really need to be taken into consideration as we move forward.

As we said earlier, everything that's been said tonight will feed into the consultation report. All these conversations tonight will all be available for Cabinet to read before they make their decisions. As you can see it is complex, there's a lot to consider. It is a proposal at this stage, and it will be the proposal the Cabinet will have to consider

and make their decision on. And they will make the decision based on everything that is provided through the consultation process. If there are other things that you haven't said tonight and you think, I'd like to make that point, the consultation is open to everybody to make their views known, including parents.

Governor: About parents' views. Are you still going to be using the letters that the parents all wrote and gave in hand copies of as well as the documents they filled in online? Because a lot of parents wrote at the very start when this was proposed, I think there were over 100 letters that went in.

Marianne Evans: Yes, we have those. We will include them.

Lynette Lovell: Thank you very much everyone. Thank you for your time.

1. Introduction

Powys County Council has consulted on proposals for Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School. The proposals are as follows:

Phase 1: Close Treowen C.P. School from 31 August 2025 and extend Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to include the former Treowen C.P. School site from 1 September 2025

Phase 2: Ysgol Calon y Dderwen to move to a new building located on the existing Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site during 2026/27, and the Treowen site closes.

In line with the Council's policy, an Integrated Impact Assessment has been carried out which incorporates the Welsh Language, Equalities, Well-being of Future Generations Act, Sustainable Development Principles, Communication and Engagement, Safeguarding, Corporate Parenting, Community Cohesion and Risk Management.

In addition, the Welsh Government's School Organisation Code (2018) requires local authorities to carry out an Equality Impact Assessment and Community Impact Assessment in relation to all school reorganisation proposals. For proposals which affect teaching through the medium of Welsh, local authorities are also required to carry out a Welsh Language Impact Assessment.

These impact assessments were provided in draft form during the consultation period and have now been updated following the consultation. The Equality Impact Assessment has been carried out based on the latest PLASC information available. The Community Impact Assessment has been carried out with input from the two affected schools.

Following the consultation period, the impact assessments have been updated to incorporate any issues raised during the consultation period. The updated versions will be considered by the council's Cabinet when determining how to proceed in relation to this proposal.

- Ethnicity: The ethnic group of 80.4% of pupils at the school is White British. 11.3% of pupils belong to ethnic groups other than White British.

Treowen C.P. School

Based on the information provided in the school's PLASC return in January 2023, the following pupils belong to the protected characteristic groups:

Free school meals: 32.1% of pupils are eligible for Free School Meals. ALN: 16.7% of pupils at the school have additional educational needs. Of these, 6.1% pupils are on School Action, 6.1% pupils are on School Action Plus, 0.0% pupils have statements and 3.5% have IDPs. Disabilities: 16.7% of pupils have additional learning needs. Looked After Children: 0.9% of pupils were recorded as looked after. English as an Additional Language: 8.8% of pupils are identified as EAL pupils. Ethnicity: The ethnic group of 77.2% of pupils at the school is White British. 15.8% of pupils belong to ethnic groups other than White British. The information above shows that a proportion of pupils that belong to the protected characteristic groups will be affected by this proposal. In particular: 30.9% of pupils at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and 32.1% of pupils at Treowen C.P. School are eligible for Free School Meals. This is higher than the Powys average at (18.0%). 28.3% of pupils at Ysgol Calon y Dderwen have additional learning needs. This is higher than the Powys average for primary schools (20.9%). The proposals for Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School would impact all pupils currently attending the two schools, including those pupils belonging to protected characteristic groups. The impact would be greater on pupils currently attending Treowen C.P. School as eventually they would need to attend school at a different location. Full consultation has been carried out on the proposals relating to Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and **6.2 Qualitative** Summarise the key qualitative data analysis, Treowen C.P. School, including consultation with pupils at the affected schools. This has provided

- Concern about access to the upper levels of a two storey building for pupils with disabilities

- Concern about the impact on pupil attendance, particularly for those from low income families

8. AREAS for IMPROVEMENT

- i) Which protected characteristic groups are particularly affected?
- ii) Will people on low incomes be affected?
- iii) Will Welsh speakers be affected?

- i) The proposals would impact on a number of pupils with additional learning needs. During the consultation exercise, concern was expressed about the impact on pupils with additional learning needs currently attending Treowen School in particular, as well as pupils / parents with disabilities currently living in Treowen as it would be more difficult for them to access the school on the Calon y Dderwen site.
- 30.9% of pupils attending Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and 32.1% of pupils attending Treowen C.P.
 School are eligible for Free School Meals.
- iii) Both schools are English medium schools, therefore the proposal will not directly affect Welsh speakers.

9. EQUALITY IMPROVEMENT

9.1 Having identified problematic aspects to the proposal, how will this now be addressed?

i) Can the impact be mitigated, and how will this be done? Should the proposals be implemented, Treowen C.P. School would close and Ysgol Calon y Dderwen be extended to include the Treowen site. The school would then eventually move to a new building on the existing Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site and the Treowen site would close. All pupils currently attending Ysgol Calon y Dderwen and Treowen C.P. School would be able to attend the new school. The aim of the proposals is to improve the educational opportunities available to pupils in Newtown, including any pupils belonging to the protected characteristic groups.

During the first phase of implementing the proposals, pupils would continue to attend school in their current buildings, therefore the impact on pupils belonging to protected characteristic groups would be minimal.

- **ii)** Does the proposal require modification to reduce or remove this impact?
- iii) Should the proposal be considered for removal, owing to the degree of impact it is likely to have?

Eventually the intention is that the new school moves to a new building in Newtown. Whilst this would provide significant improvements to all pupils in terms of the quality of accommodation and the facilities available, this phase would have a more significant impact on pupils currently attending Treowen C.P. School, including any pupils belonging to the protected characteristic groups that attend that school, including any pupils with ALN, as some additional travel would be required in order to attend the new building. However, the additional distance from Treowen C.P. School to the proposed site of the new school is minimal.

Whilst it is acknowledged that the proposals would impact on pupils belonging to the protected characteristic groups that attend the two current schools, there is no reason to believe that the extended Ysgol Calon y Dderwen would be unable to meet the needs of pupils belonging to the protected characteristic groups that would be affected, including pupils with Additional Learning Needs, pupils belonging to Ethnic Groups other than White British, EAL pupils, pupils eligible for Free School Meals and Looked After Children.

4. Community Impact Assessment

4.1 Ysgol Calon y Dderwen

i) Information on the proportion of pupils from the catchment area that attend the school

The closest English-medium provider for pupils attending Ysgol Calon y Dderwen in June 2023 was as follows:

This suggests that 9.8% of pupils attending the school were attending their closest primary school, whilst 90.2% of pupils attending the school live closer to other primary schools. However, it is clear that the majority of pupils that attend the school live in the town of Newtown or the immediate surrounding area.

ii) After-school clubs and extra-curricular activities provided by the school

The school provides the following after-school clubs and extra-curricular activities:

- The facilities are also used by religious and local groups such as Newtown Rugby Club and Karate.

Should the proposals be implemented, Treowen C.P. School would close and Ysgol Calon y Dderwen would be extended to include the current Treowen C.P. School site, therefore the current Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site would continue to be available.

Eventually, the intention is that the school would move to a new building located on the site of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen, Park Street, Newtown, SY16 1EG. It is likely that the new building would have enhanced facilities compared with the current buildings, including community facilities, which could be utilised for the same activities and services currently provided, therefore it is not anticipated that moving to the new site would have a negative impact.

vii) Distance and travelling time involved in attending an alternative school of the same language category

Should the proposals be implemented, Treowen C.P. School would close and Ysgol Calon y Dderwen would be extended to include the current Treowen C.P. School site, therefore pupils would be able to continue to access English-medium provision at the same locations. There would be no impact on distance and travelling time.

Eventually, the intention is that the school would move to a new building located on the site of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen, Park Street, Newtown, SY16 1EG. The school is located on the same site currently and no additional distance or travelling time would be required.

viii) How parents' and pupils' engagement with the alternative school and any facilities it may offer could be supported

Should the Council proceed with the statutory process and eventual implementation of the preferred option, support would be provided to pupils and their parents as part of the transition process, thereby ensuring full engagement with Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. The nature of this support will depend on the needs of the parents/pupils.

ix) Any wider implications e.g. impact on public transport provision, wider community safety issues

It is not anticipated that implementation of the proposals would impact on public transport provision or community safety.

Eventually, the intention is that the school would move to a new building located on the site of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen, Park Street, Newtown, SY16 1EG. As this site is a current school site, appropriate safe walking routes established for the school would remain.

4.2 Treowen C.P. School

i) Information on the proportion of pupils from the catchment area that attend the school

The closest English-medium provider for pupils attending Treowen C.P. School in June 2023 was as follows:

This suggests that 63.7% of pupils attending the school were attending their closest primary school, whilst 36.3% of pupils attending the school live closer to other primary schools.

vi) If accommodation, facilities or services are provided by a school, where would they be provided in the event of closure?

Should the proposals be implemented, Treowen C.P. School would close and Ysgol Calon y Dderwen would be extended to include the current Treowen C.P. School site, therefore the current Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site would continue to be available.

Eventually, the intention is that the school would move to a new building located on the site of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen, Park Street, Newtown, SY16 1EG. It is likely that the new building would have enhanced facilities compared with the current buildings, including community facilities, which could be utilised for the same activities and services currently provided.

However, it is acknowledged that a move to a new school site in the town centre would mean that there would no longer be a school located in Treowen, therefore potentially the community facilities provided by the school may no longer be available.

There is a community centre in Treowen directly opposite the school which could provide the services and facilities currently offered.

vii) Distance and travelling time involved in attending an alternative school of the same language category

Should the proposals be implemented, Treowen C.P. School would close and Ysgol Calon y Dderwen would be extended to include the current Treowen C.P. School site, therefore pupils would be able to continue to access English-medium provision at the same locations. There would be no impact on distance and travelling time.

Eventually, the intention is that the school would move to a new building located on the site of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen, Park Street, Newtown, SY16 1EG. The site is located approximately 0.8 miles from Treowen C.P. School.

Following a move to the new building, there would be an impact on distance and travelling time for pupils currently attending Treowen C.P. School for whom Treowen is currently the closest school. An analysis of pupils attending Treowen C.P. School in June 2023 suggests that the furthest distance to the new school for pupils for whom Treowen C.P. School is currently the closest school would be 5.96 miles (currently furthest distance is 5.67 miles).

A significant proportion of pupils that currently attend Treowen C.P. School live closer to alternative schools in Newtown. For these pupils, it is likely that there would be a reduction in distance / travel time.

In respect of primary provision, the nearest alternative English-medium provision to Treowen C.P. School would be as follows:

The travel times above are the approximate travel times from Treowen C.P. School to the alternative schools, however the distance from individual pupils' homes to alternative schools would be different. Analysis has shown that the distances and travel times to alternative English-medium provision would not be in excess of 45 minutes for primary pupils.

Following the move to a new building in the town centre, home to school transport would be provided to eligible pupils in accordance with the home to school transport which is in operation at that time. It is currently projected that there would be no additional transports costs as the new building is located less than 1 mile from the existing Treowen school building.

viii) How parents' and pupils' engagement with the alternative school and any facilities it may offer could be supported

Should the Council proceed with the statutory process and eventual implementation of the preferred option, support would be provided to pupils and their parents as part of the transition process, thereby ensuring full engagement with Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. The nature of this support will depend on the needs of the parents/pupils.

ix) Any wider implications e.g. impact on public transport provision, wider community safety issues

- Longer journey to new site.
- Many parents unable to travel that distance with younger children.
- Many families without car to travel.
- Huge concerns over busy roads to cross to new site from Treowen.

4.3 Issues raised during the consultation period

A number of comments were received during the consultation period which related to the proposal's impact on the community.

These comments are listed in full in the consultation report produced in respect of this proposal, along with the Council's response to the points raised, and are also summarised below:

Comments about new housing developments

 Concerns that there will not be enough pupil places in the area to meet the demand of the new housing developments

- Travel implications

- Additional travel time/distance
- Increased traffic near the existing Ysgol Calon y Dderwen site

Impact on the Treowen community

- General concern about the impact on the community
- The school is an integral part of the community
- The school acts as a central hub for the community

4.4 Conclusion

Should the proposals be implemented, Ysgol Calon y Dderwen would initially be extended to include the Treowen site. During this phase, it is expected that a similar range of activities to the activities currently provided would be available to pupils. It is also possible that an increased range of activities and opportunities could be offered to pupils, through the ability to share staff expertise and the ability to offer joint activities to a larger group of pupils. Both schools also benefit from links with the community. It is expected that these would continue during Phase 1. During Phase 1, pupils would continue to attend school at the two existing sites, so no additional travel would be required. It is anticipated that the proposal's impact on the community would be minimal during Phase 1.

Eventually, the intention is that all pupils would move to one new building located on the current site of Ysgol Calon y Dderwen. It is anticipated that the new building would have a range of community facilities, which would ensure that many of the activities which currently take place in the schools could continue, and could also provide the opportunity to offer new activities.

It is acknowledged, however that the move to one new building in the town centre would mean that there would be no school provision in the Treowen. This would mean that school activities would no longer take place on the Treowen estate, and could impact on links with the Treowen community. Activities that currently take place in the Treowen C.P. School building would need to find an alternative location. There is a community centre and a M.U.G.A. directly opposite the school which would continue to be available to community should there be no school in Treowen.

Some of the activities that currently take place at the school could be held in the community centre.

It is also acknowledged that phase 2 of the proposals would result in an increase in the distance to school for pupils for whom Treowen is currently their closest school. Whilst the additional distance would be minimal as the site would still be located within Newtown, it is acknowledged that Treowen is located up a hill, so it might be more difficult for parents without access to a car to access the site. Concern has also been raised about the walking route to the new school, and that pupils would have to cross a busy road.
