- 1. This reports outlines proposed 'additional' funding for the Powys Business Expansion Grant.
- 2. Powys County Council currently has 2 grant funding streams. Business Start Up Grants and Powys Business Expansion Grant.

The Start up Grant stream allocation was £220,000 for 2011/12 and the Expansion Grant of £50,000 for Oct 2011 – March 2012. Grant allocation to Start Up business to date is £152.058. However the success of the Expansion grant has been so great that the grant allocation to date is £49,273.05 supporting 12 businesses, with enquiries and applications being received to an approximate grant value of £40,000.

To conclude it is clear that we do not have enough funds in the Expansion Grant stream to meet the current levels of interest to last to March 2012. It is unlikely that the Princes Trust Cymru or the Robert Owen Community Banking Fund will draw any funding from us – therefore there will be surplus in the Start Up Grant stream.

It is proposed that a transfer of £40,000 from the Start up Grant Stream 2011/12 – therefore reducing the funding stream to £180,000 to the Expansion Grant Stream therefore increasing the funding stream to £90,000 available for 2011/12.

Project meets Capital grant selection criteria?	Yes
Aims and objectives of the project	Bettws Cedewain Community Development Association have responsibility for the former primary school building adjoining the Community Centre.
	Both the former school and the Community Centre are in regular use – the former school is leased by the organisation called the 'Lifehouse' who provide educational facilities for children with Special Needs. The car park is currently in very poor condition, uneven in many places, and deteriorating at an accelerating pace.

Need for the project

Improve facilities for members of the public who use the former school and Community Centre – currently the car park is in very poor condition and is in danger of becoming a Health and Safety issue.

Links to other regeneration initiatives

The Community Centre – another charitable voluntary body which serves a wide range of the local population with assorted clubs for children and adults, as well as providing a venue for functions including weddings, funerals and family parties.

Project / activity fit in with the Powys County Council One Change Plan: Adult Living

Improvement to the facilities that encourage active and healthy life styles – the community centre providing many varied activities and functions for a wide age range. **Climate Change**

Regeneration

Learning in the Community

The 'Lifehouse' project provides a centre for children with Special Educational needs who might otherwise have to travel much greater distances to access a similar establishment.

Value for money:

Both the BCCDA and the Community Centre are reliant in their rural environment on the use of private vehicles by people using the facilities they offer – without a safe usable car park the Community Centre particularly could find the number of booking jeopardized.

Organisation	Brecon Cricket Club.
Project meets Capital grant selection criteria?	Yes
Aims and objectives of the project	Brecon Cricket Club was founded in 1898 and has been the leading cricket team in the region since that time. The club fields 3 senior sides and 4 junior sides. Each team plays in the top division of their respective leagues with the juniors receiving a special mention in the previous season due to their outstanding successes. The aim of the club is to continue fielding strong senior sides by focusing on the junior development programme and ensuring all members (senior and juniors) have top class cricket facilities available to them across mid-Wales.

Need for the project

Brecon Cricket Club supports 45 junior members (from U9 teams through to U15) and 30 senior members and needs to develop coaching, equipment and facilities at its new ground to continue to support an increasing number of junior and senior players.

Specifically, the project needs to install a new artificial wicket and cricket nets at the new Brecon Cricket Club ground (BSA Fields, nr Brecon Theatre). The artificial wicket will sit along side the existing grass wickets and provide a training surface for all junior and senior sides. Without this project and the move to the new ground, and due to increasing demands at the current ground at Penlan, the club will not be able to continue at its present level.

Brecon Cricket Clubs previous home was at Penlan, Brecon. Increasing pressures to use the site for other purposes (e.g. athletics) saw 8 games (40% of the season) cancelled or moved last year and a number of junior games cancelled. In addition, training facilities (e.g. nets) are not available at either Brecon Leisure Centre or Christ College and senior and junior sides now need to travel to Ebbw Vale to train in the winter and spring.

The new ground offers facilities specifically for the cricket club and has allowed us to build additional wickets for both senior and junior sides. The site also allows us to develop nets and training wickets and reduces – currently players have to travel to Ebbw Vale in to train as no facilities exist in Brecon.

Links to other regeneration initiatives

The Junior Development Project is part of a larger programme being developed by Brecon Sports Association Charitable Trust. Brecon Cricket Club is a founder member of the BSA along with Brecon Football and Rugby clubs (with additional members including Brecon Tennis Club and Brecon Boxing Club).

The BSA development programme is currently underway at the new ground. The first phase has focused on securing the site, fencing and maintenance to allow each of the clubs to start playing immediately. The second phase is about to start and includes capital works from Brecon Cricket Club and development of the pavilion (with involvement from local businesses and sponsorship).

This project forms a central part of the second phase and will allow the site to be used as a training facility along with the league matches played by each of the 3 senior and 4 junior sides.

Project / activity fit in with the Powys County Council One Change Plan: Adult Living

Provides facilities, equpiment and coaching for all members of the community to play cricket at all levels (from 1sts through to Sunday league matches).

Learning in the Community

Value for money:

Investment in a new artificial wicket will allow Brecon Cricket club to continue its strong development of 45 junior and 30 senior members. The capital project will ensure facilities at the new ground meet county standard for the next 15 years and that Brecon Cricket Club are able to expand in response to strong local interest (particularly for a new ladies team and additional junior team).

Overall Assessment

The following outcomes/outputs have been agreed in principle, subject to the Portfolio Holder for Regeneration and Culture's delegated approval of the grant award of £5,000, being 48% of the project costs after other government funding has been taken into consideration.

- Continue to support the 45 junior and 30 senior members at the club. Without this project, and due to pressures at the clubs current ground, there is a danger that the club will not be able to support these numbers.
- Allows the club to increase the number of teams (particularly in the junior and ladies groups where there has been strong local interest). Without this project the club would not be able to add a ladies team and an additional junior team (10-15 new ladies members, 15-20 new junior members).

Need for the project

All present and potential users of the facility will benefit but especially those that are disabled as at present they cannot use the centre, due to toilet facilities being inadequate.

The committee has set itself several goals, and has therefore raised money accordingly in order that all funds raised are directed towards a specific purpose. Organisation	Llandyssil Community Charitable Trust
Project meets Capital grant selection criteria?	Yes
Aims and objectives of the project	The main aim of the Llandyssil Community Charitable Trust is to support the Llandyssil Old School Hall, the only community facility in the village of Llandyssil. It acquired a 25 year, fully repairing, lease on the Hall in 2008 with a view to providing a venue for community activities – Youth Club, Llandyssil Ladies, Gardening Club etc. The objective is to ensure the Hall is fit for purpose so as to serve the village of Llandyssil well for the foreseeable future. Funds were raised in 2009/10 to renovate the main building but were not sufficient to complete the project

Need for the project

The ultimate aim of the proposed action is to attract more hirers/users to the Old School Hall increasing long term viability. It will do this by removing an eyesore – the old garages - which detract from the visual appeal of the Hall to users/hirers, at the same time as providing a dry and secure storage area for Hall equipment and the equipment of those that use the Hall. It will also enable Hall equipment to be maintained in better condition thus reducing costs. It will help the Trust to increase usage – with all the benefits that brings.

The project is needed as there is no safe and dry area for the storage of hall chairs and tables and for the equipment of those that use the Hall. This presents problems both in terms of maintaining the standard of current equipment and in presenting the Hall as a good venue for activities, events etc. The garages, where equipment is currently stored, have no effective doors, let in the weather, are damp and have asbestos roofing. They also detract from the visual appeal of the Hall as a venue for events – parties, wedding receptions etc – as well as for regular users. The building of the new storage area will make a marked difference to the appeal of the Old School Hall, solve the storage problem and help ensure the Hall's viability in the future. These needs were identified following comments by current users – and by those that considered the Hall for possible activities and events and then decided to go elsewhere.

Links to other regeneration initiatives

Llandyssil is a small village. Although it has a bakery and pub, it lost its shop and post office some years ago. Along with many other villages, for while its viability as a community could be seen as uncertain. Llandyssil however is vibrant village and the Hall is at the heart of its regeneration.

From securing a lease in 2008, the Hall is already 'booked' for 175 events – including regular bookings – in 2012. The Hall's viability is vital the village's future growth, regeneration and success. This project will contribute to this by attracting people to the village.

Project / activity fit in with the Powys County Council One Change Plan: Adult Living

The project will enable better services to be provided to adults in the village by encouraging more classes and special interest groups to complement those already being undertaken. The Hall already provides full facilities for the disabled.

Climate Change

The Hall, which is an excellent size and environmentfor learning, will be a better place for classes to be presented as it will be able acquire and store securely equipment needed, such as computers and for visual presentation.

Regeneration

The improved facilities of the Hall will enable more activites and events to be mounted keeping the village alive and bringing new people into the village

Learning in the Community

The project will be built with the most environmentally friendly materials and with window, wall and roof insulation to the highest standards. In the future solar panels may be installed on the south facing roof

Value for money:

The project will help secure the future viability and success of the Old School Hall, Llandyssil. The addition of the storage room will complete the renovation of this Hall, which is in a conservation area – and lead to the removal of the current garages which do not meet current standards. It will mean the Hall will need little renovation or maintenance over the remaining 20 years of the current lease and the Hall will be able to keep its current users happy and generate increased use – which will increase income.

Total Grant Requested	£15,000
Grant Award	£15,000 - 41% of project

Overall Assessment

The following outcomes/outputs have been agreed in principle, subject to the Portfolio Holder for Regeneration and Culture's delegated approval of the grant award of £15,000, being 41% of the project costs after other government funding has been taken into consideration.

Need for the project

This project is needed because if the surface is not renewed in the next few months the existing competitive and coaching play will not be possible. This will mean that not only will Newtown lose its profile as a tennis venue, but also the chance to learn / play tennis will be denied to local residents and in particular the youth of the area.

A valuable sporting resource will no longer be available to local schools, such as the Pathway Centre

Tennis as a social activity will be restricted. This is particularly important for senior players who currently meet on several "slots" each week.

The above are all integral to the Powys Change plan, particularly around issues such as self reliance, ability to pursue personal ambition, health and independence, safety and ease of access to services.

Links to other regeneration initiatives

This project links to the County Councils improvement objectives, namely:

Provision of high quality sporting services which support independence and resilience in both the individual and the community.

It promotes cycle use as a means of access, thereby encouraging low impact transport. In the longer term it considers incorporating Photo-Voltaic panels as a contribution to the regions electricity needs, should use of flood lights become a consideration.

Value for money:

Four playable tennis courts is a huge community resource.

The Organisation has looked into various options of surfaces and it was decided to go for good 'park courts', meeting minimum Tennis Wales standards (rather than for a higher level of resurfacing

1 <u>Summary</u>

1.1 The purpose of this report is to seek authority to decide not to designate a conservation area at Llanwrtyd Wells.

2 Proposal

- 2.1 Llanwrtyd Wells Town Council requested that Powys County Council consider whether a conservation area should be designated in Llanwrtyd Wells.
- 2.2 An extensive programme of involvement and analysis informed a draft appraisal and management proposals document which was sent out for formal consultation between 19th September and 30th October 2011.
- 2.3 While there is no statutory requirement to consult prior to designation of a conservation area, Welsh Office Circular 61/96 suggests that there should be consultation with local residents, business and other local interests.
- 2.4 Section 71(2) of the Planning (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) Act 1990 requires proposals for the preservation and enhancement of a conservation area to be submitted for consideration at a public meeting in the area, with wider consultation being desirable.
- 2.5 Following receipt of 95 responses from the local community, the lack of support for conservation area designation has lead to a recommendation not to designate a conservation area at Llanwrtyd Wells.
- 2.6 A summary paper of the responses to the consultation is appended.
- 2.7 A copy of the summary of responses paper will be held at the local library. It is felt that no additional resources will be affected as the paper will be available during normal opening hours.

- 2.8 The Local Planning Authority has the powers to designate a conservation area with or without public support. However, when considering the level of feeling that has been demonstrated through the consultation responses, it is thought that to designate without public support in this instance would be detrimental to the Planning Authority's relationship with the local community and result in an unmanageable conservation area.
- 2.9 This proposal seeks a decision not to pursue the designation of a conservation area at Llanwrtryd Wells at the present time.

3 Powys Change Plan / Options Considered/Available

4.1 The County Council could designate a conservation area in Llanwrtyd without further consultation; however this would work against the Council's value of engagement which is identified in the Powys Change Plan. This approach would also be against the best practice identified in Welsh Office Circular 61/96: *Planning and the Historic Environment: Historic Buildings and Conservation Areas* (Para. 25).

5 Preferred Choice and Reasons

- 5.1 The consultation process has given the local community the opportunity to inform the County Council's decision over whether to designate a conservation area. Their democratic decision has been that a conservation area should not be designated. It is felt that the full benefits of designation would not be gained without the support of the local community.
- 5.2 This will allow the process, started in March 2010, to continue through to a conclusion. This will ensure that the Town Council's initial request that the County Council considers whether a conservation area should be designated in Llanwrtyd Wells will be met and resolved.

Report on the Consultation for Designating a Conservation Area at Llanwrtyd Wells

Date consultation issued: 19th September 2011 Response date: 30th October 2011

The Consultation Process

Following Llanwrtyd Wells Town Council's request to Powys County Council's Built Heritage Team to consider whether a conservation area could be designated at Llanwrtyd Wells, an extensive programme of consultation and analysis was undertaken and a draft appraisal document produced. This document and its proposal for the designation of a conservation area at Llanwrtyd Wells was summarized in a consultation document which was sent by post to every household which might be affected by the proposal. As is often the case with these mailshots, it has since become obvious that some households received several copies and a few received none. On the whole it is considered that a good coverage was achieved.

The consultation was advertised on the 'Have your Say' pages of the Powys County Council website, in the local papers and a consultation webpage developed. Copies of the entire document, the consultation information and extra response forms were also available at Llanwrtyd Wells library, Builth Wells library and in the Planning Department at Llandrindod Wells. The local elected member and the Llanwrtyd Wells Town Council also had copies of the documentation.

A 'drop-in' session was held in Llanwrtyd Wells library on the 13th October, where the Built Heritage Conservation Officer was available between 10.00-13.00 and 14.00-19.00 to answer questions. Attendance was steady throughout the day. A public meeting, organized by the Town Council was held in Victoria Hall on the evening of 14th October with a good attendance of approx. 30 people. At this meeting it was again made clear that the decision whether to designate would be taken through a democratic vote process.

People were asked to respond / vote via the hard copy response form sent out within the consultation document or using the electronic copy of the response form on the website. A few people also provided their vote via telephone, via customer services or e-mail without the form. For the first five weeks of the consultation period a fair number of responses were received and opinion was divided exactly equally between designation or not. In the last week an influx of negative responses was received, resulting in the outcome below.

Consultation Results

The consultation document included eleven specific questions, in order to try to provoke thoughtful answers and encourage people to read the documentation. Many respondents only answered question 3, which asked whether a conservation area should be designated or not. A copy of the response form questions and either a numerical indication of responses or a summary of comments are provided below. The responses are in blue.

In summary, the overwhelming response was not to designate a conservation area at Llanwrtyd Wells. However, all other indications throughout the period of working with the community at Llanwrtyd Wells showed a high level of support for the proposal and a 'straw poll' vote held at the end of one of the workshops showed unanimous support from attendees.

The responses show that there is clearly a misunderstanding between the role of the Town Council and the County Council as Local Planning Authority and also between the statutory designations of Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas. Despite the earlier boundary consultation exercise the lack of responses to this question mean that no clear agreement has emerged for a boundary from this consultation. Many responses were made against the making of an Article 4(2) Direction and the effects of such a Direction. The document states that an Article 4(2) direction will be made in the future, once funding has been secured to assist with any additional costs this may generate. The Article 4(2) Direction cannot be made until an additional consultation process has been undertaken. The LPA is obliged to take notice of responses to this consultation prior to making a Direction. None of the responses suggested having a Conservation Area without an Article 4(2) Direction.

The Local Planning Authority has the powers to designate a conservation area with or without public support. However, when considering the level of feeling that has been demonstrated through the consultation responses, it is thought that to designate without public support in this instance would be detrimental to the Planning Authority's relationship with the local community and result in an unmanageable conservation area.

Question 6. Do you think the management proposals would help to preserve and enhance the 'special interest' of Llanwrtyd Wells, if the area were designated? If not, please provide suggestions for amendments.

1. <u>Summary</u>

1.1 The current Welsh Government (WG) call for evidence invites views on how to deliver the planning system in the future. Directed by an independent advisory group, the review seeks views on:

- 1.1.1 The key policy objectives that the planning system should deliver;
- 1.1.2 How to deliver the planning system most effectively and how to measure it;
- 1.1.3 The current delivery mechanisms and institutional arrangements; and
- 1.1.4 Any other evidence or examples considered relevant purpose behind the report
- 1.2 The closing date for replies is 3 February 2012.
- 1.3 The Council's recommended response is attached at **Appendix 1**.

2. Proposal

2.1 In October 2011, the Minister for Environment and Sustainable Development of the Welsh Government established an independent advisory group to consider options on how to deliver the planning system in the future. This work will lead to a report, which will form part of the evidence base for a new future Welsh Planning Bill.

2.2 The First Minister indicated that the Planning Bill should reconsider roles and responsibilities, which includes the Welsh Government, local authorities, statutory consultees, town and community councils and the

Planning Inspectorate. It will build on the initial consideration of these roles in the Simpson Review that considered possibilities for closer working between local authorities.

2.3 Currently, the main ways of delivering planning services in Wales at national level is by publication of Welsh planning policy and ensuring its implementation through scrutiny of local policy and plans, calling in planning applications and adjudicating on planning appeals. Local planning authorities (LPAs) and national park authorities deliver national and local planning policy by preparing and adopting development plans and by making decisions on planning applications.

2.4 The group will not be considering the content of Planning Policy Wales (PPW), nor will it be covering permissions that are not land use related, such as entertainment licences or health and safety certificates. It will be searching for evidence to support responses about how to improve planning delivery in preparation for a Welsh Planning Act and in doing so will also be seeking the views of experts in the field and looking beyond Welsh boundaries.

2.5 The covering report poses a number of standard questions. Recommended responses to these are set out at **Appendix 1**.

3. <u>Powys Change Plan</u>

3.1 Clearly, the delivery of the planning system, both at the national and local level, has a tremendous impact on the realisation of the Council's aspirations. This current call for evidence represents a significant opportunity to help shape the future delivery of the system.

3.2 It is difficult to quantify risks at this stage and indeed, to do so would be based on conjecture. However, it is important that local democratic accountability remains one of the key principles of any new system.

4. Options Considered/Available

4.1 Powys need not respond to the call for evidence at this stage and wait for firmer proposals to come forward before engaging in this process. However, it is considered appropriate to engage in this process from the outset to give the Council the best opportunities in terms of seeking to have a consistent input into this process.

5. <u>Preferred Choice and Reasons</u>

5.1 To engage at this stage and respond to the call for evidence as recommended at **Appendix 1**.

6. <u>Sustainability and Environmental Issues / Equalities / Crime and</u> <u>Disorder / Welsh Language / Other policies etc</u>

Together with other anticipated new primary Welsh legislation relating to environmental issues, it is considered that the future Planning Act for Wales will demonstrably have an impact on all of these issues to varying degrees. However, this is difficult to quantify at this stage.

7. <u>Children and Young People's Impact Statement – Safeguarding</u> and Wellbeing

It is unlikely that any future Planning Act for Wales will have a direct impact on these issues. If there is to be an impact, it is not possible to discern these matters at this stage.

8. Local Member(s)

8.1 The proposals relate to a County wide matter and the views of individual elected Members have not, therefore, been sought.

9. <u>Other Front Line Services</u>

9.1 Until firmer proposals come forward from WG, it is not possible to take account of how future changes might impact on other front line services.

10. <u>Support Services (Legal / Finance / HR / ICT / BPU)</u>

10.1 Likewise, there is not considered to be any meaningful view that can be expressed at this stage in terms of impact on support services until such time as tangible proposals come forward, which are in themselves likely to be the subject of further consultation.

11. Local Service Board / Partnerships / Stakeholders etc

11.1 Similarly, no quantifiable impact can at this stage be established.

12. <u>Communications</u>

12.1 There is not considered to be a need for a communications strategy at this embryonic stage in the approach being taken by WG in producing a new Planning Act for Wales.

13. <u>Statutory Officers</u>

13.1 The views of the Strategic Director, Finance and Infrastructure (Section 151 Officer) and the Strategic Director, Law & Governance (Monitoring Officer) will be sought at the appropriate time.

14. <u>Members' Interests</u>

14.1 The Monitoring Officer is not aware of any specific interests that may arise in relation to this report. If Members have an interest they should declare it at the start of the meeting and complete the relevant notification form.

15. Future Status of the Report

15.1 This report is not confidential and there is, therefore, no need to consider its future status.

What realignment of roles or additional levels of responsibility, if any, could improve delivery? Please provide evidence to support your views.

The on-line submission of planning applications through the Planning Portal needs to be maximised or even become mandatory. A national approach to validation could mean that a single body was able to undertake the registration of all planning applications on behalf of individual LPAs. Such a service would be able to effectively deal with variations in workloads. Validated planning applications could be sent electronically to professional officers within 24 hours of receipt. The re-introduction and mandatory use of thre eConsultation hub would facilitate effective consultation on behalf of the professional officers processing planning applications.

In addition, with reference to National Parks, there needs to be a debate as to the added value that having separate and additional local planning authorities provides and consideration given to whether this still remains the best way to help implement both national and local policy. A particularly issue in this sense is that under the present arrangements, a National Park authority can decide the weight that can be given to, for example, a regeneration strategy that belongs to a separate but constituent local authority in policy and decision making; there is a question as to whether this helps or undermines the aspirations of the constituent local authority.

There needs to be a relatively high rate of delegation to ensure the timeliness of decisions. To complement this approach, each administrative area could have a relatively small number of elected representatives to make decisions on behalf of its constituents via a committee or panel structure.

In addition, there is an argument that each local authority could have some form of meaningful sustainability champion, a recognised post or designation, elected representative or officer, to ensure that a possible mandatory adherence to sustainability issues was followed.

Community Use of Buildings - Letting Scheme

<u>Hire Charges</u>

The Local Authority Education Committee approved a "Management of Educational Premises" policy in 1989 in response to section 4 of the 1986 Education Act in connection with the use of County Council premises. From 1st April 1998 the Local Authority agreed that all users of Youth & Community facilities should pay something towards the costs incurred. Costs have been calculated based on the minimum running costs for Youth & Community Centres. Hire charges are calculated on an **hourly basis** and charges are **per room** unless otherwise stated.

Please Note within this policy no concession/subsidy is allowable for business, corporations, quangos, religious or political groups/parties.

Categories

In levying charges the following categories are used:

<u>Category 1 Concession Fee.</u> Use by voluntary youth groups, Powys County Council adult continuing education service for all types of use, classes and activities other than concerts or performances with an audience. Use by other community groups/organisations, including the extra-mural department, the W.E.A., senior citizens clubs, children's groups and playgroups, adult groups and clubs including arts and cultural groups, community councils, charitable groups, sports clubs, and women's organisations for ordinary meetings and activities other than concerts or performances with an audience. (*Excluding religious & political groups*).

<u>Category 2 Standard Charge.</u> Use by any of the above three categories for money raising purposes i.e. when charges are made to the public at the door, by ticket sales etc.

<u>Category 3 Private Hire.</u> Use by any Business, Corporation, Quango, Religious or Political groups for meetings, training, fundraising etc. Use by an individual for parties or functions. Youth & Community Officers have some discretion to negotiate fees in this area and may on occasion agree an hourly rate, i.e. Children's Birthday Parties.

Registration

All groups that work with Children and Young People are required to be registered with the local authority as a condition of hire. Those working with 8-18 year olds must be registered with the Youth Service via the Young People's Partnership's "Application for Approval" process. Those working with Children under 8 years must be registered with the CSIW (Care Standards Inspectorate for Wales). These organisations will be required to provide details of their registration and the CRB status of staff/volunteers before any access to buildings is provided.

Funding

Voluntary Youth Groups/ organisations working with young people aged 11-25 may be eligible for a small revenue grant in support of their running costs. They need to be registered as detailed above and complete an appropriate application form available from the Shire Area Offices.

1. Summary

1.1 To consider and approve the allocation of the 2012/13 Powys Built Heritage Fund (BHF) budget.

2. Proposal

2.1 In 2012/13, the Council has approved a capital allocation of £100,000 to the Powys BHF. It is proposed that this is allocated to individual schemes as in Table 1 below:

2.2 The following paragraphs provide a brief explanation of the proposed schemes for the 2012/2013 financial year. In all of the individual schemes, the private sector (property owners / applicants) are required to make a financial contribution.

Severn Valley Built Heritage Fund

The Council in conjunction with the Welsh Government has secured EU structural funds (2009-13) for various projects in the Severn Valley. One element of this project is the Severn Valley Built Heritage Fund which

supports the restoration and re-use of commercial properties within the Severn Valley for the period up until December 2013.

The bid envisaged a total expenditure on the Built Heritage element of \pounds 1,333,333 which is to be funded as follows: \pounds 633,333 by Welsh European Funding Office (WEFO), \pounds 300,000 by Powys County Council and \pounds 400,000 by the private sector.

By committing £50,000 to this Fund in 2012/2013, the Council will fulfil its funding commitment of £300,000, subject to under spend from previous years being carried forward.

Machynlleth Town Scheme Partnership

In 2011 / 2012 the Council secured an extension to the Machynlleth Town Scheme Partnership with Cadw. Match funding in 2012/2013 is subject to a detailed work programme being agreed with Cadw.

Powys Historic Building Grants Scheme (PHBGS)

This scheme supports the repair and restoration of historic buildings throughout Powys (excl. BBNP) to improve and conserve the quality the County's rich heritage of historic buildings. Grants are available at a rate of 25% with maximum grants capped at £8,000, although higher grants may be allowed in exceptional circumstances where a building is 'at risk'.

2.3 To maximise the Council's capital allocation, match funding has been secured in principle. Table 3 below shows the Public sector match funding for 2012/2013.

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2.4 Any under spend from the 2011/2012 BHF will be carried forward as follows:

a) *Under spend in the Severn Valley Built Heritage Fund will be carried forward and retained within the scheme. (*Subject to Cabinet approval)

- b) Under spend in the Talgarth Scheme will be carried forward and transferred to the Powys Historic Building Grants.
- c) Under spend in the Powys Historic Building Grants, will be carried forward and retained within the scheme.

2.5 Table 3 below shows the estimated under spend from each scheme in 2011/2012. It is important to note that the precise amount of carry forward money may vary slightly according to the level of expenditure achieved by 31/03/2012.

3. Powys Change Plan 2012-15

3.1 The Powys BHF addresses the Change Plan's key area for improvement entitled Regeneration. Table 2 demonstrates that work has been undertaken with partners to maximise regeneration benefits, which assist successful delivery of the Regeneration Strategy. In particular the BHF addresses the Regeneration Strategy of enhancing town and village centres.

3.2 The BHF will assist in meting the Change Plan's 'continuous improvement activity' as follows:

- Through supporting the Severn Valley Built Heritage Fund it will support 4 businesses and create or refurbish 700 square metres of premises by June 2014.
- By contributing to the target of supporting15 physical regeneration projects.

4. Options Considered/Available

4.1 The Brecon Beacons National Park Authority has requested a £10,000 contribution to its Talgarth Scheme. The Council has previously committed $\pm 10,000$ of the BHF budget in both 2010/11 and 2011/2012 to this scheme as match-funding.

4.2 It is recommended that the Built Heritage Fund does not contribute to the Talgarth Scheme in 2012/2013. The initial funding offer was on condition

that the BBNPA secured further funding from Cadw for a Town Scheme Partnership, which did not happen and so the condition was waivered. This may be revisited in future years when it is clear that a Town Scheme Partnership with Cadw is agreed in principle.

4.3 An alternative distribution of funds for 2012/13 could be considered but that suggested in the report is thought to represent the most effective use of resources. Other funding opportunities will continue to be investigated and it will be necessary to review the allocation of funds for 2013/2014 should external funding be secured.

5. Preferred Choice and Reasons

5.1 The preferred choice is set out in Table 1 and paragraph 2.4 above. This will assist the Council in meeting the continuous improvement activity for Regeneration in the Powys Change Plan 2012 – 2015 and in implementing the Powys Built Heritage Strategy 2010 – 2015.

5.2 This distribution has been determined initially by the availability of public sector match-funding, with the remaining allocation made to the Powys Historic Building Grant Scheme which operates across the county (excl. BBNP).

6. Sustainability and Environmental Issues/Equalities/Crime and Disorder/Welsh Language/Other Policies etc

6.1 Equalities & Welsh Language and Sustainable Development principles underpin the Council's Powys Change Plan and the <u>Powys Built Heritage</u> <u>Strategy</u> which the proposal seeks to support.

6.2 The BHF is sustainable as it aims to conserve and restore buildings of historic and architectural merit. This represents a sustainable use of existing resources, finding new uses for old buildings and reducing the need for wholly new development which may not be appropriate in character. Funding is available to all sectors of the community and documentation relating to the individual schemes is available bilingually.

7. Children and Young People's Impact Statement - Safeguarding and Wellbeing

7.1 The introduction to the County Council's Built Heritage Strategy (page 4) explains that:

'the high quality built environment of Powys with its wealth of historic buildings, conservation areas and archaeological sites and monuments, represents an important social, cultural, recreational and educational resource as well as helping to make Powys an appealing place to live, work and visit. The historic environment is widely considered an important contributor to many aspects of today's society. It can have a considerable impact on tourism, economic vitality, community identity, regeneration, lifelong learning, creating a sustainable environment, health and personal wellbeing amongst many others. It is also clearly recognised as an important part of our culture, identity, national pride and local distinctiveness.'

7.2 The BHF seeks to facilitate the protection and enhancement of the built heritage which facilitates sustainable living and working environments and supports the wellbeing of the County's population and the experience of its visitors as a whole. The Powys BHF will assist in securing the County's rich built heritage into the future.

8. Local Member(s)

8.1 The Powys BHF has the potential to be of benefit to all wards in Powys outside the Brecon Beacons National Park (BBNP).

9. Other Front Line Services

9.1 The scheme leads to applications being submitted to Development Management and Building Control.

10. Support Services (Legal, Finance, HR, ICT, BPU)

10.1 The Principal Accountant for Capital has confirmed that the allocation of the 2012/13 budget is acceptable.

1.0 Summary

1.0 The transfer of the Leighton Model Farm to James Potter via a long lease agreement for 200 years was completed on 19th August 2011. The lease agreement includes an option to purchase the freehold for £1 on completion of an agreed schedule of repairs within a period of 10 years from the date of the lease agreement.

1.1 The lease agreement includes, inter alia:

- (i) A requirement that the tenant will complete the schedule of repair works within 10 years of the lease commencement date(Clause 3.7)
- (ii) To insure the premises for a value of £14,482,639, a figure specified by the Council's insurance section (Clause 3.12).
- (iii) The option to purchase the freehold reversion upon completion of the schedule of repairs to the Landlord's satisfaction and before 10 years of the lease has elapsed. (Clause 5.2)
 - (iv) A requirement that the tenant submits a draft Conservation Management Plan to the landlord for its approval within 6 months of the lease commencing and the landlord to respond within 3 months. The tenant then to complete repairs to a specified building to set a Benchmark standard to be approved by the landlord for all future repair works and before moving on to repair the other buildings (the Second Schedule)

2.0 Proposal

2.1 It is proposed to enter into a Deed of Variation of the lease agreement to cover the following matters:

- (a) Insert an amended plan of the area included in the lease to correct an error on the original lease plan by excluding an area of land which had been sold off previously, but was included in the lease plan in error.
- (b) Amend the amount of the insurance valuation following a re-assessment of the value by expert assessors instructed by the tenant.
- (c) Extend the period of time for the completion of the repair works and exercise of the option to purchase the freehold by one more year, i.e. from

ten to eleven years from the commencement of the lease.

2.2 Insurance Valuation

- 2.2.1 Prior to the signing of the lease agreement, the amount specified in Clause 3.12 was questioned by the tenant who supplied his own much lower assessment of the reinstatement value. It was agreed that the tenant would commission an expert assessment by a suitable qualified firm and if there was a significant difference the landlord would agree to substitute the revised assessment in the lease. The amount of cover provided is, obviously, reflected in the insurance premium
- 2.2.2 The assessors instructed by the tenant were Cunningham Lindsey who were recommended by the NFU Mutual as having the expertise to assess a range of historic, listed buildings such as those at Leighton. They have assessed the reinstatement cost of the Leighton buildings at £13,277,000 and it is proposed to substitute this amount for the current figure of £14,482,639 in Clause 3.12. of the lease.
- 2.3 Ten Year Repair programme.
 - 2.3.1 Prior to signing the lease the tenant had commissioned a comprehensive ecology survey of the buildings and surrounding land. This survey identified significant bat roosts for various bat species in the buildings. The tenant was advised that any repairs to the roofs of the buildings i.e. above wall plate level, could only be carried out in the period between October and April each year.

Each building repaired would require a Bat Licence to be issued. A Bat Licence can only be granted after Listed Building Consent (LBC) has been obtained for roof repairs and it takes about 8 weeks to issue.

- 2.3.2 The tenant submitted a draft Conservation Management Plan in a timely manner, but this required some consideration of what constituted "like for like" repairs to Listed buildings, which did not require any LBC, and those repairs, which did need LBC. This further involved consultation with CADW over some of the methods proposed in the draft plan e.g. the use of a thin wood wool slab on the underside of slates on areas to be re-roofed, as a key for lime torching to be applied as per the original construction. This method of repair was approved and the LBC application for the specified building (referred to as building "T" in the repair schedule) was submitted in late November 2011.
- 2.3.3 LBC was granted for building "T" last month and the Bat Licence application submitted but this will not be approved in time to complete the re-roofing of building T by the April 2012 cut off date for such repairs.
- 2.3.4 As a consequence the roofing work to building T cannot be commenced until October 2012 and by the time it is completed and approved by the landlord and further building(s) nominated for repair in the forthcoming 12 month period and LBC and Bat Licences applied for (requiring a new Bat survey each time) more than one year of the ten year period will have been lost
- 2.3.5 In the meantime the tenant has progressed with other items of repair on a like for like basis and not involving roof work e.g. replacing a large timber beam which failed in one of the main hay barns.

2.3.6 Therefore, the tenant has applied for the original period of ten years to be extended by a year to eleven years to complete the repairs and exercise his option to purchase the freehold.

3.0 Powys Change Plan and Risk to the Council

3.1 The disposal of the Leighton Model Farm for primarily the restoration of the listed buildings and regeneration of the centre will achieve a long term aim of the Council. The substantial receipt received from Mr Potter was a secondary "bonus".

3.2 The risk that Mr Potter should fail to purchase the freehold has no financial consequence to the Council.

The risk that Mr Potter should fail to complete the repairs in a timely manner could lead to a forfeiture of the lease but this is considered to be a low risk. Mr Potter has instructed a suitable experienced conservation architect to advise him on the repairs, and he has already carried out some items in the schedule, demonstrating his good intentions.

4.0 Options Considered / Available

4.1 The only alternative option to agreeing to allow a one year extension of the ten year period would be to refuse this request. The reasons for the loss of one year's work has been outlined above and is not due to any lack of diligence by the tenant.

5.0 Preferred Choice and Reasons

5.1 The preferred choice is to enter into a Deed of Variation with James Potter to deal with items (a), (b), and (c) described in paragraph 2.1.

The need for a revised plan is self explanatory. The insurance re-instatement value, whilst lower, has been assessed by suitable experienced assessors. The request to allow one more year to complete the repairs and exercise the option is not unreasonable in the circumstances. There may be opportunities to recover lost time in future years and the work can be completed in 10 years time but the extension by one year will give the tenant comfort and "breathing space".

6.0 Sustainability and Environmental Issues / Equalities / Crime and Disorder / Other Policies

6.1 The transfer of the Leighton model Farm will sustain the long term life of this important range of Victorian, listed buildings and offer significant regeneration opportunities.

7.0 Comments of Local Member

7.1 Councillor Mrs Linda Corfield was kept advised of the sale process, but she has not been consulted on this particular matter of a Deed of Variation. Councillor Corfield has been supportive of James Potter's proposals for the model farm all through the transfer process.

8.0 Other Consultations Undertaken

8.1 None, but there are no financial implications to the County Council by entering into a Deed of Variation to cover the matters specified.

9.0 Statutory Officers

1. Summary

1.1 To consider and approve the allocation of the 2012/13 Powys Business Development Grants budget for both Start-ups and Expansions.

2. Proposal

- 2.1 Powys County Council currently provides 2 grant funding streams which are managed by the Economic Regeneration Team – Business Start Up and Powys Business Expansion.
- 2.2 The following paragraphs provide a brief explanation of the schemes which are proposed to continue for the 2012/13 financial year. The total amount of capital funds allocated to this year is £390,000 (£200,000 budget plus £190,000 carry over from 2011-12).

The Start Up Grant

The Start Up grant fund aims to support start up businesses within the County of Powys, who need to purchase capital equipment for the business to operate. The Powys Business Development Grant has been a successful grant delivered by Powys County Council for a number of years, providing grant aid of 50% - £2,500 max funding to new businesses trading less then 12 months. In 2011-12 The Economic Regeneration Team assisted 83 businesses of which 133.5 jobs were created within Powys.

The Expansion Grant

The Expansion grant fund aims to support expanding businesses within the County of Powys, who need to purchase capital equipment for the business to grow. The Powys Business Development Grant has been a successful grant delivered by Powys County Council since October 2011, providing grant aid of 50% - £5,000 max funding to new businesses trading more then 12 months. Between 1 October 2011 and 31 March 2012 the Economic Regeneration Team assisted 24 expansion businesses of which 48.5 jobs were created and 116 safeguarded within Powys.

- 2.3 Having received numerous telephone calls and talking to other organisations such as Antur Teifi, Robert Owen Community Banking Fund, and the Regional Centre Service (formally known as FS4B), very little assistance is available to businesses as the Welsh Government has little to offer businesses and the banks are being extremely cautious.
- 2.4 Many businesses are finding it increasingly difficult to raise much needed capital funds. This could be for various reasons; own resources cannot support the full cost; banks are currently unwilling to extend overdraft facilities or to loan / support businesses for capital projects etc..

3. Powys Change Plan 2012-15

- 3.1 The Powys Business Development Grant Fund addresses the Change Plan's key area for improvement entitled Regeneration and will aid the successful delivery of the Regeneration Strategy.
- 3.2 The Powys Business Development Fund will assist in meeting the Change Plan's continuous improvement activity' by 'supporting Powys' economy and optimising opportunities for micro, small and medium sized enterprises.

4.1 It is recommended that both schemes continue for the 2012/13 financial year due to the demand and success of both schemes as mentioned in section 2.

In order that the Development Management team within Powys CC can provide a more efficient service in support of businesses £8,500 to be allocated to provide laptop computers for case officers.

GVA Grimley's management of workspace contract

GVA Grimley. Cardiff currently manage the workspace portfolio for Powys which comprises of 15 sites across the Authority. It is proposed that £12,000 be allocated to implement the recommendations within the workspace strategy (as prepared by GVA Grimley) which was approved in cabinet in September 2011. These proposals are over and above the current contract value. Recommendations are set out below:-

To develop and implement a standard 3 year lease document for use in all owned workspace across Powys. This will include the communication to all tenants by carrying out site visits.

Aims and objectives of the project	 In working towards the achievement of their vision, the organisation has five aims and objectives. These are to: Create opportunities for high quality community arts experiences in the culturally diverse communities of North Powys and its Borders. Initiate innovative projects in North Powys and its Borders that will harness creative talent for the cultural and economic benefit of the area. This is defined as 30 minutes drive-time from a population centre of over 10,000 people and containing fewer than five of twelve key services.

Arts Connection has concentrated on these areas of Welshpool, Newtown and Machynlleth, having worked with the Oldford Estate in Welshpool (Communities First Area) for 10 years, even prior to the area gaining Communities First status. Projects are also targeted through the Youth Service in Newtown and in partnership with Community Service development and the Youth Service in Machynlleth. It is in these areas that the work is transformational, building confidence, self esteem and contributing towards community cohesion.

This organisation delivers a wider programme of community based arts activities for to target audiences. They run a programme of Welsh language events and can deliver workshops in Welsh and English, including 3 large annual projects serving the above groups and a range of smaller projects each year.

Regeneration

The Organisation offers high quality participatory arts experiences across North Powys. It has fostered a sense of community identity, promoting social cohesion and skills development with artists to work and develop creative ideas.

Climate Change

The Organisation is environmentally focused and produce participatory art works with recycled materials. Many of the activities are carried out within schools with strong waste and energy use policies adhering to the PCC and eco schools guidelines. Staff adhere to the sustainability

procurement guidelines that enable them to make clear decisions about the mitigation of climate change throughout the procurement process.

Value for money:

	The Organisation do this by commissioning artists to run projects, generally through a series of workshops. Projects are based on ideas generated by participants. Some projects end with a performance, others with finished work that is exhibited. Projects take place in leading arts venues across the county.
	They also facilitate access to mainstream arts events and activities, and promote occasional performances, such as Hi Jinx Theatre and Powys Dance. The Beaufort Gallery in Llandrindod Wells hosts a programme of exhibitions by our project participants, alongside shows by professional artists from Powys and further afield.
	The Organisation cover the three old shires of Powys; Montgomery, Radnor and Brecknock.

The purpose of this project is to enable Celf o Gwmpas to continue to excel at providing creative opportunities for adults and young people with a range of learning disabilities, and other marginalised groups.

With support, this project will allow participants to achieve a professional standard of work building on the high quality work achieved during both the Hand Made Orchestra and Unity Festival projects and the Artists Mentoring programme.

The funding will specifically contribute to the running costs of projects and will ensure the ongoing sustainability of the organisation.

The Plots and Shows project starts with the development of new technical and creative skills, followed by the development of themes and stories that form the basis for new performance work.

Aims and objectives of the project	The Gregynog Festival Company Ltd was established in 1988 for the advancement of public education in the arts in mid Wales. Its main activity is to organise and promote the annual Gregynog Festival which takes place for a fortnight each June at Gregynog, a magnificent country house in a 750-acre estate which is situated five miles from Newtown, Powys. The present Festival seeks to build on the unique heritage of Gregynog by programming performances of the highest quality by artists of international renown. The Directors organise other occasional events during the year, notably a concert in January which is given by, and promoted jointly with, the Alberni String Quartet as a fund- and curtain-raiser for the Festival.

It is widely regarded as the premier music and arts event in Mid Wales and the only Festival which can bring such a wide range of international artists in many disciplines to perform in this remote and deeply rural area for three weeks each summer.

Powys shows good support for artistic events but few of this stature are held here. The Festival provides accessible arts events at affordable prices for the rural communities of Mid Wales and the Marches and the audience research in recent years suggests a very strong local catchment and continued expansion within the SY postcode area in particular. It attracts a loyal and growing following from farther afield with many patrons willing to make a round trip of 80-100 miles to attend the concerts and others who arrange their annual holidays to overlap the Festival run.

Links to other regeneration initiatives

The Organisation quotes - The significance of Festivals of an international reputation like ours is recognised in Creative Powys – Powys Arts Strategy 2011-2016:

"From village shows and craft fairs, to festivals of regional, national and international reputation - Gŵyl Gregynog, Presteigne Festival of Music, Brecon Jazz, Hay Festival - these events play an important role in the calendar of local life and in raising the profile of Powys in the national consciousness, helping to put it on the map."

The Organisation has have been supporting the development of the Mid Wales Festivals Network and are also building on the legacy of the PRP-supported 2010 Gwyl Ifor Ceri Festival by taking an event to Kerry Church this year. The extensive outreach programme takes the Festival into the wider community through the work with schools, special schools, residential homes, hospitals and hospices, and by staging concerts at community venues as well as at Gregynog Hall itself.

Project / activity fit in with the Powys County Council One Change Plan:

Adult Living

Gregynog Festival's annual partnerships with the Gwanwyn Festival and Live Music Now enables the Organisation to provide specific services targeted at more elderly members of the local population. In 2011, they will take live music into four local residential homes and make the first visit by request to Newtown Hospice. Also programmed is a concert this season to which members of local U3A groups are being invited

Learning in the Community

The main focus of the work is to increase awareness of the musical and cultural heritage of Gregynog. The annual Schools' Day provides music and art workshops free of charge at the Hall for the pupils of three Powys primary schools and their teachers.

Regeneration

Working in partnership with local businesses, suppliers and volunteers, we deliver an international-quality cultural event in this deeply rural area.

Climate Change

The Organisation source the majority of the Festival's services within North Powys and Gregynog, its principal venue, has its own sustainability policies.

Value for money:

Less than 10% of the Festival's total expenditure is spent on administration and marketing costs have been further reduced by moving toward electronic sales and promotion in favour of box office commission and print advertising. The earned income has increased to over 25% while keeping ticket prices accessible to the local catchment.

Aims and objectives of the project	 The project aims to: Boost tourism in Powys and the surrounding area. Supporting the image as Wales as a cultural destination. Make the event as accessible as possible by providing free tickets to students in tertiary education, giving a free ticket to every school pupil in Powys schools, continuing the free dedicated schools days for local primary and secondary school pupils. Making the festival sustainable and environmentally sound by aiming for zero waste to landfill for all back of house functions: catering, exhibitors, partners and festival management. The festival will work with new companies who will widen the range of materials recycled and work with our traders and suppliers to help streamline the materials entering the waste stream. Continuing with the aim for waste minimisation from festival visitors by developing the messaging which promotes the recycling facilities in place and create awareness about recycling and waste minimisation.

Hay Festival, established in 1987 has developed to become an international festival production company and globally recognised brand. Based in the small market town of Hay-on-Wye, Wales, the festival aims to celebrate great writing in every medium – poetry, journalism, screenwriting, theatre, fiction, song, comedy and scholarship, in Britain and around the world. All Hay Festivals are informal, accessible and great fun. The festival believes that cultural activity sits within society as celebration and bonding for communities.

Links to other regeneration initiatives

After the success of the revival of the Beacons Project at last year's festival the scheme is continuing in 2012. Participants, aged 17-18 years old are given access to one-to-one tutoring and direct work experience a wide range of

opinions and views of language, politics, history and environmental issues, from leading authors and world class academics. They also have access to and opportunity to work with Daily Telegraph journalists. At the 2011 festival participants were featured in the Hayley Telegraph, the daily magazine produced by Telegraph about the festival.

The festival continues to support local charities through car parking and collections at events during Hay Festival events.

Hay Festival is partnering with the Hay Castle Trust as the Castle becomes home to a new music venue. This dedicated music venue will showcase high calibre new-music acts and will target an audience, which hasn't previously been reached. This new programme of events and activities in the town will bring content back into the centre of Hay as well as helping to raise awareness of the Castle Trusts aims and objectives.

Project / activity fit in with the Powys County Council One Change Plan:

Adult Living

The festival offers the highest level of cultural activity to a rural community where there is limited access to high level cultural events.

Learning in the Community

The work with young people aims to bolster their learning, providing them with unique experiences and an opportunity to put their work on an international platform. After the success of the dedicated Primary and Secondary schools days this has expanded to accommodate more schools. The Festival continues the free tickets for Powys pupils scheme and Foster Care families, and hf2 the dedicated teen programme

Regeneration

The Festival has a world-wide reach and attracts tourists and media coverage from all over the globe. The Hay Festival's new relationship with The Telegraph has had a considerable impact on the coverage of all of its activities throughout the year, both at home and abroad, offering the festival to a readership of over 1,500,000. This commentary on the area boosts awareness and tourism encouraging investment in property, businesses and tourism. The Festival continues to spend over £500,000 in Hay, Brecon and Powys throughout the year.

Concessions on the festival site are encouraged to employ local people to work during the festival. The festival facilitates this by listing these vacancies online at Hayfestival.org

Climate Change

The Greenprint Project has been running for 5 years. This year's development of solar heating units aims to cut the amount of electricity we use to heat water and thereby reduce their overall CO2 emissions. The Festival has expanded on its comprehensive transport network which includes regular buses, servicing Hereford train Station, surrounding villages, Brecon and Hay town centre, with the inclusion of cycle rickshaws and electric buggies. The Festival continues to implement a recycling

scheme on site and this year's sustainable development charter challenge is to advance on the success of the recycling scheme and to achieve zero waste to landfill.

Value for money:

The Festival operates very efficiently and as a not for profit organisation, any income over and above costs is invested back into the ongoing development and outreach programmes. The amount of money that the Festival brings in to Powys and Mid-Wales estimated to be up to £21m, which for an investment of £11,000 represents good value for money. The return on the investment in terms of student education development is difficult to put a figure on but we have many examples from previous participants to know that a large number go on to use the knowledge they gain in very positive ways

The Telegraph Group, the title sponsor of the festival in 2011, is committed to give \pounds 700,000 of editorial and advertising media coverage and support. Reaching a brand new audience for the Festival of affluent readers who have the potential to attend the festival for the first time, which will help us to maintain our customer base through the recession.

Sky Arts, broadcast sponsor of the Festival, provides access to a worldwide audience through their recording and programming of Festival events throughout the year.

Caplor Energy, a local energy company will be assisting with the solar panel trial. Local community group, Transition Town Hay are continuing to and develop one of the onsite gardens, promoting themselves and the work they do throughout the year. Hereford Art College which attracts students from Powys as well as across the border is providing students and lecturer support for the installations.

UK Youth and Roland have continued to help build an accessible and comprehensive hf2 programme for 13 to 19 year olds.

The festival continues to build relationships and partnerships with The London Library, Oxfam, National Trust and Cambridge University and has established new partnerships in 2011 with E.ON, Cardiff University, Amnesty International and Talgarth based B-Bugs

Aims and objectives of the project	The Circuit is a consortium of professionally run theatres and arts centre in Mid and West Wales who have worked together for more than 25 years to share tours, training and skills as well as joint projects. The organisation employs one part-time staff member four days per week during term time to undertake fundraising, coordinating training and skill sharing and manage shared projects.
	The Circuit is also currently hosting and providing management and support to Cytser: The Constellation Project, and community based arts project covering the Meirionydd area of Gwynedd which grew out of the work of Theatr Harlech. Cytser employs a full-time Artistic Director, currently employed by the Circuit. Our aim is to work with Cytser and partners in Gwynedd to establish a board for the organisation so that it can stand alone by April 2013
	This year the Circuit's work will include:-
	 Working alongside Audiences Wales on a major research project across all our venues, producing Knowledge reports for each of the theatres and completing an in-house audience research programme to provide comparator data for "Rural Proofing" The Knowledge programme – funded by ACW £5000 strategic funding.
	• Working alongside Wyeside theatre and arts centre on plans for long term sustainability and an ACW Lottery application for an education and outreach programme.
	• Continuing to support Cytser and work towards a managed transition to independence, and working alongside Gwynedd County Council and ACW to stabilise the organisation's funding base.
	Continued advocacy, funding and project management support for the staff within the

theatres which make up the Circuit network.

This annual partnership application is towards the cost of programming high quality professional arts performances in the four theatres in Powys – Hafren, Theatr Brycheiniog, The Welfare and The Wyeside.

Part of the Circuit's work this year has been an in-house audience survey looking at the demographic profile of our audiences. The research shows that our audiences live predominantly within a 15 minute drive time – Brecon 61%, The Welfare 61%, Wyeside 69% and Hafren 46%. This is definitively local provision, with 79% of Brycheiniog's, 75% of the Welfare's, 80% of Hafren's and an amazing 91% of Wyeside's audiences living within 30 minutes of the theatres. While the research demonstrates some cross-over between audiences this is mainly between Wyeside and Brycheiniog and even there only 12% travelling from Brycheiniog to Wyeside and 26% from Wyeside to Brecon.

The project will benefit each of the communities around the theatres, the rural hinterlands which the serve and the community groups which use them on a regular basis. Each of the venues has its own relationship to the community within which it works. For example both Theatr Brycheiniog and Hafren have been involved in the Noyes Fludde project with Mid Wales Opera, working with local schools, dance schools and music groups to put together a performance of the Benjamin Britten Opera.

Brycheiniog is used on a daily basis by local arts groups, dance schools, the youth theatre and Mid Wales Chamber Orchestra. Hafren provides a base for Coleg Powys' performing arts students, and there are also an increasing number of courses in Brecon.

The Wyeside is looking to increase its day time usage and bring back the kind of youth theatre and summer school work which established it as a centre of excellence in the past. The Welfare is in constant use by local groups, as well as providing a base for the Josef Herman Foundation whose work alongside the Tate gallery promises very exciting news for Ystradgynlais in the future and the opportunity to work with national archives and collections.

Together the four theatres in Powys, each unique but linked by their work through the Circuit, are a fantastic resource for their communities and audiences. They provide the opportunity to watch and participate in exceptional quality performances, to see work from around the world rather than drawing only from our country and in many cases are able to bring in work from around the world through subsidised programmes such as Creu Cymru's Phoenix scheme.

They also work hard to celebrate the cultures of Wales through Young Farmers' Festivals, Eisteddfodau, schools performances and concerts by local groups.

Links to other regeneration initiatives

The theatres will continue to:-

- Work alongside Communities First initiatives and officers, for example in Ystradgynlais and Newtown to ensure the venues play a full and active role in local regeneration.
- Play a key role in the economies of their own communities by bringing in visitors, working with local accommodation and restaurants etc. to increase the tourist spend in their areas.
- Provide a draw and added value to those looking to relocate to Powys by ensuring we are far from a "cultural desert" and can offer a rich and varied programme of events and performances to keep all our communities entertained and engaged in the arts.
- Assist with the physical regeneration of communities for example through the recent capital works on Theatr Hafren, repairs to stone work and theatre refurbishments at Wyeside and the on-going regeneration of the canal side areas of Brecon.

Project / activity fit in with the Powys County Council One Change Plan:

Adult Living

The theatres offer a key service to adults across Powys, who make up the majority of our audiences. Our research shows that those attending shows are of mixed ages, social backgrounds and levels of educational achievement. We aim to appeal to the whole of the adult audience and are particularly targeting younger and male attendees through live comedy shows and lectures by extreme sportsmen etc.

Learning in the Community

Three of our theatres already work in partnership with Coleg Powys and other community learning bodies to provide both a venue and resources for community based learning. The Wyeside is extremely keen to see the newly refurbished theatre busy in the day time with dance and drama classes and is also looking at the potential for wider adult education classes.

Each of the theatres also works alongside local schools with children participating in some shows, for example through the Noyes Flooded productions with Mid Wales Opera in Brecon and Newtown. The theatres also negotiate reduced rates and

discounts for children to attend theatre shows and ensure a wide range of performances with relevance to curriculum content are presented.

Regeneration

The Cultural Industries have been identified as a key driver of economic regeneration for Powys, and the venue network provides an infrastructure to support both individual residents working in the sector and companies touring and resident here. The relationship between Mid Wales Opera and Theatr Hafren is a key example of this, with a hot desk and marketing as well as touring support offered to MWO. The relationship between Earthfall and Brycheiniog has also encouraged links and visitors into Powys as did the successful No Fit State residency in Brycheiniog's car park. By building these connections and supporting other companies, both professional and amateur led, the theatres act as the hubs of arts activity in Powys and support an ecology allowing arts activities to thrive and artists to expand their horizons and make new connections.

Climate Change

One of the key areas of focus for the technicians working within the Circuit for the past two/three years has been advances in LED stage lighting. Two years ago demonstrations by Stage Electrics showed that while many lamps could be replaced by LEDs, colour washes etc still required older technology. This has now changed and the lighting at Brycheiniog and Wyeside is in the process of being replaced by the new LED models which use far less power, save money and reduce the costs of cooling systems. Brycheiniog's status as Wales' first solar powered theatre, and constantly on the look out for new energy saving and generating models of theatre provision.

Value for money:

The elements of subsidy provided by this grant to the theatre programmes makes a vital contribution to providing a balanced mix of shows with some work designed to stretch tastes and develop audiences. While the majority of the programme is supported by ticket income, this grant gives the opportunity to explore new areas of work which would not be possible to present if bound to programme only product which would guarantee no loss on box office.

Mid Wales Opera's mission is to bring opera of the highest standards to places which otherwise do not have access to it, thus reaching new audiences of all ages and enhancing the accessibility of live opera performance to those who already love it;
	and to offer opportunities to professional singers early in their career to master major roles, working from the base of Mid Wales.

Mid Wales Opera aspires to mount productions which compare well with the work of the major companies and aims to make opera accessible through the use of modern English translations, clarity of delivery of the text and immediacy of performance. The partnerships with venues provide opportunities for a wide range of audiences to have access to opera and encourage many (often from otherwise excluded groups and young people) to experience live opera for the first time. The well-established collaboration with Theatr Hafren and the extensive network of "Friends" and supporters in Powys allows for the development of a uniquely rewarding relationship with audiences in Mid Wales.

To support the development of the planned production of Mozart's Don Giovanni and its initial three performances at the MWO Festival on 5th, 7th and 8th September 2012 prior to a tour of other venues in Wales and England.

Also in 2012 the Company will bring its production of Noyes Fludde – which has already been mounted last October at Theatr Brycheiniog – to Newtown and again a partnership with Hafren and local schools has been developed to deliver a week long residency culminating in 2 performances of Benjamin Britten's imaginative opera for children at Hafren on 27 April 2012.

Links to other regeneration initiatives

MWO's collaboration with Theatr Hafren makes a significant contribution to the reputation of the Theatre as an artistic hub for the area and provides real opportunities for people living locally to develop and utilise skills in theatre work.

As well as using a production management company based in Caersws, they have often recruited stage management and crew locally many of whom have gone on to develop successful careers in the sector. MWO has ambitions to expand this element of their work by providing formal training positions on future productions providing appropriate funding can be identified.

The ability to develop and create a high quality artistic product which then widely promotes Mid Wales' contribution to cultural life, as well as the direct economic benefits it brings, is an important contribution to the development of a sustainable community in Mid Wales.

Project / activity fit in with the Powys County Council One Change Plan:

A vibrant artistic and cultural life is part of what is needed for sustainable living in Powys and the MWO contributes significantly to this.

Learning in the Community

The partnership with Powys Arts Connection this year represents a new dimension to this activity.

Value for money:

MWO provides considerable leverage for the contribution made by Powys County

Council. Also receiving considerable support from local business in kind and receive major grants from Control Techniques, Laura Ashley Foundation, Old Bell 3 Ltd and others. And that the overall income of the company is anticipated to exceed £400,000 making a useful contribution to the local economy.

As can be seen from the budgets around a third of the income is anticipated from box office and other sales.

All of the publicity material, interpretation, publications and website are bilingual.

Powys County Council has also approached Oriel Davies and asked if they would partner PCC to help to deliver a pilot programme, The Art Factor, aimed at

encouraging young people across the county to extend their experience visual art. They have agreed to this and plan to deliver aspects of the Portfolio + part of the programme

Links to other regeneration initiatives

Oriel Davies contributes a great deal to the Regeneration of Newtown and North Powys. The Gallery is a hub for the local community and is visited, often on a daily basis by some local residents. They also draw large numbers of visitors to the area, with many making visits to Newtown due to the Gallery's presence here.

This project has been operating successfully for over 30 years, benefiting from funding via the PCC Community Enablement fund for many of those years. The project is needed because many people use the project and this need has been confirmed in a recent feasibility study looking for support for an expanded Play Resource Library throughout Powys.

The Organisation support 51 play providers and 417children & 144 parent/carers use the static services. It is the only Play Network and Toy Library Service in Montgomeryshire, providing toys and equipment for hire at low rates, craft materials to buy at cost and information and advice from the small team of part time members of staff and volunteers.

They operate the only inclusive Youth Club in the Shire and would like to develop this further and form an integral part of the Powys Play Strategy, working with Play Development Workers funded by the BIG Lottery Child's Play project, and are employed by Powys County Council to develop play throughout the Shire. They are members of the Play Strategic Management Group within Powys

The toy library in Radnorshire has been in existence since 1992 and continues to be as popular as ever, with 26 new family members joining last year (in addition to existing members), and many new groups and events availing of our resources.

geographically isolated socially isolated economically challenged in need of support by other agencies

The play needs of all Powys, were identified through the "audit of play needs / priorities for 2011" consultation carried out by the Play in Powys Infrastructure team during 2010, which showed there was a 19% need for a play resource library out of all the consultations carried out throughout Powys. A toy library has since been identified as a Priority One in the Powys Play Strategy.

In the 2010 Powys Children and Young Peoples Partnership Business Plan, the planning priorities state the following: "Implement the Powys Play Strategy so to ensure:

a more appropriate range of community-based play provision is available
 enhanced play provision within schools (for in-school and out of school purposes)

- increased play provision as part of housing and community developments
- better information on play opportunities is provided

The 'What have we got to play with?' Executive Summary conducted by National Association of Toy and Leisure Libraries (NATLL) and Play Matters in Wales (2010) concludes 'that toy libraries are about 'more that just toys' and that they help 'provide the fuel for play', that types of play are enriched by having a range of play materials available, and that well chosen good quality toys and play materials is important'.

In the past this grant has been awarded to PAVO solely to support core services and general development work, after discussions with the Powys Regeneration Partnership and Jenni Thomas, Community Regeneration Manager, it was agreed that PAVO would apply for funds towards development work concentrating on social enterprise support.

The PRP set up a multi-agency social enterprise working group following a commissioned piece of research on social enterprise in Powys, 'Leaking the Services'

PAVO has now set up and supports a social enterprise network for Powys. Over 30 groups have joined the online network so far, one of the requests they already have is for supporting in marketing their organisations and services.

Links to other regeneration initiatives

- The support provided through the network to strengthen local social enterprise activity will contribute towards delivery of a range of objectives within One Powys Yn Un. In particular that "People in Powys benefit from having a diverse economy" (specifically indicator 2.2 but also 2.1, 2.3 and 2.5).

The winning piece, by London-based composer Jon Opstad, will be awarded the second Alan Horne Composition Prize and will be premiered at the Festival by Anglo- Russian pianist Alissa Firsova. Although a relatively small organisation, the Presteigne Festival believes it most important to develop sustainability as an organisation. It recognises the huge impact activities have on the environment and on the local community. Presteigne is a Transition Town and is therefore very much aware of the need for sustainability. Their intention is to take steps to improve sustainability within the needs of the organisation and those of the town. Their priorities include:

Economic

Contribute to the local economy whilst meeting the needs of the organisation:

- Use local suppliers wherever possible;
- Use locally based workforce where possible;
- Continue to encourage the audience to utilise local services such as accommodation, shops and restaurants;

Social

- Involve the local community in major decisions and developments and keep them informed;
- Respect the local community and cause as little inconvenience to them as possible during the Festival period;
- Contribute to education in the region by offering locally sourced projects that invest in communities;
- Make events accessible to everyone.

Project / activity fit in with the Powys County Council One Change Plan:

Adult Living

Last year the Presteigne Festival took a small group of musicians into care homes, Knighton Hospital and the East Radnorshire Day Centre bringing them performances of new works first heard at previous Presteigne Festivals. This was such a great success that further, extended activity with elderly members of the community is currently being planned for 2012/13.

The Presteigne Festival is aware of the financial pressures of the local community, and makes every attempt to keep ticket prices at a reasonable level.

Learning in the Community

The Festival is currently involved in a major education project which involves children from three primary schools in Powys and two in Herefordshire. The *Singing Histories* project promotes literature and music and has an historical focus centering on the Battle of Pilleth. A professional composer, writer and musicians will work with around 200 school children.

Regeneration

The involvement of the Presteigne Festival in outreach or performance activity is seen by many as a mark of excellence. As an external stakeholder with experience in providing a wide and varied programme of events and outreach activity, it is particularly well placed to deliver adult living and learning within the community.

Climate Change

The adoption of green practices in our activities in order to reduce our carbon footprint:

- Use recycled paper for publicity material recycle waste produced;
- Strive towards being a paperless organisation use email and online options where at all possible;
- Moderate individual car usage by offering coach transportation and car share schemes from Presteigne to out-lying venues during the Festival period;
- Reduce energy consumption by using efficient equipment and technology;
- Engage a high proportion of British-based artists to reduce air travel;
- Celebrate the local countryside through the arts and guided walks.

Value for money:

The Presteigne Festival presents an annual programme utilising performers and composers of the highest national and international standing.

Audience research on ticket price was carried out five years ago, the outcome being that most people found the ticket prices 'about right' or 'good value'. The highest single ticket price in 2011 is £19.50 for a choral/orchestral concert on Saturday 27 August.

- The listening public will be made aware of the Presteigne Festival as a result of broadcasts on BBC Radio 3;
- 2012 will continue to see tangible reductions in the Presteigne Festival's carbon footprint; a Festival Bus will transport audience members to concerts and events at outlying venues lessening the need for car use; the Festival brochure will be produced on re-cycled paper again this year.

Aims and objectives of the project	The Judge's Lodging exists to interpret and preserve the history of the Shire Hall and to provide visitors with a portrayal of a working Victorian house and collects objects and other materials associated with these aims. It is also custodian of Presteigne's collection of local history objects and aims to expand interpret and preserve this in an appropriate way. It accomplishes these aims through a mixture of museum collections, recreated interiors, displays, audio visual interpretations, events and educational services.

Support of the general operation of The Judge's Lodging is particularly prevalent this year, whilst the small staff need to focus much of their attention on the new Presteigne Community Collections Project, which is being supported by the Heritage Lottery Fund. This new project will provide new exhibition rooms for all visitors, plus in-depth working with the local community. Benefits are to a wide-ranging type of user:

- Visitors to Presteigne / Powys not only by providing a high-quality visitor experience, but by providing information on the area, its history and other things they may like to do –this also benefits the area in general as visitors are encouraged to stay in Powys.
- Education schools and other educational groups. Approx 2,000 pupil visits per year on special educational activities. We also work intensively with some special needs educational organisations
- Local business by our support of them and by visitors to us who then spend money in the area.
- Virtual visitors approximately 50,000 unique visitors to our website each year a large proportion of these are accessing our educational facilities.
- Groups –social, special interest and other groups who come on organised visits to the building
- County events used for a number of Powys events in the last month, the Installation of the High Sheriff of Powys, The St George's Day Parade for the scouts and the Freedom of Powys to the Welsh Guards.

Links to other regeneration initiatives

The Judge's Lodging supports the general economic regeneration of the area. It supports local businesses both by itself and by bringing visitors to the area, and

working to keep them in Powys (and in particular, Radnorshire) once here. Its operation of a tourist information centre also supports the area.

Project / activity fit in with the Powys County Council One Change Plan:

Adult Living

Providing a high-quality museum experience with learning facilities, changing exhibitions and events. New HLF project will also provide a 'drop- in' area for locals to relax, read, play chess etc and provide an information service for local people wanting to organize transport, days out, events to go to, plus a booking service for local events. Also Opportunities for volunteering in many different roles, plus new supporting training programme.

Learning in the Community

- 1. Providing a high-quality museum experience with learning facilities, changing exhibitions and events.
- 2. Changing programme of events and exhibitions (to be dramatically stepped up once HLF project is underway)
- 3. Support to local schools education sessions, loan of objects, and advice to teachers.

Regeneration

- 1. Local businesses supported by staff and visitors.
- 2. The project is designed to promote sustainability for the organisation and is an integral part the Forward Plan for 2010-2013. It will maintain and hopefully increase visitors to the building.

Aims and objectives of the project	The Festival strives to provide entertainment and education for all ages and tastes. Although there is a focus on the Victorian era which attracts a particular set of people to attend this is not exclusive as many events reflect other eras and interests. Throughout the week over 30,000 visitors plus locals attend the festival in some capacity. This is a boost to the local economy of the area. A significant number of these visitors stay in the area for the entirety of the festival. The festival is an ideal opportunity for local groups and performers to showcase their talents and to contribute to the festival in a variety of ways.

The Festival aims to enable people of all ages to experience a variety of entertainment and to participate in activities whilst appreciating the historical town of Llandrindod Wells and its countryside through a 9 day family festival with a focus on the Victorian heritage of the town.

The Festival will provide a collection of varied entertainment including full theatre shows, concerts, street theatre, arts & craft, children's entertainment, talks, walks, displays and competitions. Many of these will have been provided by local people and organisations while others will be provided by professional people. The main objectives of the festival are:

- To promote tourism with Llandrindod Wells and the surrounding district
- To provide family entertainment through approximately 150 programmed events and 100 street performances
- To increase trade for local businesses particularly those in the hospitality trade and an opportunity to promote themselves
- To provide local organisations, involved particularly in entertainment, an opportunity to perform to a wider audience

Links to other regeneration initiatives

2012 will see the 31st Victorian Festival. It is the main attraction of the year in the locality and the surrounding area. This proves the popularity of the event by both locals and visitors alike. It provides stronger tourism promotion for the town and surrounding area. An event which encourages people to come to the area and which persuades motorists driving through the town to stop must be a benefit to the local economy.

Llandrindod Wells benefits from the Festival with many accommodation providers being fully booked and local shops experiencing increased footfall.

The community and visitors benefit from the festival as it is an all-inclusive festival which enables people to participate on all levels. The community can benefit from being able to access low cost or even free entertainment – something an economically deprived area very much welcomes.

Local groups benefit as there are opportunities for them to showcase talents and fundraise. Examples of such organisations include Holy Trinity Church, Llandrindod Wells Theatre Company, Llandrindod Art Club, Powys/Radnor WI Federation, Kington & District Operatic Society, Llandrindod Town Band, the Rock Park, and Llandrindod Car Club. These and many others all contribute to the Festival thus showing a strong community support for the festival

Most Festivals concentrate on either tourism or community and we pride ourselves on being able to marry the balance of both, bringing in visitors from all over UK and Worldwide

The Llandrindod Wells Victorian Festival is considered to be the premier Victorian Festival in Britain, with other Festivals and Spa Towns seeing it as an exemplar Festival and they strive to attain the excellence which Llandrindod Wells Victorian Festival has achieved.

Aims and objectives of the project	To provide a range of high quality live, cinematic, community and visual arts events and workshops which inspire, entertain and educate the community of south Powys and beyond.

The Welsh Index of Multiple Deprivation 2008 records Powys as being among the very worst in terms of its populations' access to facilities. Indeed, of nearly 2,000 local areas, Llanelwedd is the country's 20th worst, while 5 of the areas bordering Builth are in the poorest 40.) Powys County Councils public consultation on services places leisure as significantly higher in priority than the national average and its support of services is underpinned by understanding of leisure as a way of bringing businesses and highly skilled professionals into the area. Wyeside Arts Centre plays a key and vital role in providing a high quality arts provision within the County

Wyeside Arts Centre had lost its revenue funded status with ACW in 2010 and has negotiated with Theatr Brycheiniog regarding the formation of a federation partnership between the two organisations offering:

- The best opportunity to continue to provide a high quality live programme for the community it serves
- A cost effective way to improve service whilst cutting 'back room' costs
- Enhanced community provision through a shared Education and outreach
 Officer
- A sustainable future for the organisation
- More effective use of resources in particular marketing through partnership

Links to other regeneration initiatives

The partnership with Theatr Brycheniog will be for the mutual benefit of both charities and for the communities in the area offering not only cost savings but improved services.

In 2011/12, Wyeside has been enterprising in securing funding from outside the county for major capital projects providing substantial contracts for local businesses and which contribute to the survival and success of the arts centre

(1) A complete refurbishment of the Market Theatre interior to modern theatre standards was completed by end of March 2012. Project cost is in excess of £200,000 of which PCC has contributed. £15,000. Other funders were the Aggregate

Levy Fund for Wales, the Friends of Wyeside and Trust funds such as the Garfield Trust.

(2) Wyeside is a member of a consortium of Welsh Arts venues linked to a UK-wide Digital Funding Partnership. In 2012/13 digital projection equipment will be installed in the Castle Cinema and the Market Theatre, with facilities to show 3D product in the Castle Cinema and satellite relay facilities in both theatres to show broadcasts of world class live arts events from eg National Theatre Live, Bolshoi Ballet, New York Metropolitan Opera. The project cost is approaching £200,000. Approximately 90% will be paid by a combination of Arts Council of Wales grant plus a contractual arrangement with projector suppliers akin to hire/purchase agreement in which the liability for continuing instalments is met by film distributors. The conversion to digital projection is essential to maintain Wyeside as a cinema as 35mm film is being phased out by the industry.

In addition to these two major capital developments, Wyeside is undertaking a programme of restoration works to the exterior of its premises, (a Listed Building bequeathed to be used for the benefit of the town and owned by the charity), which is an iconic landmark by the Wye Bridge in Builth Wells. The programme entails some $\pounds150,000$ works, which is likely to be phased over five years. The first phase, to the value of c $\pounds30,000$ was completed in 2011/12.

The purpose of the capital investment is to maintain and enhance the infrastructure of the historic building, to extend the range and scale of the arts centre's activities (after the setback of the loss of ACW revenue grant), to develop audiences through improved audience comfort, and to secure a vibrant, and sustainable, future for the arts centre

In addition to the performance and activities Wyeside offers to local audiences and visitors, maintaining a viable not-for-profit business use is critical to maintaining the Listed Building.

Project / activity fit in with the Powys County Council One Change Plan

Adult Living

Wyeside Arts Centre is in the centre of town and is accessible to all local residents on foot, and within 100 metres of the town's main car park: disabled parking is available on the building forecourt. The building and operation of the centre is, and will continue to be, a fully public building in every sense. The ground floor provides level access, and a lift giving disabled access to the Market Theatre is provided. Wide public access has been a fundamental tenet of the Centre throughout its history, and is a thread that runs through the Market Theatre programme - and is also expressed in the 60-strong volunteer team which is central to the Centre's operation. Friends of the Wyeside support both the artistic and financial life of the organisation – and currently contribute some £12,000 per year to support its activities.

Learning in the Community

Wyeside Arts Centre offers a programme which has direct appeal and is targeted across the age range and has programme elements serving Welsh Language speakers (both live and film), those with learning difficulties and other disabilities. The centre adds a valuable cultural and leisure asset to the community of mid and south Powys.

Learning in the Community. There is a diverse range of the best dance, drama and music which inspires, educates and engages across backgrounds and ages - special performances and activities for schools, youth groups, carers and older people, amongst others and through the federation WACs commitment to deliver high aspirations in terms of community and artistic use of the Theatre space. Support of the under 18s go free which will apply to at least 3 events per programme

Regeneration

The key driver of the federation is the future sustainability of Wyeside Arts Centre, to develop and strengthen the programme whilst reducing costs.

Wyeside"s current turnover is over £200,000 p.a., and it employs a team of 10 part time staff from the local area. A percentage of the current programme comes from regional professional artists, filmmakers and performance companies, and selling a range of other locally sourced produce. As 20% of users travel over 25 mins. There is a secondary spend factor within the local economy, so the organisation has significant impact for a town of Builth's size.

Powys County Councils" public consultation on services places leisure as significantly higher in priority than the national average and its support of services is underpinned by understanding of leisure as a key driver to quality of life and the economy of the area

Climate Change

There are 3 theatre venues in Powys located in the north, south and Wyeside Arts Centre being in the centre. Drive times already average 25 minutes so provision in the middle of the county is essential in lowering carbon footprint. Builth is also relatively well served by bus. The Wyeside recycle a good deal of the waste that is produced and use low energy lighting. They have also programmed live and film shows which have an environmental focus

Value for money:

The proposed federation offers a 20% reduction in the budget as part of the Wyeside Arts Centre business plan. Costs on staffing are reduced by sharing back room costs and the budget for programme and marketing are increased from the 2010 proposal.

There are also projections for growth within the federation though with the unforeseen delay it is not clear if these targets with be met in year 1.

Aims and objectives of the project	Since 2009, the Community Regeneration Unit has been working with identified Village Halls Committees throughout Powys to complete a community and facility audit to help ensure that village halls within Powys are of high quality and fit for purpose The review has included the management committee's processes and the engagement other community organisations in business planning with the aim to transfer the building to the Community under the Authority's Community Asset Transfer programme.

A report was approved by Board regarding the Community Centre and Village Hall review, detailing the proposal to encourage asset transfers that 'ensure that the Community Buildings throughout Powys that have local community support will flourish and become local hubs for community activity.'

An audit of Community Centres and Village halls subsequent to the above report identified the following communities as having facilities that could be transferred from the Council to their local management group:

Aberhosan Community Centre Aberhaseph Village Hall Bwlch Y Sarnau Cillage Hall Clatter Community Centre Derwenlas Village Hall Knucklas Community Centre Knighton Community Centre Lliartywaen Community centre Presteigne Memorial Hall Tirabad Village Hall

To ensure that the prospective transfer of the individual community buildings is correctly administered, there are various costs that must be met, such as valuation fees, legal fees and on occasions a full independent survey of the property is required. In order to ensure the continued progression of the community asset transfer programme with village halls/community centres, the Community Regeneration Unit wish to undertake a program where funding is available to assist with these activities.

Aims and objectives of the project	The overall aim is to provide a multi-activity, interactive Village Hub. The replacement of the hall is very much a community led, bottom up, sustainable project. It is 'owned' by the community. The Community Centre includes a sports field (PCC) a hard court, a children's play area with equipment (PCC) and a car park (PCC). The hall building is an essential part of this integrated facility. It is the subject of the CFAP and CRDF Capital grant application. The new hall will provide an excellent facility for the local people, for lectures, club meetings, educational activity, children & toddler groups, the Youth Club, etc. A new hall could provide outside agencies to establish outreach facilities in the community.	
	It is a very important focus for many activities, but is especially important for the young people, who have little else to participate in. There are no other meeting places in the village except the pub.	

The Project is to replace a dilapidated, but well used and popular community centre building with a purpose built, community hall to provide adaptable accommodation including a communal meeting hall, ancillary meeting room, kitchen facilities, toilets with changing facilities (serving the sports field and hard court) and storage area. To comply with current regulations and to meet energy efficiency/conservation requirements.

If a new hall is not built the existing building will become unusable. There would be a significant loss to the County and the local community.

Also various costs to the community that are not required now would arise. For instance, local people would have to travel further for activities they now enjoy locally. The village loses its focus and many educational, socialising and other opportunities would be lost. The quality of life would be diminished.

Links to other regeneration initiatives

The Beguildy Community Council is joint lessees, and also supporters. The County Council currently own the land.

CFAP (Community Facilities and Activities Programme) are funding most of the rebuild costs.

Project / activity fit in with the Powys County Council One Change Plan:

Adult Living

Various groups would use the improved centre for their activities. Activities such as health clubs, cooking classes, gardening and vegetable growing clubs will be encouraged. The many elderly people locally will have a comfortable and warm centre for leisure activities.

Learning in the Community

The hall would be used to provide teaching and advice to the community. Computer classes have been here and they would be encouraged to return. Also advice on job searching etc. would be useful in this deprived area.

Regeneration

Various regeneration activities would be encouraged to use the hall's facilities. The Knucklas Castle Project has inspired regeneration through its allotment and community growing scheme and public access to this monument. Planning permission has been granted to sites near to the Centre giving outline permission for the erection of approximately 35 properties. The Local Development Plan, now in the course of preparation, indicates there could be further development opportunities, including affordable housing, close to the Centre. A New Hall, with its many activities and opportunities for social interaction could provide an imputes for development Plan

Climate Change

The existing hall is un-insulated timber frame and cladding with single glazed windows, thus wasting a great amount of energy. The new hall would be to modern standards (BRE Green Guide category A+ or A). Being adjacent to the rail station and bus stop encourages users to use their public transport.

Value for money:

A new community centre (village hall) will be provided for the community at a very competitive construction cost of approximately £866/sq.m. For comparison, the Big Lottery application was to a design and budget provided by the County Architect, priced at £2450/sq.m. The tenders ranged from £200,883 to £255,747. It should be noted that one of these, not the lowest cost, was for a demountable type of construction likely to have a limited life. This was invited so as to obtain a base cost for comparison with more traditional buildings. The adopted traditional building is lower cost than the demountable type.

Youth Club (and Scout Group previously) has been an important user for many years and is extremely important in maintaining a constructive and engaged focus for local children and young people in the community; many are from low-income and/or single parent families

Older people

Various clubs with older members have used the hall for many years (for example, gardening clubs, art classes, Ladies Guild and a recently formed flower arranging class), and yoga classes. All combine to maintain a lively interest and social interaction for older people.

- People with disabilities Disabled access is unsatisfactory at present and will be excellent in the new building, offering greater participation in community centre events for all.
- The village has a significant number of low income and benefits-only people. There are many social housing units (approx. half the village), some with people with no local roots. There are several single parent families and children in the care of relatives other than parents, or other carers. Many people find only occasional, casual work; there are no large employers within reasonable travelling distance. Some people work away during the week, disrupting family life.
- Many people are Senior Citizens, and from out of the area, so lacking local contacts. The centre makes an important contribution to their well being by providing a social and activity centre for their activities and helping them to make friends and become fully integrated into the community.
- Transfer of the Hall and land to the local community Negotiations are currently ongoing with PCC to, on completion of the new build, to transfer ownership of the land and building to the local community via the Beguildy Community Council. The replacement of the hall is very much a community led, bottom up, sustainable project. The transfer of the land and building would confirm ownership and would assist in community cohesion.

Project meets Capital project selection criteria?	Yes
Aims and objectives of the project	Llanidloes Community Football Trust aims to improve the playing and training facilities for all football parties in Llanidloes. Namely: Llanidloes Ladies (x2 teams), Llanidloes Men (x4 teams when including youth), Llanidloes Junior Girls (3 teams) and Llanidloes junior boy teams (8 teams). This is the first time that all 4 clubs responsible for football in Llanidloes have joined forces. The Trust aims to make Victoria Avenue football ground and club house the home of all the clubs and teams in Llanidloes and provide a whole club ethos to all parties involved. In addition to this the Trust aims to provide additional opportunities for participation for individuals and groups currently not catered for. These groups include the over 35's, the under 8's, Disabled groups and for children and adults who wish to train and play for recreational reasons only. To achieve this, the Trust will set up new leagues and training sessions for all of the groups mentioned.

- 1) Llanidloes Ladies Football Club The Trust is trying to ensure that all the needs of the ladies team are met to secure their future in Welsh Premier League. Llanidloes are the only ladies team in Powys to play in this prestigious league which is currently split North and South. However In September 2012 the North and South leagues are combining to form a complete national league. As a consequence the Ladies team will be required to play at home every other Sunday for up to 9 months. The premier league has strict ground criteria and as a result no other facility in Llanidloes could accommodate this. With the men's first or reserve team playing at home every Saturday it is inevitable that many, if not the majority, of their winter fixtures will be cancelled. Llanidloes ladies also have a hugely successful academy programme that has resulted in players gaining National Caps. The Ladies section are devising a more comprehensive training and recruitment plan, however they are currently restricted to one hour a week contact time. Further training sessions will undoubtedly result in more players reaching their goal to 'play for Wales'.
- 2) **Training Facilities** The lack of and inadequate training facilities in Llanidloes is a huge issue. Currently training mainly takes place on the multi-purpose Red Grass pitch on the High school site. However this facility is unplayable on frosty or wet conditions so as you can appreciate months pass by without any training or

matches at many levels. Llanidloes has the largest primary school in Powys and has the largest number of football participation in Powys per population percentage. For many years now the town has been envious of the facilities and investments in our neighbouring towns, namely Maldwyn Leisure Centre in Newtown.

3) **All Wales Facilities** - It has been confirmed that should a facility like this be achieved in Llanidloes then Powys, Central Wales, Regional and even National squads would train and play matches from here. The benefits this would bring to the local community and economy would be huge.

Links to other regeneration initiatives

3G pitches are environmentally friendly because they don't need to be maintained to the same level as a grass pitch. For example grass cutting, paint for marking the pitch weekly etc.

In discussions with Potters 'Entrust' Landfill department and hope to secure funding to support this scheme whilst at the same time addressing the environmental elements.

Project / activity fit in with the Powys County Council One Change Plan:

Adult Living

Dramatically improve the health and well being of all the 16+ footballers in Llanidloes as training and playing will be increased.

More social leagues will be development so many more additional adults will become healthier from recreational football.

Other sports like hockey, tennis, netball etc can also be introduced.

Learning in the Community

Currently between the clubs they have large number of coaches at level 1. 5 level 2's. Many more coaches will be identified and put through the FAW coaching pathway.

Regeneration

With very few businesses in Llanidloes being able to survive during the current economic climate, a scheme of this kind would make a huge impact to the town of Llanidloes. The bars and restaurants will become busier in the evenings whilst juniors train. Visiting premier league ladies teams have already began staying overnight and spending money here. With more premier league fixtures to come this can only increase. In addition the hosting of regional and national coaching and playing requirements further visits to Llanidloes are inevitable

Climate Change

3G pitches are thought to be more environmentally friendly than grass pitches.

Value for money:

At present there is no adequate training or playing facilities for football teams in Llanidloes to play during the winter months. Players will have the chance to train and play regularly and more often thus resulting in improved healthy lives.

Need for the project		
The project is needed to meet demands for improved and safer launching facilities to replace an old wooden slippery slipway with an aluminium non-slip ramp and improve the approach to the launching area. This will resolve the problem of launching and retrieving the club's safety boats and for the more elderly members who keep their boats close to the creek, which had become silted up and almost useless for purpose. The provision of a new storage facility will increase the club's capacity to dry store more members' boats and windsurfers as currently space is a limiting factor.		
Links to other regeneration initiatives The club has sufficient funds to meet its obligation to complete its commitment to the project.		
Project / activity fit in with the Powys County Council One Change Plan:		
Adult Living The improved facilities will enhance the club's ability to introduce and train people to take part in the sport of sailing and also the club's wider commitment to encourage families to take part in an outdoor activity. For the last three years the club has hosted the Powys Water sports Fun Day for people with disabilities, which attracted 92 participants in 2011 including 12 in wheel chairs. The club holds Open Meetings over weekends during the season which attract sailors and their families from other areas to visit the locality and take		

part in club events.

It has also made its facilities available for visitors from an old people's home in Brecon and the club is always willing to help in the community.

The club is an active participant in the Llangorse Lake Advisory Group, which collectively monitors activities on the lake and over-sees that the lake

regulations are adhered to or when needed amended from time to time.

Learning in the Community

As stated above, the club runs training courses at all levels throughout the sailing season and puts on days or evenings to encourage schools, scout and other youth groups to become involved with sport and Christ College Brecon use the facilities on a regular basis.

For very many years the club has run Cadet Week for training junior members during the Summer Half Term holiday.

The club co/hosts the Welsh Yachting Associations weekend Junior Regatta which attracts more than 100 visiting crews.

See letter attached from the Welsh Yachting Association.

The Swansea University of the Third Age visited the club for a day's sailing in 2011 and it appears this will become a regular feature in their programme.

Regeneration

The project will improve the environment within the club site and attract visitors to the district from other parts of the country.

Climate Change

One of the problems of Llangorse Lake is the fluctuating water level, which is predicted to become more unpredictable due to climate change and the new launching facility will go some way to alleviate the problem.

Value for money:

As in many previous projects, some of the work towards the completion of this project will be done by skilled club members on a voluntary basis, reducing the actual overall cost of the project, which delivers an enhanced value in relation to the overall expenditure incurred.

Aims and objectives of the project	With the closing of the school the Church House, as it is currently known locally, it is the only hall with the potential to fulfil the needs of the village in terms of a meeting facility for more than a handful of people with varying needs and requirements. The objective of the project is to refurbish the existing hall mentioned above to meet not only the diverse requirements of the village in terms of meeting space but also to ensure the hall meets current requirements for public meetings and events. Once this has been achieved to make it available to clubs, societies and residents as a centre for the village and to encourage a greater sense of community spirit and belonging

There is no other building within the village centre that would meet the objectives and aims above. In the past organisations such as the Young Farmers, Show Committee, W.I, Line Dancing, Computer Classes, Local Community Council have held meetings there and Local, County, National Assembly and General Elections have been held in the hall to be refurbished, this is to name a few. Currently the Church House has no toilet facilities and is in desperate need of updated just to make the building fit for purpose

Links to other regeneration initiatives

At present there are no other regeneration plans, however given the central position of Llangurig within both the County of Powys and indeed the country as a whole the refurbished facility may well prove attractive for organisations with county and National reach due to its convenient location.

Project / activity fit in with the Powys County Council One Change Plan:

Adult Living

Learning in the Community

The refurbished Community Centre will be available to groups such as Mother & Baby, Children's Music lesson group (one tentative enquiry to date)

through to Adult crafts clubs and classes such as computer skills etc.

Regeneration

In the short term it is unlikely to regenerate but if the aim of engendering community spirit is successful more people will find Llangurig attractive and this should ensue local businesses prosper with the increased footfall that the hall would generate.

Climate Change

The facilities to be provided are currently only available in towns and villages around Llangurig and require personal transport, almost entirely by car. A round trip to Llanidloes (the nearest) is in excess of 10 miles which if multiplied by the number of people attracted to use the Centre would save a significant amount of greenhouse gasses being emitted.

Value for money:

The costs described earlier will be negotiated to ensure value for money.

Aims and objectives of the project	Mid Powys Mind is a Registered Charity (Charity number 702833) providing essential day, crisis and out-of-hour services to people who have acute, poor and long-term mental health problems, their carers and families in the area of Radnorshire and North Brecknockshire, in Powys. Through their work support and encourage people to build self-confidence and self-esteem aiding their recovery to live more independent, improved and healthy lives.

Funding will pay for the refurbishment and equipping of a new community Gallery in the Centre of Llandrindod Wells that will provide volunteering, training and work experience opportunities.

The purpose of the project is to increase the employment prospects of people with poor mental health. The Organisation will establish a community Art Gallery (that will be opened at least five days a week and will aim for 7 days in the summer (through which a number of training and work experience opportunities will be created as well as the establishment of a community enterprise consisting of the Art Gallery and a clothes up-cycling initiative to reuse/modify/ repair clothing for resale which will include vintage clothing for the Victorian festival market. This opportunity has arisen as a floor in our building has become vacant and the space it offers will allow us to expand our service and opportunities to service users and the wider community.

The Organisation will establish a community Art Gallery on the lower floor of current building where service users and local artists will be able to sell and display their work (this will be for all kinds of art, including paintings, photography, craft work, pottery), thus creating a small revenue stream for themselves and the Gallery would take a small commission around 20% (to pay for future running costs). This will be staffed and run by volunteers. As well as our service users and run exhibitions for service users from other local organisations.

This will provide training and volunteering opportunities in retail which are presently unavailable to the members due to the stigma of mental health organisations are unwilling to take them on in many positions. Training will be provided through the Job Centre, Powys Training, WEA, staff and where necessary outside professionals.

The up-cycling project will collect old garments, including those rejected by

local charity shops as they need too much work. The clothes will be altered, made fashionable and then resold to the members thus making clothing more affordable to them, or online through Ebay and the website. This will generate an income for our organisation and help the finances of our members by making clothing more affordable.

An additional element of the Gallery will be a community space from where we will sell tea/coffee and light refreshments. This will provide an environment where service users can meet that is open to the public instead of behind closed doors in the members only area of the building.

The project is designed to benefit people with or at risk of poor mental health as well as give an opportunity to local people to sell art/craft work through the Gallery. The Gallery will also be of benefit to the town as a whole as it will provide an additional tourist attraction in the centre of town.

Aim 1

Increase the employability of people experiencing or at risk of mental ill health Objectives

- Create and offer vocational training in retail for at least 30 people in a year
- Create new volunteering experiences that will build skills and confidence for work for at least 10 people
- Involving at least 20 people in running a social enterprise

Aim 2

Increase the self confidence and skills of people experiencing or at risk of mental ill health and encourage active healthy lives Objectives

- Creating 10 new volunteering opportunities
- Enable people to display their art / craft work for others to appreciate
- Create more opportunities for people to participate in community activities
 - Creating new training opportunities that build skills and self-confidence

Aim 3

Reduce the stigma surrounding mental health

- promote the positive aspects of people (skills and abilities) that have poor mental health
- Create more opportunities for people with poor mental health to integrate with the wider community

Aim 4

Establish a social enterprise

- Set up a community art gallery that sells art and craft from service users and local artists
- Set up a clothes up-cycling initiative to sell items online and to service users

Links to other regeneration initiatives

Under the Powys One Plan, the project addresses:

Outcome 1 – people in Powys live in supportive, sharing and self-reliant communities; by supporting people to take a more active role in their community by creating volunteering opportunities that will make people feel part of the community

Outcome 2 – People in Powys benefit from a thriving diverse economy; by establishing a social enterprise in Llandrindod and encouraging visitors to spend more money in the Art Gallery

Outcome 3 – People in Powys have the skills to pursue their ambitions; by providing training opportunities and related volunteering experiences to build the skills that people have identified including adults with no qualifications and NEETs

Adult Living

The Organisation will be providing a space for people to socialise and mix with new networks reducing isolation and feelings of exclusion, building individuals levels of confidence and self esteem to improve their quality of life and to take a more active role in the community.

Learning in the Community

Creating new learning opportunities that will be backed up by volunteering opportunities to out theory into practice. The learning is based on what service

users are requesting to help them meet their ambitions and interests.

Regeneration

Establish a community enterprise that will help with the sustainability of the Art in Mind, provide training that will lead to job skills and greater employment prospects for people who are marginalised in society.

Create a new tourist attraction in Llandrindod Wells keeping people in the town and high street area for a bit longer and giving another opportunity to spend money locally. Money spent would also be going back into the local economy as all exhibitions will be from local people.

Climate Change

Reduce waste by reusing clothing and teaching / encouraging service users to be able repair their own clothing.

Organisation	Mid Wales Entertainment Circuit Ltd
Project meets Capital project selection criteria?	Yes
Aims and objectives of the project	The Circuit is a consortium of professionally run theatres and arts centre in Mid and West Wales who have worked together for more than 25 years to share tours, training and skills as well as joint projects. The organisation employs one part-time staff member four days per week during term time to undertake fundraising, coordinating training and skill sharing and manage shared projects.
	The Circuit is also currently hosting and providing management and support to Cytser: The Constellation Project, and community based arts project covering the Meirionnydd area of Gwynedd which grew out of the work of Theatr Harlech. Cytser employs a full-time Artistic Director, currently employed by the Circuit. Our aim is to work with Cytser and partners in Gwynedd to establish a board for the organisation so that it can stand alone by April 2013.

This application is a joint capital bid for work at the Welfare, Ystradgynlais, Hafren in Newtown and Theatr Brycheiniog. While the Wyeside remains a busy and active member of the Circuit, they have chosen to bid separately on this occasion for funding towards the ongoing refurbishment of stone work on the theatre.

The application will benefit the audiences of all three theatres and their staff, as well as those who participate in the arts and crafts within the venues, who attend courses run by Coleg Powys and others and who use the theatres for meetings and conferences.

The project is aimed at capital works designed to improve the facilities on offer at the theatres and their service to audiences and wider communities. Specifically, the work will:-

Brecon

- Improve front of house areas and the bar this will allow the theatre to improve visitor experience and the experience of those using the venue for community and learning events. The work should also increase profit from bar sales, and speed of service by replacing draft beer with bottles which can be served more quickly during peak times, avoid the current 30 pints per week wastage on clearing pipes and will allow for a greater range of locally sourced ales including Brecon Brewing. The work includes new LED lighting, new fridges and furniture, decoration and reworking of the working areas behind the bars.
- Installation of people counters This will allow Theatr Brycheiniog to report effectively to funders on the footfall of the building in terms of community usage, day time visitors and those who simply use the toilets or cafe facilities. It will allow for more effective decision making about staffing priorities and opening times.

Hafren

- Improved lighting and sound equipment for theatre use The costs include a new lighting desk, effects wheels, additional sound equipment including a graphic processor and radio microphones and folding tables for use within the venue for special events and conferences.
- New tallescope The use of tallescopes within theatre settings has long been an area of concern. Health and Safety regulations in relation to the movement of scopes, use of outriggers and Working at Height rules have now been clarified and the new scope is necessary both for the sake of safety and in order to meet the needs of technicians working on the new fly tower at Hafren.

Welfare

• Front of house improvements

The costs for this include improvements to the foyer area, new furniture, a touch screen tv, chiller and coffee machine. The toilets would also be modernised and improvements made to the car park with the addition of bollards, signs and poster display boards. The Welfare is constantly used in the day time and in evenings and these additions would make facilities far better for educational and community groups using the building as well as increasing the potential for income from commercial hire. The movement sensors will allow for energy saving as lights throughout the building can be turned on and off automatically when no one is in the room.

• Theatre and cinema equipment

This equipment relates to improved facilities for the broadcasting of live events on the cinema screen for example Met Opera, National Theatre, Bolshoi Ballet etc. These events have already been screened at The Welfare and proved popular with audiences, developing a new income stream for the Welfare and new facilities for local people.

Links to other regeneration initiatives

The theatres will continue to:-

- Work alongside Communities First initiatives and officers, for example in Ystradgynlais and Newtown to ensure the venues play a full and active role in local regeneration.
- Play a key role in the economies of their own communities by bringing in visitors, working with local accommodation and restaurants etc. to increase the tourist spend in their areas.
- Provide a draw and added value to those looking to relocate to Powys.
- Assist with the physical regeneration of communities for example through the recent capital works on Theatr Hafren, repairs to stone work and theatre refurbishments at Wyeside and the on-going regeneration of the canal side areas of Brecon.

Project / activity fit in with the Powys County Council One Change Plan:

Adult Living

The theatre network in Powys is an invaluable resource for everyone in our communities, but particularly for adult audiences. Adult programme makes up the majority of their work and aim to ensure something for everyone. Access to arts participation and attendance is a key indicator for quality of life, and we believe it is vital to ensuring the rural populations thrive, as well as to attracting new businesses and new residents to Powys.

Learning in the Community

All three of the theatres involved in this bid are regularly used for community learning. In the case of Hafren and Brycheiniog, the performing arts courses hosted by Coleg Powys take place on our stages and the work done to improve facilities will have an immediate benefit to learners. The Welfare is also central to learning in the community and is in constant day time use for courses.

Regeneration

The venues are at the heart of the regeneration of their communities. They have a very substantial economic impact in terms of spend from visitors making overnight trips, meals bought locally and visiting companies staying near by. They also contribute to social regeneration through the provision of participatory activities, education work and training, as well as in providing an added draw to those moving into the county.

Climate Change

Climate change, and the reduction in overheads associated with a reduction in energy usage, has been key drivers for the Circuit's work over the past four years. Theatr Brycheiniog is the first solar powered theatre – with a PV array costing £75,000 on the south facing roof.

All been working hard on replacing both house lights and stage lighting with LED equivalents and the work on the bar at Brycheiniog will include the installation of LED lighting. The stage lighting at Brycheiniog has now been replaced with LED and we will look to do the same at other theatres as lamps become redundant.

Value for money:

The project represents an ongoing investment in the theatre network in Powys.

- Improved facilities for learners and for amateur companies using our stages (Hafren)
- Increased hire income from the theatres (Hafren and The Welfare)

Organisation	Presteigne & Norton Town Council
Project meets Capital project selection criteria?	Yes
Aims and objectives of the project	Over the past 20 years the Town Council has acquired a number of pieces of ground for amenity use by all the community. The vision of the TC in doing this has provided the sites needed for numerous successful community activities and providing a focus for many of the town's main activities. These include Sheep Music, May Day fun Days, Skateboard park and bike track, community orchard, Ligne Garden and barn and the site for 36 successful allotments amongst a host of other things. It is also planned to hold a major food fair promoting local produce in June which is a new event for this year.
Need for the project The purpose of this project is to complete the project started in 1990 and finally link up Went's meadow with the Warden forming a comprehensive mixed amenity 'Green Belt' on the East side of the Town from the allotments to the Warden for all the community to enjoy. It started with the Withy Beds Nature reserve which won a Prince of Wales award in 1990. Followed by the	

Nature reserve which won a Prince of Wales award in 1990. Followed by the purchase of Lower Wents Meadow 1992 and the Upper Went's Meadow in 1997. All this ground has been maintained and improved by the TC with the aid of numerous volunteers from the community to provide an excellent amenity for the town. All this links with the Wilson Terrace playing fields owned by PCC and with the Scout Hut and Tennis courts.

The project aims to purchase 1.2 acres of ground on the backside of the Towns major historic monument which is the Warden. The ground will enhance the Warden and be managed to provide a wildflower meadow for the enjoyment of all the community. The hedge planted at the time of the building of the by-pass will be properly laid and a new fence will be installed on the new boundary. A mixed species hedge will be planted adjacent to this fence in consultation with the Radnorshire Wildlife. The schools and the Warden Guardian Foundation are helping with the creation and the future maintenance of this area.

Links to other regeneration initiatives

One of Presteigne's strengths is having been voted the second best place to live in the UK. So it is important that we continue to improve what is on offer both to visitors and the community to ensure it remains a special place to visit. Purchasing this field would enhance the Warden by improving the public access to it, improve the street scene from the by-pass, provide a further visitor attraction with the best views (not available from other vantage points) over the Lugg Valley as well as adding to the recreational facilities for the community. This field has always been the favourite spot for the young people of the community to toboggan down when it snows!

If successful Presteigne & Norton TC would then look to work with PCC through the Sense of Place initiative to create a pamphlet with a series of circular walks for visitors to maximise the benefit and use of this and other ground owned. These leaflets would be available from our other main tourist attraction the Judges' Lodgings.

Project / activity fit in with the Powys County Council One Change Plan:

Adult Living

People in Powys enjoy a clean, safe and green environment. This is exactly what this project aims to help PCC achieve. Access will be provided to the site as required under the Disability Discrimination Act 1995.

Learning in the Community

Through the use of interpretation boards the importance of biodiversity will be explained and the benefit of this meadow to pollinating insects.

Regeneration

Provides an additional visitor attraction linking up the historical interest of the Warden right down to the banks of the River Lugg.

Climate Change

The bees and other pollinating insects are in crisis and through programmes such as the Sarah Raven's Bees Butterflies and Blooms on BBC1, communities are being encouraged to plant nectar rich plants to look after the insect pollinators and this would be Presteigne's contribution by creating an area planted with perennial wild flowers.

Value for money:

The price for the purchase of the ground has been set by PCC at current market rates. The works are costed at the current rates from known local contractors who costs are known to be fair. Also this project holds the key to acquiring the old reservoir adjacent to the land as early indications are that Welsh Water may well consider gifting to the Town.

	The project has been approved by Faculty, Conservation Area Consent has been granted and planning permission has been approved.

Need for the project	
The Church is unable to	facilitate community events without this project.

There is no public toilet within walking distance which is particularly awkward for the elderly, disabled and young but affects everybody.

Currently, hospitality can only be offered with extreme difficulty and lots of planning

It is difficult to facilitate concerts and school events without the additional space which will be provided by the project.

Special interest groups would use the building for morning/afternoon sessions – currently not possible without the facilities.

A recent school Inspection report highlighted the excellent church /school links which involve additional use of the building. The school use the church as a teaching resource – they are close enough to be able to walk. Currently they are able to visit but ack of toilets is a problem for longer sessions. The Church is now working with the school on aspects of the curriculum and sessions could be held in the building.

Ladybirds (Nursery) are now using the building and require these facilities.

The relationship between the Church and the local nursing home and care in the community organisations is excellent but could be improved by the opportunity of inviting older people to the church building for social events. Residents from Vyrnwy Nursing Home will benefit from a change of surroundings. The "Get Together Club" would really welcome a venue to come and have a sing song before an afternoon tea.

Links to other regeneration initiatives

The arts centre form one of the four key venues in the Powys CC arts strategy. Its Market Theatre reopens in April 2012 after a major redesign and refurbishment to create a more comfortable, flexible and sustainable space. In 2012/13 the centre's cinemas will be upgraded to digital projection with facilities for 3D and satellite relays of live arts events. Also in 2012/13 the centre will open a new attraction for tourists and the community – an artists' space, 'Window on the Wye'. To coincide with this development the Wyeside Gallery has been refurbished for exhibition use. The opening exhibition is from 25 April to 1 July.

Conserving the external fabric and appearance of the building is a necessary complement to developing the interior arts facilities and activities.

Project / activity fit in with the Powys County Council One Change Plan:

Adult Living

The arts centre provides social and leisure opportunities of particular value to those who tend to be isolated by retirement, unemployment, caring responsibilities or disability.

Wyeside is in the centre of town, accessible to residents on foot, and within 100 metres of the town's main car park; disabled parking is available on the building forecourt. The ground floor provides level access, and a lift gives disabled access to the Market Theatre and the Castle Cinema.

Wyeside engages a wide circle of active supporters. We have a dedicated team of volunteer stewards and bar staff and a resourceful group of Friends and other donors who support both the artistic and financial life of the organisation – and currently contribute some £22,000 per year to support its activities. People and groups from the community, from all ages and walks of life, use Wyeside as the natural centre for leisure activities and community events, whether as audience or as promoters/participants.

Access and participation are central to our programming which is targeted across the age range and has programme elements serving Welsh Language speakers (both live and film), those with learning difficulties and other disabilities. Children's activities in school holidays are valued by parents as well as by the children who take part. The centre adds a valuable cultural and leisure asset to the community of mid and south Powys.

Learning in the Community

In the newly restored Market Theatre, Wyeside Arts Centre will bring a diverse range of the best dance, drama and music which inspires, educates and engages across all backgrounds and ages.

Regeneration

For the refurbishment of the Market Theatre and the forthcoming digitalisation project Wyeside has been able to attract inward investment to refresh the arts

centre facilities to modern standards. Our ambition for the arts centre is to develop and strengthen our programme and grow audiences, to maintain affordable ticket prices, whilst growing income through increased footfall and activities.

Wyeside's current income (before expenditure) generated from live and cinema programme and related activities is over £160,000 p.a., and it employs a team of 14 part-time staff from the local area. The programme includes professional artists, musicians, filmmakers and performance companies from the region, and promote and sell the work of other local artists and craft workers. As 20% of our users travel over 25 minutes, there is a secondary spend factor within the local economy, so the organisation has significant impact for a town the size of Builth.

The Welsh Index of Multiple Deprivation 2008 records Powys as being among the most deprived in terms of its population's access to facilities.

Powys County Council's public consultation on services places leisure as significantly higher in priority than the national average and its support of services is underpinned by understanding of leisure as a key driver to quality of life and the economy of the area.

Climate Change

Wyeside provides a vibrant multi-media arts hub at the centre of Powys for a rural population that would otherwise be required to travel substantially longer distances, probably by car, for access to high quality arts.

Consideration of reducing fossil fuel use (for climate change and economic reasons) is a factor routinely considered in business planning and innovation. For example, as part of the Market Theatre refurbishment we have been able to install low energy LED house lighting through additional grant from the Aggregate Levy Fund for Wales.

Value for money:

Without these repairs the building will deteriorate further, requiring more expensive repair in future.

Wyeside Arts Centre is a key venue in PCC's arts strategy. Responsibility to maintain the historic building falls on the charity with its honorary board of trustees. The charity is able to attract additional funds from a variety of private and charitable sources

Aims and objectives of the project	Arts Alive Wales' mission is to provide opportunities for people to take part in high quality artist led activities. It promotes participation in and enjoyment of the arts in the widest sense through a programme of innovative workshops, community projects and events. Their work is built around the themes of arts and the environment, and arts and health. They work in a wide range of settings including the outdoors and with all ages.
	Arts Alive Wales has a recognised profile for its engagement work in communities and groups that experience social/economic exclusion and a track record for devising and running imaginative large-scale collaborative art projects that involve people from all backgrounds in a joint community endeavour. There are strong links and partnerships with local statutory, environmental, education and voluntary services.

Need for the project.

This project has grown out of specific experience: (i) the second year (2012/13) of working with the Talgarth community and (ii) a developed understanding of how Arts Alive can serve the creative needs of adults with mental health issues and (iii) an evaluation of the current programme being offered at the Arts Alive building in Crickhowell.

The Organisation has identified need through their long-standing relationships with the following, many of whom will be involved as partners or advisors in the 'Creative Energies' project: Brecon Beacons National Park Sustainable Development team, Brecon and District Contact Association, Brecknock Wildlife Trust, Felin Talgarth Mill team, Greenvalleys.org, Gwent Arts in Health, Powys Community Focussed Schools Officer, Powys County Council Arts Development Officer, Powys Youth Services Team, Head Teachers, Talgarth Town Councillors, and Young Carers. The lead artists are also actively involved in shaping the development of the project.

Although Talgarth is located in an area of outstanding natural beauty, the town itself is an area of acknowledged and multiple deprivation according to the WAG index. It is the site

of the now derelict Mid Wales Mental Hospital, and adjacent to a major mental health facility for Mid Wales at Bronllys. It consequently has a local population with chronic mental health issues, and yet is an area that until recently has commanded low investment in its infrastructure and community needs.

This project has been very carefully planned and, having been developed thoroughly over time they have a very clear understanding of what needs to be done and how best to achieve this. They work only with highly qualified and experienced professional artists and are committed to best practice both in the creative direction and administration of the artistic programme. Their strong board are actively involved in the development of the programme and provide on a voluntary basis a wide range of valuable skills including financial expertise, arts management, psychotherapeutic practices, sculpture, event management and the legal expertise.

Between them these two concerts present a variety of music to suit varied tastes. The Jubilee concert would seem to be appropriate and contribute to the celebration of the Jubilee year. The Vespers concert comprises music all based on the words from the Vespers service. Handel's Dixit Dominus is well-known and a 'crowd pleaser'. It is a piece, being written in the baroque style, and is scored for five vocal soloists (SSATB), chorus, strings and continuo.

Monteverdi's Beatus Vir is a motet, a setting of Psalm 112 in Monteverdi's dramatic style. It contrasts pairs or small groups of voices with the weight of the full chorus, a technique known as stile concertato - one of the most characteristic features of baroque music. The piece is scored for six-part chorus and soloists (again mostly members of the choir), with organ, basso continuo and two obbligato violin parts.

The other piece for this concert will be Haydn's Little Organ Mass which will round the programme off nicely, again being fairly well known.

Adult Living

Cantorion Llandrindod has close on 50 members, with an age range of 18 - 92. However, the majority are aged over 50, many retired, most living within the town or in the locality and using local services such as NHS.

Belonging to a choir, the act of singing in itself, and participating in the hard work, adrenaline, and satisfaction of putting on a concert contributes to the ongoing health and lifestyle of all members so must be a benefit in this category.

With the impetus of this project, Powys Dance is intending to set up a group of older people to participate in and enjoy creative dance and they will perform in the event. In addition, one of the groups comprises adults with special needs.

Learning in the Community

The November concert will certainly contribute to the flying start objective for local young people, both as participants and as audience, as they anticipate that many siblings will be brought along to the performance. (NB Children will not be charged for admission), They will be providing the opportunity to hear live orchestral and choral music, with the additional benefit for the dancers of performing with live music of this kind. The chance to participate in a staged production with professional set design, lighting, costumes etc. The project will also clearly contribute to the participation in sports and active recreation objective.

Regeneration

The project will be supporting local businesses and enterprises such as the Pavilion, Powys Dance, staging and lighting experts, local musicians.

Climate Change

Possibility of putting a display in the vestibule of the Pavilion.

Value for money:

The guarantee against loss enables Cantorion Llandrindod to put on concerts of nearprofessional standard in a town which is geographically part of a very rural area. Llandrindod Wells and surrounding area are small in terms of population but still deserve the stimulation and pleasure of both performing in and listening to such musical events

Directly following on from Landscape's ACW/ ACE & Powys CC supported 2010-12 R&D project which created the outline and script of its new Community Drama – "Liberty and the Law", Landscape now plan the full production phase of said play from Sept 2012 - March 2013 when the project will culminate in 70 workshops & 15 performances in the Judges Lodgings' Museum, Presteigne, with 50 participants led by 15 professionals (90% local residents), + 450 audience. Partners: MBA, Judges Lodges Museum.

The theme will be: "Liberty, the Law, Power, Hypocrisy, sex, civil disorder & Justice". The Judge's Lodgings: the authentic Victorian ambience gives the era and performance spaces, and its archives provide story-lines.

The Masterworks covering the themes, Measure for Measure (Shakespeare), Liberty against the Law (C.Hill), Beggars' Opera(s), Dickens, Collins, Zola, Maupassant. Today's national headlines and contemporary local problems make the themes as relevant now as they were in the Victorian era, or in Shakespeare's time. Local workshops have created the created Evensong (and Sweet water/Dwr caru.

Beneficiaries are the local professional and volunteer participants who receive high level skills tuition from national quality project leaders, the local audiences who get to see a quality drama based on their own stories, buildings and history, - also the local partner institutions and organisations. The project helps to sustain and invigorate Presteigne's arts-active community, identity and the area's general economy.

Links to other regeneration initiatives

The project involves community, economic, tourist and training activity in this remote rural community, key objectives of any regeneration initiative.

The project provides a number of roles on-stage and off-stage which will be filled by people over 60 and over 65 thereby keeping them active and engaged with the community, to their mutual benefit.

This includes world, folk, classical and jazz music, dance, theatre, art exhibitions, literature, poetry, opera, crafts, multimedia and film.

Presteigne is at the heart of an area of rural deprivation. The Assembly Rooms is becoming increasingly a key community asset, with the closure of local businesses, venues and the reduction of many local community and arts facilities. MBA addresses these needs by providing an affordable community venue offering low priced educational workshops, arts events and meeting spaces. Aims and objectives of the project	MWCO is a professional orchestra and ensemble that is firmly rooted in Powys. Their aim is to address the gap in the provision of high quality classical music across Powys by presenting concerts and creative music projects of the highest professional standard. The orchestra is led by Marcia Crayford (ex-leader of the internationally acclaimed Nash Ensemble and London Symphony Orchestra) and conducted by James Slater (ACW Creative Wales Award recipient and currently working with Barry Wordsworth, Music Director of the Royal Ballet, Covent Garden). The orchestra is managed by Catrin Slater and the core team all live in Powys.

The overall aim of the next season is to build on the success to date by presenting an inspiring series of concerts and creative music projects to take place between April 2012 and March 2013. MWCO continue to be the Orchestra in Residence at Theatr Brycheiniog.

The programme will include:

- <u>Mentoring Project I</u>: April 2012: The MWCO Mentoring Programme gives outstanding young musicians in the early stages of their careers the opportunity to work alongside violinist Marcia Crayford and cellist Moray Welsh, both regarded as among the finest chamber musicians in the UK. The first mentoring project will take place in April and will include two concert performances of Haydn's String Quartet 'Seven Last Words' in Llanfilo Church near Brecon and St Michael's Discoed near Presteigne.
- <u>Mentoring Project II</u>: May 2012: In this project the musicians will work on a programme of Russian string sextets leading to four concerts at Trinity Church Llanidloes, Mid Wales Shakespeare Centre near Llandrindod Wells, St Michael's Discoed and Llandefalle Church near Brecon.
- <u>Autumn 2012</u>: Two Ensemble concerts themed around Ballet Music including Debussy's 'Prelude a l'apré midi d'un faune' and Ravel's 'Mother Goose' Suite.

To provide in a rural area the benefits of coming together of local choirs and choristers to sing a major work with professional soloists orchestra and conductor, and to enable members of the community to attend a concert of this nature at affordable prices without having to travel out of Montgomeryshire/Powys.

Choristers are drawn from Llanidloes, Welshpool, Newtown, Machynlleth, Llandinam, Caersws, Guilsfield and surrounding areas. Facilities for rehearsing, performance and administration are used in Llanidloes, Newtown and Welshpool.

The annual concert will take place on Saturday May 12th at Theatr Hafren Newtown with the Festival Choir, orchestra and soloists will perform Haydn's Creation. Conductor Patrick Larley. Soloists Eleanor Gregory (Soprano), Stephen Newlove(Tenor), James Birchall(Bass).

Strictly Dancing Festival is to introduce dance styles to adults, with the view of promoting existing classes and the formation of new ones. Company of Elders is to provide an opportunity for the 50+ age group to participate in creative and contemporary dance classes.

Through consultation by PESS Young Peoples Activity officers dance has been identified by young people as the second most popular choice for activity (behind football), yet the curricular provision for dance at KS3 in schools is scant to say the least. There is no GCSE Dance delivery in Powys. This situation puts the young people in Powys who have an interest in dance at a great disadvantage when looking to further their careers in the dance world. There also relatively few private dance schools as they find it hard to exist due to low population and low economic status of many residents in Powys.

Through providing high quality, accessible dance workshops, the young people of Powys will not only benefit from the participation in healthy exercise, they will develop their dance skills, team working, and have a positive experience producing an increased sense of well being. The Youth Dance workshops and intensive courses were extremely popular and on evaluation a strong desire for them to continue was expressed.

The parents were also asked if they would be able to, if needed, pay for the transport of their young people to participate. The vast majority stated that they would not be able to, and those that could stated a very low amount. The participants enjoyed meeting and working with others from all over Powys coming together with a common interest in dance

Links to other regeneration initiatives

The project '3 Generations' supports the Strategic Regeneration Framework in Objectives 1 and 2

Developing the economy

□To improve the robustness of Powys's economy by promoting diversification, and the development of a strong role in the region. Powys has experienced difficulties in retaining trained dance practitioners, as there is not enough work for their sustainability. If Powys Dance can generate a greater interest, and a higher level of participation in dance then it would not only help those self employed individuals who are trying to maintain small independent dance schools, but also to increase the use of freelance Dance Practitioners employed by Powys Dance. □ To capitalise, sensitively, on Powys's heritage, especially its cultural and environmental assets, to promote a viable and sustainable tourism. leisure and recreational product that meets the needs of visitors and local people. All sections within the 3 Generations project will promote a high quality product meeting the needs of local people. The Strictly Dancing festival will be an activity that will also appeal to visitors to the region. To re-energise town and neighbourhood centres as places of vitality, by developing and promoting them as attractive places in which to live, work, play and invest. Rural areas, as pointed out by the Regeneration Framework pose very particular problems and challenges. The diverse nature of the area makes it difficult to populate an activity due to both small population and lower incomes. By providing high quality activities at an affordable cost, with transport in some cases addresses these challenges.

• Developing people and communities

To raise the aspirations, skills and educational levels of people living and working in Powys by promoting a lifelong learning culture that is adaptable, accessible and attractive to all, while meeting the future skills needs of businesses and supporting people trying to improve themselves. Providing Youth Dance activities and work experience will enable the young people to gain the skills and experience that they need in order to access higher levels of education and training in the field of dance. By using local dance tutors who for the most part work part time in their dance work, supported by other earned income, this activity will financially support them, increasing the likelihood of their sustainability and longevity.

To raise the local regeneration capacity and capability of individuals and communities, building on traditional community strengths, to promote a sense of pride, creating better places to live. Providing high quality, affordable and accessible dance activities reaching many people will bring communities together, giving them a sense of pride – that 'it does happen in Powys'.

The Spirit of Place is a 2 stage drama and heritage project for young people in Powys. It has been awarded an Inspire Mark as part of the Cultural Olympiad

In the first stage youth groups across Powys will work in situ to explore their own cultural heritage and its impact on the present and their future.

This stage will be delivered in a variety of workshops covering: researching local history and heritage via archives and artefacts, developing expressive skills - reading and writing, drama, dance, music – and presentation skills.

As part of this stage a heritage mentor will deliver training to youth workers and young people in using archives and museum collections.

The groups will bring their ideas from research and museum visits to share with each other during a residential summer camp in August 2012, during which they will further develop their work from phase 1 and with the support of theatre professionals produce a high quality drama piece.

The residential will culminate in a collaborative performance for intergenerational mid Wales audiences. The project will be documented in an innovative way by the open commissioning of an artist or writer to produce a record of the project which itself will be archived in the Powys Archive to create a heritage for future generation

The project builds on the success of last year's weekend residential and gives young rurally isolated people the only opportunity in Mid Wales to engage as participants in 2012's cultural Olympiad as well as the chance to work with highly skilled professional directors, technicians, film makers, archivists and museum curators to celebrate and deepen their understanding of

their specific cultural heritage.

Until 2012 this was the only Inspire Marked project and is now one of only a handful of 'Inspire' Marked projects in Mid Wales and will give young people in the rural area a real opportunity to engage in the spirit of the cultural Olympiad as well as to develop new skills, confidence and friendships

Sheep Music exists principally to deliver this event; this year's festival comes about directly because of demand from Presteigne's young people for it to return, as evidenced by at meetings and the considerable number of young key organisers this year.

A 3 day World Music Festival in marquees at Wentes Meadow Presteigne, July 10-22nd 2012 featuring at least.60 local, national and international music acts, usually rising young performers playing original style-mixing music.

The beneficiaries are the 1,500 per day audiences, the 60 acts and the 150 mostly young volunteers receiving training, team and work experience, the economic in the local High Street, the ticket income and grants being spent in the local economy, and the whole community coming together to promote the joint activity. There is a wider renaissance of opera in the UK, and SCO is committed to bringing high quality, accessible operatic performances to areas where the large companies do not tour, and where often the public cannot afford the travel to theatres, such as Cardiff.

By providing a pre-performance talk and, through workshops, by giving local people the chance to be in the chorus of the performance in a singing and acting capacity, The Organisation are providing opportunities that no other touring opera company does in Wales. The International Sheep Dog Society is a Registered Charity and its activities strictly accord with UK Charity Regulation. The structure and management has developed since its formation in 1906 but today's structure is not dissimilar from that in place 50 years ago.

The International Sheep Dog Society is a member organisation and registers over 6,000 Border Collie pups every year on behalf of its members. The ISDS Number and Dog Certificate are a guarantee of pedigree that, for most dogs, can be traced back over 100 years.

Many trials take place at a local level, organised by small, local groups. All ages and abilities can participate. There are Nursery trials for young dogs who demonstrate early skills, and Open trials where handlers gain points to permit entry to the National trials.
