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Consultation on changing the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon

1. OVERVIEW OF THE CONSULTATION

Powys County Council consulted on a proposal to change the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon. The proposal was as follows:

- To make a regulated alteration to alter the medium of instruction at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon to Welsh-medium
- This would be introduced on a phased basis, year-by-year, starting with Reception in September 2022

The consultation took place from the 25th February 2021 to the 15th April 2021.

i) Consultation methods

The consultation documentation was available on the Council's website throughout the consultation period, and was distributed to stakeholders, as required by the School Organisation Code (2018). A separate version for pupils was also available on the Council's website throughout the consultation period.

Consultees were invited to respond to the consultation by either completing an online consultation form, filling in a paper copy of the form and returning it to the Transforming Education Team at County Hall, or by e-mailing / writing to the Transforming Education Team.

Meetings were held virtually with the following:

- Staff of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon – 23 March 2021
- Governors of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon – 23 March 2021
- Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon School Council – 24 March 2021

ii) Responses received

A total of 71 respondents completed the consultation response form which was included in the consultation document. This included paper copies as well as responses submitted using the online response form.

In addition, 9 written responses were received from respondents, including Estyn. The response received from Estyn is provided on page 18, in-line with the requirements of the School Organisation Code.

3. CONSULTATION WITH PUPILS

Comments received from pupils are outlined below. This includes the notes of a meeting held with pupils at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, as well as a summary of the written responses received from pupils to the consultation exercise.

i) A virtual meeting with the School Council of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon

Officers from the local authority met with the School Council of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon to get their views on the proposal.

The notes of these meetings are provided below:

A meeting with the School Council of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon

24th March 2021 – Held virtually on Microsoft Teams

Present: Marianne Evans, Sarah Astley, Huw Rowlands – Powys County Council

Officers from Powys County Council met virtually via Microsoft Teams with representatives from the School Council of Ysgol Dyffryn Trann to discuss the consultation to change the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon from dual-stream to Welsh-medium.

The session was held with two different groups of pupils from the school council, one group representing the English stream and the other representing the Welsh stream.

English stream group

The group consisted of one pupil in year 6 and one in pupil in year 4.

Officers explained the proposals for changing the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, and that they would like to have the views of the pupils on the proposal. The pupils understood that if the change was implemented, it would mean that there would be no English stream in Dyffryn Trannon, and all classes would be taught through the medium of Welsh. This would be phased over time and the proposal would therefore have no effect on existing pupils.

The pupils were asked several questions and their responses are summarised below:

What do you like about the two streams in Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon?

- Having two streams is very unique as there are not many bilingual schools

- I like being in a school with Welsh-medium pupils. I like things how they are.

What do you not like about the two streams in Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon?

- Nothing really. I like things as they are.

If things were to change, and the English medium provision was phased out of the school, what do you think about that? Do you have any concerns or questions about that?

- Over the last couple of years, numbers in the English stream have increased, as we have gained five pupils from the Welsh stream, and one from another school in Powys. There are now fifteen pupils in my class, but in September, when pupils go to high school, there will only be ten.

How many years do you have in your class and do you think that works well??

- Year 6, 5, 4, 3 and year 2. It can be a bit of a struggle, but it's working really well as we're all great friends and we're independent as well.

Do you mix with children of the Welsh stream, for example at playtime?

- Because of the pandemic, we now have our own bubbles. But before, we had lots of friends in the Welsh stream, even though they were in different classes.

If the proposal goes ahead, what do you think the effect of any change would be?

- I think that we have the best of both worlds at the moment, as we can speak English but also learn Welsh as well.

Any other comments?

- I don't think that enough people know of the English stream at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon. We are going to make posters and leaflets to let people know about the English stream at Dyffryn Trannon. I would like more children in my class.

Welsh stream pupils

The group consisted of six pupils, years, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6.

Officers explained the proposals for changing the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, and that they would like to have the views of the pupils on

the proposal. The pupils understood that if the change was implemented, it would mean that there would be no English stream in Dyffryn Trannon, and all classes would be taught through the medium of Welsh. This would be phased over time and the proposal would therefore have no effect on existing pupils.

The pupils were asked several questions and their responses are summarised below:

Questions asked to pupils

What do you think of the dual-stream system? Is it good or bad?

- There are not many pupils in the English stream – there are far more in the Welsh stream. Children in the Welsh stream can speak both languages

Before you had to form bubbles, were the children of the Welsh and English stream mixing?

- Not really, no, only a little. Welsh stream pupils tend to play with Welsh stream pupils and English stream pupils tend to play with English stream pupils

Do you think that it would be better if Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon only had a Welsh stream?

- I'm not sure. There are not many pupils in the English stream, but they might go to other schools where they are only taught in English
- It would be good just to have one stream, as then everybody would be able to speak Welsh, and more Welsh would be spoken at home

Do you think that there will be a problem if a new family which doesn't speak Welsh moves to the area, and Welsh is the only language of the school?

- Yes, it could be a problem, maybe children would go to other schools, further away than where they live.

Questions pupils asked

I would like to know if children will have to speak Welsh all the time if the school's language category was changed.

- If the school's language category was changed, Welsh will be the school's language and you would speak Welsh as you do now.

Why are you considering this change?

- Because Powys County Council are concerned that there aren't enough children in the English stream at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, and no children whatsoever in the lower classes of the school, and the Council thinks that the school could be run better with only one language.

Will the English stream teacher have the opportunity to learn Welsh?

- Yes, every opportunity and support will be given for the English stream teacher to learn Welsh, if she so wishes

What will happen to the English stream teacher?

- She will stay, because the English stream will still be here for some years, and she will have the opportunity to learn Welsh.

But when the English stream has ended, will she still have a job?

- That is something which will have to be considered at a later time, if this proposal goes forward.

Why do pupils not go to schools in England if they want to be taught in English?

- In Wales, there are two languages, Welsh and English, and both are the official languages of Wales. There are English schools in the area, such as in Caersws, Llandinam and Llanidloes primary. Dyffryn Trannon is the only school in the area which teaches in Welsh.

Why can't the children themselves choose whether they want to attend the English stream or the Welsh stream?

- It was explained that Powys County Council were worried that pupil numbers in the English stream were very small, and because most pupils were in the Welsh stream, it might be better for the school to be just a Welsh-medium school, as the school could be better run with only one language. However, we are here to listen to what everyone has to say, as we haven't yet made a final decision.

Pupils and the school were thanked for their time in attending the meeting and providing their views.

ii) **Summary of other comments made by pupils**

In addition to the meeting with the School Council, 1 online responses and 0 written responses were received from pupils. Here is a summary of the issues raised in these responses:

- If people want to go to Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon and they are from England they won't understand Welsh as good as other people would and so they would have to go to the English and so they would live in Trefeglwys but have to go to another school.
- It is a lot easier to read with Mum and Dad in English than Welsh because their Welsh is rubbish but they tried hard. Lockdown has been easier because I am in the English class. People in the Welsh class their parents probably didn't understand as much Welsh and so if the English class shuts they will have to move school or just keep going with the same Welsh even if they don't understand.
- I enjoy going to Urdd club and doing Urdd activities since I moved into the English class. I go to DM Pro and after school club and Urdd club where I see more of my other friends from the Welsh class.
- If people have to get buses to go home it is more tricky for them to go to clubs.
- I like working with older pupils in the class, it helps me with hard stuff. I like helping the younger people. It is much easier to show Miss my work in the English class and there are not so many people shouting across the room to another person.
- Don't shut down the English class as younger siblings won't be able to go to the school.
- We could make posters and hang them around places to tell people the English stream is important and know there is an English stream in Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon.
- If the English class shuts and pupils have to go to another school it would be harder for them to do after school things.
- Why are the questions on this form so hard to understand? There is good presentation for kids but no kids form to fill in.

4. CONSULTATION MEETINGS WITH STAFF AND GOVERNORS

Consultation meetings were held with the staff and governors of both schools.

The issues raised at these meetings are summarised below:

i) Consultation meeting with Staff of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon

- Will there be a meeting for parents as part of the consultation?
- How are responses recorded – are names recorded?
- Will the finance currently provided to Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon as a dual-stream school remain the same if the school is a Welsh stream school?
- If the proposal goes ahead, and if for example there is only one pupil in the English stream, would there be a commitment from the authority that the pupil will be funded?
- Would children from Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon's Welsh stream be feeding Ysgol Bro Hyddgen or Llanidloes High School?
- Would transport be arranged if pupils wished to attend the secondary provision at Ysgol Bro Hyddgen?
- Will Llanidloes High-School continue to be a dual-stream school if this proposal goes forward?
- As a result of changes to Powys Admissions Policy, only Dyffryn Trannon pupils will be transferring to the Welsh stream at Llanidloes in the future, and they will not have the opportunity to mix with other children and make new friends with other children in the community.
- If parents decide that their children should have English-medium education, what school would they attend, and would they have transport provided?
- Pupils currently in the English stream have the uncertainty of not knowing for how long they will be together.
- Pupils in an English stream in a dual-stream school have the opportunity to mix with pupils in the Welsh stream, and therefore have the opportunity to improve their Welsh. I am concerned that if pupils move to an English-medium school, they will not have this opportunity.
- A lot of changes will be made by the new Welsh curriculum, and as people move into the area, they will have the opportunity to see that Welsh isn't just in the classroom, but it is in the corridor, a living language, and they will be able to blend into the community and it is a positive change happening in Wales.
- After lockdown and all the home learning, you have Welsh learners in homes where there are non-Welsh speaking parents. How sure are you that if you do go forward with the transformation, these families will want to stay in a Welsh stream school because it might have raised the question for some families that at the end of the foundation phase, it would be better for them to go into the English stream? Will you be looking at definite numbers to know how many children in the next stage

of the foundation phase will be wanting to go into the Welsh stream? Otherwise they will be leaving to go to other schools in the catchment area, when we know a school like Llanidloes have large class sizes already.

- There is chatter between parents whose children are due to start with us in Reception this year. They are nervous because they were choosing Trefeglwys because of the safety net of the English stream should the Welsh stream not work out for them. We could lose those children altogether if parents do not feel their children will have that safety net. I don't know what the answer is, but I know they are anxious and a few of them are re-thinking their options.
- There are still a few children in the English stream class who have moved out of the Welsh stream classes as they cannot keep up with it. What is the back-up plan for those children, as there could be many more and what will the provision be for those?
- A pupil has already left Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon because of the consultation. They were afraid of the outcome of the consultation. I feel that the village will be split. You have so many coming in by bus to the school and you will find the children being bussed out of the village as well.
- If we were a Welsh-medium school then we could encourage people to speak Welsh on the playground and in the corridors, and their Welsh language ability would be much better. At the moment, being a dual-stream, it is difficult to encourage children to speak Welsh when they are playing with children who are non-Welsh speaking. If it was all in Welsh, they would be immersed in Welsh and would pick it up a lot easier.
- Staffing in a Welsh-medium school is difficult. Do Powys have a scheme where we can recruit Welsh speaking staff to come to the school? We find it difficult to find Welsh language staff as there are very few in the area, so what can the Council do in relation to this?

ii) Consultation meeting with Governors of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon

- There is a question regarding the finance of the school going forward and the continuity of education.
- What is the long-term plan when children reach 11 in terms of the local provision.
- There is a fear for the school that if there is nowhere for the pupils to move on to when 11, the concern is that parents would vote with their feet, with the school diminishing in size as a consequence. People need to see a strategy in place.
- The provision in Machynlleth is too far, and I don't think parents would choose to send their children there.
- What are the numbers required to make the English stream viable?
- I like the concept of a dual-stream school, although I appreciate that there are challenges because the numbers never add up and they will

never add up. It strikes me that this is the beginning of the end for the dual-stream schools concept if this proposal goes forward. Are you saying that dual-stream schools have no future full stop?

- There is a more transient nature to population these days. Trefeglwys village is growing, and it is possible that the outlook of some parents will be short term. They might see themselves moving elsewhere in a few years and therefore Welsh language provision might not be attractive to them. I am therefore concerned that we will see many parents sending their children out of Trefeglwys to their nearest English-medium school.
- What language category will YDT be if the proposal goes forward under the proposed Welsh Government new language categories?
- The concern is unless the secondary option is strong, the school would not necessarily go under, but that could weaken the school from the point of view of parents.
- What are the numbers in Caersws and Llandinam?
- If a Welsh-medium stream was introduced in Llanidloes, and the children who travel in by bus from Llanidloes end up going to Llanidloes instead, what effect will that have on the school?
- The school has a unique selling point being dual-stream, it just needs to be promoted better. Many people don't understand what dual-stream means. We could expand the promotion of the English stream, and COVID hasn't helped. Maybe we could pause the consultation process for the promotion to have time to work. It needs time for the promotion of the English stream to work. The past 12 months have made it difficult.
- Both my daughters attend the English stream and both can speak Welsh. I don't see the system broken, it just needs enhancing. It has been said that this proposal is not about saving money, but I think it is because you're funding two schools and can see a way to save money because of the decline of the English. We need to keep what we've got and just do it better.
- The decline of the promotion of the dual-stream has happened over a number of years. Had the dual-stream been actively promoted we wouldn't be having this conversation now.
- Let's maintain what we have, which is unique to any other school in the area.
- In the past the language in Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon was 50/50 split. The school has seen a sustained level of uptake in the Welsh language, despite the fact that we don't have the secondary provision we should have.
- Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon needs to be a future part of the estate in Powys – a stream in Llanidloes could take half of the pupils we have in Trefeglwys.
- I was pleased and relieved to see the commitment from Powys that all current English stream pupils will continue to be able to be taught in the English stream.

- What level of assurance can Powys can give about the continuity of English provision should the proposal be implemented, as the numbers may taper off in the English stream.
- What were the drivers for Dyffryn Trannon being selected for this process at this time, when there are other dual-stream schools or small schools?
- What consideration was given for the consultation to be undertaken on a cluster basis so that we could see better how the pieces of the jigsaw for the cluster fitted together because many of the queries we have had tonight relate to unknown quantities because the picture for the cluster as a whole was unclear.
- Why is Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon being consulted for change when Transforming Education talked about the future of small schools as well as dual-stream schools. Why are we not looking at other schools in the cluster? All the other schools in the cluster are small schools which would potentially realise similar if not greater financial savings than Dyffryn Trannon, then why are you not moving those schools along the language continuum, as all the other schools in the cluster are English-medium.
- What method is the local authority using for those with low or no literacy ability to ensure that they are able to contribute to the consultation?
- The Integrated Impact Assessment refers to activities should the school move along the language continuum, such as enhanced Urdd participation and Menter Maldwyn, all of which are already in place. I just wonder if the Integrated Impact Assessment will be revised further in the process, to reflect the reality of the situation as I don't feel it currently reflects the extent of the extra-curricular and Welsh cultural language activities taking place at the school.
- Will it be possible for Welsh stream pupils to transfer to the English stream after September 2022 should they wish to do so?
- What consideration has Powys given to the potential detrimental impact on recruiting pupils to the Welsh stream by not having a dual-stream site which gives parents the flexibility of moving to the English stream if things don't work out?
- The School Organisation Code on page 9 stipulates that projected transport costs needs to be included and I'm interested in CO2 emissions. None has been included in the Integrated Impact Assessment. Will it be included?
- There are some pupils in this village which if the proposal goes ahead will need to be bussed to alternative provision. There will be data available to make a reasonable assumption as to projected transport costs to make the Impact Assessment a more balanced document.
- We need to embrace this as a positive going forward. The parents have chosen to send their pupils to the Welsh stream.
- We need more detail to make an informed decision.

- I have no doubt that a dual-stream is very beneficial to the pupils' experience.
- I have long term concerns that the numbers of pupils coming to Welsh-medium would plummet.
- There is no evidence of any proactive justification for YDT's proposed change of status – no strategic context i.e. the case made for change appears to be YDT in isolation with no real strategy evident.
- All the reasons cited in support of the proposal could be questioned – the disadvantages listed are fewer in number but potentially have a bigger impact – the risks are understated. Reference is made to impact on other schools but what about the impact on YDT of decisions taken by other schools? – evidence of current / future need or demand appears to ignore the current building work going on and expansion of the village – it is claimed that the impact of the proposal on the community would be minimal but it could well be extremely divisive if we see the children from the village being transported to Llanidloes for their education.
- In approx 2005, the language balance was almost a mirror image of where we have been in the last 5 years or so – admittedly not quite as extreme as the current position but indicative, nevertheless, of an often highly unpredictable issue.
- What is the PCC methodology for reviewing and presenting responses to Cabinet?
- What lessons learned have been considered from elsewhere in Powys or further afield on ALN impact, what is the evidence base to show outcomes ALN pupils taught through a language that may not be spoken at home are comparable to the outcomes of pupils taught in their first language?

5. ESTYN

Estyn's response to the consultation is provided below:

Estyn's response to the proposal to change the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon

This report has been prepared by Her Majesty's Inspectors of Education and Training in Wales.

Under the terms of the School Standards and Organisation (Wales) Act 2013 and its associated Code, proposers are required to send consultation documents to Estyn. However, Estyn is not a body which is required to act in accordance with the Code and the Act places no statutory requirements on Estyn in respect of school organisation matters. Therefore as a body being consulted, Estyn will provide their opinion only on the overall merits of school organisation proposals.

Estyn has considered the educational aspects of the proposal and has produced the following response to the information provided by the proposer and other additional information such as data from Welsh Government and the views of the Regional Consortia, which deliver school improvement services to the schools within the proposal.

Introduction

The proposal is by Powys County Council. The proposal is to change the language category of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon. The proposal is as follows.

- To make a regulated alteration to alter the medium of instruction at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon from dual stream to Welsh-medium.
- This would be introduced on a phased basis, year-by-year, starting with Reception in September 2022, with the aim of all of the school's pupils receiving Welsh-medium provision, ensuring that all pupils are fluent in both Welsh and English.

Summary/Conclusion

The proposal aligns with the Welsh Government's aim of achieving a million Welsh speakers by 2050 (Cymraeg 2050: A Million Welsh Speakers) by increasing the use of the Welsh language in education in Powys.

The proposal is consistent with the objectives of Powys County Council's strategy to transform education in Powys, which includes the aim to 'improve

access to Welsh-medium provision across all key stages' and the objective to 'move schools along the language continuum'.

The proposal is also consistent with Estyn's recommendation in its report on Powys County Council's local authority education services, namely 'ensure that the organisation of provision for non-maintained, post-16, Welsh-medium education and secondary education meets the needs of the children and young people of Powys'. The Council has given appropriate consideration to a range of options and has chosen the above proposal.

Estyn is of the opinion that this proposal is at least likely to maintain the current standards of education.

Description and benefits

The proposer provides a clear and rigorous rationale for the logic behind the proposal. It notes fairly that this proposal aligns with the objectives of Powys County Council's strategy to transform education in Powys, in addition to the Welsh Government objectives to increase the number of Welsh speakers.

The proposer identifies clearly the reasons for the proposal, which include improving educational outcomes, improving educational provision, improving leadership and management, improving efficiency in the delivery of education, and increasing the number of pupils who receive Welsh-medium education.

The proposer identifies the advantages, disadvantages and risks associated with the proposal, and the different options in a balanced way. It states firmly why it favours the proposal, and refers soundly to the benefits of changing the language category of the school. The proposal has given valid consideration to other options. These include maintaining the status quo, changing the language category to English-medium, and the favoured option, namely to change the school's language category to Welsh-medium.

The proposer has given thorough consideration to the proposal's effect on Welsh-medium provision within the authority. It states fairly that the proposal would have a positive effect on that provision, and asserts firmly that Welsh-medium education is the best way to ensure that young people become fully bilingual in Welsh and English.

This point of view aligns with the Education Minister's statement in the foreword of 'Guidance on Welsh in Education Strategic Plans (Welsh Government 2021)', as follows: 'Cymraeg 2050 is clear that Welsh-medium immersion – which is where the medium of teaching and learning is delivered wholly or predominantly through the medium of Welsh – is the most reliable model for creating Welsh speakers with the skills and confidence to use the language comfortably in their everyday lives.'

The proposer has given sufficient consideration to the proposal's effect on the community and the travel arrangements for pupils who choose English-medium education. It identifies clearly that there are currently very few children in the English stream, and that there are no pupils in the English stream in the Reception class and Year 1. It acknowledges in a balanced way that should pupils choose to attend English-medium provision rather than attend the Welsh-medium provision at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, that there would be an increase in distance and travel time. However, it identifies correctly that there are three English schools in the Llanidloes catchment area, two of which are within five miles of Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon. As a result, it states reasonably that distance and travel time to alternative English-medium provision would not be excessive.

Educational aspects of the proposal

The proposer gives detailed consideration to the proposal's effect on the quality of outcomes, provision and leadership within the school.

It refers relevantly to the outcomes of the latest Estyn inspection reports for Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, in addition to the latest inspection of Powys County Council's local authority education services.

It concludes reasonably that it does not anticipate any negative effects on the quality of standards of education, wellbeing and learning experiences for pupils who currently attend the school. It outlines fairly that should the proposal be implemented, the change to the school's language category would be introduced on a phased basis. As a result, pupils who currently receive English-medium provision within the school will be able to continue to receive that provision until they leave the school.

The proposer asserts strongly that the proposal will have a positive effect on pupils' education, including provision, standards and pupils' progress. It states firmly that resources will be able to be used more effectively as there will be no need to duplicate provision in both languages. It will also avoid teaching pupils in small classes with several year groups in each class, as is currently the case in the English stream. It states clearly that this will have a positive effect on the school's ability to teach a full curriculum in the foundation phase and all other relevant key stages.

The proposer identifies decisively that the proposal will lead to all pupils being taught together, which will ensure better cohesion and a consistent language continuum across the school, which will have a positive effect on pupils' wellbeing.

It acknowledges in a balanced way that the school would be required to provide a high level of support for pupils from families that speak little or no Welsh at home, in order to meet their particular educational needs.

The proposer has conducted an equality impact assessment and asserts reasonably that the proposal should not have a detrimental effect on any particular groups. It states robustly that the proposal would have a positive effect on pupils that belong to those groups. The proposer has given appropriate consideration to the possible disruption to current pupils, and has taken suitable action to minimise any effect on them.

6. CONCERN ABOUT IMPACT ON PUPIL NUMBERS AT YSGOL DYFFRYN TRANNON IN THE FUTURE

6.1 Concern that there would be a reduction in pupil numbers at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon

Therefore if Powys County Council's aim is to save money, it will – short term there will be fewer pupils at the school and ultimately the school will close.	As above.

7. ADDITIONAL SUPPORT THAT WOULD BE NEEDED TO SUPPORT THE CHANGE OF LANGUAGE CATEGORY

7.1	Ensure that the pathway from 'pre-school' nurseries through to 6 th form all offer progression in Welsh.	The Council agrees that there is a need to ensure a clear pathway within Welsh-medium education from pre-school through to 6 th form provision. The Council's Strategy for Transforming Education in Powys includes a strategic aim to 'improve access to Welsh-medium provision across all key stages'. The Council is currently developing a number of proposals in order to take this forward.
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7.2	It would be good to ensure that the community around the school has a range of Welsh-medium pre-school provisions such as the Cylch Meithrin and non-maintained provision so that progression to Welsh-medium education is clear to parents from an early age. Similarly, the pathway to secondary provision is also essential. We hope that this will have detailed consideration when considering the provision for communities in this area.	As above.
7.3	The School will need to work with other first Welsh language schools such as Dafydd Llwyd and schools in North Wales such as Pen Baras to ensure this proposal is implemented successfully. Both these schools are exemplars of good practice and will be a good formula for Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon to aspire to.	Comment noted. 8.5.5	Currently, it seems obvious that the school doesn't serve the local community well, as the large majority of YDT children are bussed in from a great distance to access the Welsh stream, while the large majority of village children access schools elsewhere (Llanidloes, Caersws and Llandinam). As a result of this we are seeing more traffic in Trefeglwys and neighbouring towns, more pollution, more congestion, more carbon emissions, and far less community cohesion.	As above.

The arguments of the few parents who are against the change to a Welsh-medium school because they would have to travel 5-10 minutes from the village to an English-medium school are ridiculous considering the steps other parents who want Welsh-medium care and education for their children in Powys have had to take for decades. 8.6.4	Local pupils are more likely to treat the school as a 'happy, local, community based place' that they and their parents call in to, before during and after the school day and not shipped away in a bus.	Comment noted.

9. COMMENTS ABOUT YSGOL DYFFRYN TRANNNON

9.1 Positive comments about Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon

9.1.1	I am a past pupil (Welsh stream) and appreciated the education I received through the medium of Welsh, giving me a great grounding in the language, even though I continued my education beyond primary school through the medium of English.	Comment noted.
9.1.2	We were very much looking forward to sending our children to the local school, especially after hearing such good things about it.	Comment noted.
9.1.3	Being a past pupil of the school, the beauty of the school was always the strength of its bilingual provision – the nurturing nature a smaller school can offer and the 'choice' that parents had available to them.	Comment noted.
9.1.4	We can't praise the English stream at YDT enough – our child received an excellent level of teaching and was very happy during his years at YDT and we're enormously grateful for that. He left year 6 a happy, confident and enthusiastic learner.	The Council is pleased to note these comments regarding the provision at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon.
9.1.5	YDT is 21 years old, and in relatively good condition. Neither stream is oversubscribed and so there are no physical capacity issues driving this preferred option.	Comment noted. The consultation document clearly states that the driver for the current proposal is the small number of pupils accessing the English-medium stream at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon.
9.1.6	I enjoy going to Urdd club and doing Urdd activities since I moved into the English class. I go to DM Pro and after school club and Urdd club where I see more of my other friends from the Welsh class.	Comment noted.
9.1.7	I am in year 4 and love working with the year 6s it helps me with hard stuff. I like helping the younger people. It is much easier to show Miss my work in the English class and there are not so many people shouting across the room to another person.	Comment noted.

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9.2 Concerns about the provision at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon

9.2.1	There has always been a problem around communication at YDT. Notifications are rushed and last-minute and the biggest difference is that parents are not welcomed beyond the school gate. We have given feedback on more than one occasion that the school is missing out on a valuable skillset and potentially enriching contributions that the community of enthusiastic parents would be able to offer. Ultimately, we feel really saddened that what should be seen as a real strength of the educational opportunities available at YDT; its dual-stream bilingual nature, is seemingly now perceived to be a negative to the point where the school is under consultation.	Comments noted. However, the consultation is not about the standard of management at the school and we would be unable to comment on that during this consultation.
9.2.2	Our child had 5 different teachers in one school year and there was an obvious downturn in investment in the English stream vs the Welsh learning environment.	The management of staff would be an issue for the headteacher and governing body. The governing body have control of the budget and would allocate resources to both English and Welsh streams.
9.2.3	The education provided in the English stream at Trefeglwys was inadequate, my child was passed around from pillar to post from Welsh to English.	Should the proposal be implemented, all staff would be teaching in the medium of Welsh and therefore this situation shouldn't occur in future.
9.2.4	Teaching staff are leaving this school in their droves, nothing to do with Covid but more to do with appalling management and leadership within the school.	Issues and concerns such as these should be addressed to the governing body.
9.2.5	The school's current rating is very sad and not a true reflection on the kind atmosphere and great teachers we see as parents.	Comment noted.

9.2.6	As previous efforts were never acted upon, in more recent times we've felt wholly demotivated as parents, feeling there was little point in trying to offer assistance when it's not wanted. Disappointingly, under successive Heads, it has always seemed that parental involvement starts and ends at the School gate.	Comment noted.
9.2.7	This sends out the message that the school is biased in who it accepts.	The school is not 'biased in who it accepts'. Applications for places at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon are processed by the Council's Admissions Team, therefore it is the Council, not the school, which is responsible for allocating places at the school.
9.2.8	Currently, it seems obvious that the school doesn't serve the local community well.	Comment noted

9.3 Concern that the school has discouraged pupils from accessing the English-medium stream / has not done enough to promote the English-medium stream

9.3.1	There have been many children from English speaking families who have been actively encouraged to enter the school using the Welsh provision.	<p>As outlined in the Council's Strategy for Transforming Education in Powys and to contribute to the implementation of the Welsh Government's Cymraeg 2050 Strategy, the Council's priority is to increase the number of pupils accessing Welsh-medium provision, to increase the number of Powys pupils that are fully bilingual in Welsh and English.</p> <p>The Council would expect all schools that offer Welsh-medium education to share information with parents about the benefits of Welsh-medium education, with the aim of encouraging parents to choose Welsh-medium education.</p>

Applications for places at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon are processed centrally by the Council. 9.3.7	The previous head teacher sabotaged any future admissions for the English stream by refusing to show parents around. The current leadership team has inherited the damage this caused but have made no effort to counteract this.	As above.
9.3.8	School has a Welsh name (used to be called Trefeglwys school)	Many schools in Powys have Welsh names regardless of their language category. This includes many English-medium schools, as well as dual stream schools and Welsh-medium schools.
9.3.9	There is no evidence that either PCC or the school have attempted to promote or publicise the English Medium route at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon.	<p>Promoting the English-medium stream at Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon is not part of the Council's role.</p> <p>As outlined in the Council's Strategy for Transforming Education in Powys and to contribute to the implementation of the Welsh Government's Cymraeg 2050 Strategy, the Council's priority is to increase the number of pupils accessing Welsh-medium provision, to increase the number of Powys pupils that are fully bilingual in Welsh and English.</p>

9.3.13	There seems to have been a lack effort to promote the school being dual stream over the years and gradually the number of children going into the English stream has reduced. It's been evident the past 4 years that the LA has steered this school to becoming fully Welsh. The fact that the pre-school changing from Little Acorns/Maes Bach to solely Maes Bach without consulting with parents did not help matters and was rather disappointing.	As above.

These attempts were fruitless and never acted upon despite the offer of time and expertise from a number of passionate parents who were willing to help the school make the changes required.	As above.
9.3.16	A parent once designed a new prospectus but I don't think it was ever used.	As above.

9.3.17	Social media, plays an important role in today's society, and one thing I have noticed and I'm sure many others have too, is that the English stream of the school has never been promoted, via social media such as Facebook/Instagram, newspaper articles nor letters. Many people probably don't even know there is an English stream in the school and have therefore automatically turned local children away to other local schools with a more advertised English Medium school. 9.3.18	It has been commonly known throughout the parent support network that they have done little to no advertising of themselves to the village, it's no wonder their English medium numbers have dropped. 10.1.5	With English being spoken at home our 6 year daughter moved to Llanidloes Junior School and is now learning more Welsh in a dual stream environment because of the standard and style of teaching.	Llanidloes CP School is an English-medium school, therefore is not a 'dual stream environment'.
10.1.6	Pupils that have moved from YDT to Llanidloes Primary School are more confident, very happy and taking to the change incredibly well.	Comment noted.

The curriculum offer is increasingly limited for Welsh-medium learners, and there is a significant concern amongst the profession regarding the commitment of the authority to learners who study in Welsh.'</i></p> <p>To address this, the Strategy includes a Strategic Aim to 'improve access to Welsh-medium provision across all key stages', which aims to improve the Welsh-medium offer in Powys, ensuring that pupils can access an appropriate Welsh-medium curriculum during all phases of education.</p>

18. REFERENCE TO WELSH-MEDIUM EDUCATION DELIVERY MODELS

18.1 Support for dual-stream delivery models

In a dual stream school some learners are enabled to become fully bilingual while other learners in the school study in English only. The learners in the Welsh stream study Welsh and English as first languages and are expected to be fully bilingual. Learners in the English stream study English to first language standard and Welsh as a second language, and are not expected to be fully bilingual by the time they leave school.
18.1.2	Ultimately, we feel really saddened that what should be seen as a real strength of the educational opportunities available at YDT; its dual-stream bilingual nature, is seemingly now perceived to be a negative to the point where the school is under consultation. We are great enthusiasts for the Welsh language and feel strongly that this should not be seen as a Welsh language vs English language issue.	The Council agrees that this should not be seen as a Welsh language vs English language issue. The aim of the proposal is to ensure that all pupils attending Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon have the opportunity to become fully bilingual, with skills in both Welsh and English, regardless of the language spoken in their homes.
18.1.3	Dual stream schools should provide students with equal opportunities to excel in their chosen language. 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21. COMMENTS ABOUT THE CONSULTATION DOCUMENTATION

21.1 Comments about the consultation document

21.1.1	Throughout the consultation document benefits of implementing the preferred option are cited. Many of these benefits are already in place in YDT. It appears the consultation document was not tailored sufficiently to reflect that YDT is already a dual stream school that provides immersive Welsh language education, tracks and monitors pupils, helps learners develop their understanding of Welsh language and culture, produces bi-lingual learners, offers a full range of professional development opportunities, and links with other Welsh medium schools to name but a few. I therefore dispute the assertion in the consultation document that these elements, and others, would be strengthened by implementing the preferred option.	The Council's view is that the Consultation Document has been suitably tailored to reflect Ysgol Dyffryn Trannon, and that the benefits indicated in the document are valid.
21.1.2	The cost of English medium provision at YDT was cited frequently in the impact assessment and by PCC officers during Governors engagement meeting. 22.3 Other
