Short Bridge Street, and Prohibition of Driving Order

along part of Wesley Street - Newtown

REPORT FOR: Decision

1. Purpose

1.1. This report seeks to secure portfolio holder authorisation for local highway authority traffic officers to commence the traffic regulation order consultation and making process to introduce a one-way traffic movement and prohibition of driving along certain highways in Newtown.

2. Background

- 2.1 In partnership with Newtown and Llanllwchaiarn Town Council, Powys County Council has secured grant funding from the Welsh Government for a Transforming Towns Green Infrastructure and Biodiversity for Growing Newtown Project.
- 2.2 These works include modifications to the carriageway, on street parking and footways along High Street which will require High Street to be made a one-way street with vehicles only being permitted to travel in the direction from The Cross to Back Lane. In order to regulate and eliminate confusing and conflicting traffic movements at the Cross the existing one-way traffic prohibition order along Short Bridge Street between Parsons Lane and Market Street will also need to be extended to commence at the junction of Broad Street with Short Bridge Street instead of the junction of Parsons Lane with Short Bridge Street.
- 2.3 The county councillor for the Newtown East ward has also identified that the existing one-way and access only traffic prohibition Orders along part of Wesley Street are regularly breached by drivers to the detriment of pedestrian safety, and has requested that the length of Wesley Street that is currently the subject of these traffic Orders be permanently closed to vehicular traffic to improve pedestrian safety along that section of Wesley Street and at its junction with Broad

Street, and to enable that area to be repurposed to promote "café culture" uses within this area and improve the pedestrian experience within the town centre.

- 2.4 It is therefore proposed to introduce a single Traffic Regulation Order to regulate and prohibit vehicular traffic movements along the streets described above.
- 2.5 To avoid any confusion and for the purposes of clarity, the proposed prohibitions contained within the traffic order are identified on a plan rather than as written descriptions of individual traffic movement prohibitions along those roads. These plans are attached as Appendix A and are also available to view on site notices and on the Council's website during the public consultation phase of the traffic order making process.
- 2.6 The Council's statement of reasons and a plan showing the proposed traffic movement prohibitions are attached to this report at Appendix A

3. Advice

- 3.1 No other options are available for consideration at this stage of the Traffic Regulation Order proposal process.
- 3.2 The County Council has engaged with the Town Council and the county councillor who is supportive of the proposals.
- 3.3 The proposals support the CIP priority of improving our transport infrastructure by making it safer for people to use the highways at Newtown and to encourage active travel movements.

4. Resource Implications

- 4.1 All costs associated with the consultation process, the implementation of the Traffic Regular Order and the manufacture/erection of the associated signage and carriageway markings will be funded by the High Street redevelopment project.
- 4.2 The Head of Financial Services (Section 151 Officer) notes the above and can support the recommendation.

5. Legal implications

5.1. The Principal Legal Assistant (North) has reviewed the proposals and confirms it is within our powers.

5.2. The Head of Legal and Democratic Services (Monitoring Officer) has commented as follows: "I note the legal comment and have nothing to add to the report".

6. <u>Data Protection</u>

6.1 The proposal does not require the processing of personal data, therefore comments from the Data Protection Officer are not required.

7. Comment from local member(s)

7.1. The proposal will affect residents, businesses, and visitors to Newtown. Cllr Joy Jones has expressed support for the proposal, as has Dyfed-Powys Police. No objection to the proposal has been received from Newtown and Llanllwchaiarn Town Council.

8. <u>Integrated Impact Assessment</u>
